


CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT 8/5/1924. Stating that the following plans and specifications have been received and are approved.

BUILDINGS. The Engineer stated that the following applications have been received and are approved:-

51/25. Assessment No. 2621. Brick dwelling for C.L. White containing three rooms, kitchen and laundry-bathroom on Lot 2 having a frontage of 45 feet to Eldon Street and depth of 166 feet. A. Christmas, builder. Estimated value £700.

52/25. Assessment No. 3318. Additions in weatherboard to Citizens' Hall, EASTGROVE, comprising stage, dressing room, supper room, two cloak rooms and store room, covering an additional area of 40' X 30'. (Plans have been approved by Chief Secretary's Department). Voluntary labour. Estimated value £375.

### Annual Meeting

The first annual meeting of members of the East Goulburn Citizens' Hall Fund was held on Thursday evening last, many Eastgrove residents being present.

The annual report, presented by the secretary, and the balance-sheet, prepared by the treasurer, Mr. M. Coffey, was received with applause.

The balance-sheet disclosed that a sum of £284 had been raised as the result of the year's work. Expenditure to date totalled £205 leaving a credit balance of £79.

The matter of raising the amount necessary to complete the building was fully discussed, and it was decided that a public subscription be opened. Collectors were appointed.

The Hall, a weatherboard structure, 60ft. x 30ft., which is being built by voluntary labour, is progressing rapidly, and is an object lesson of what may be achieved when people unite with a common end in view. The building, which was begun on May 10 is rapidly taking shape, and the results are most gratifying to all concerned.

The roll up of residents every Saturday afternoon is very pleasing. The ladies are doing their share by regularly supplying refreshments to the small army of busy workers. The success of the operations is in no small degree due to the combined efforts of Messrs. H. Holland and W. Frost, who not only got out the estimates, but also prepared the plans and specifications, and are carefully supervising the erection of the building in a very workmanlike manner.

The best thanks of all concerned in the welfare of the Hall movement, are due to the courteous and ready assistance given by everyone, especially the Goulburn City Council and their Engineer, Mr. Buckham, who have always proved their willingness to meet the committee halfway with courteous and prompt attention to the various matters placed before them for consideration.

In the report the committee expressed its hearty appreciation and thanks to all who have helped in their various ways to make the building of the Eastgrove Hall a success. It is hoped that when the public subscription list is opened it will receive the support it merits, so that when the hall is opened at an early date it will be free of debt.
