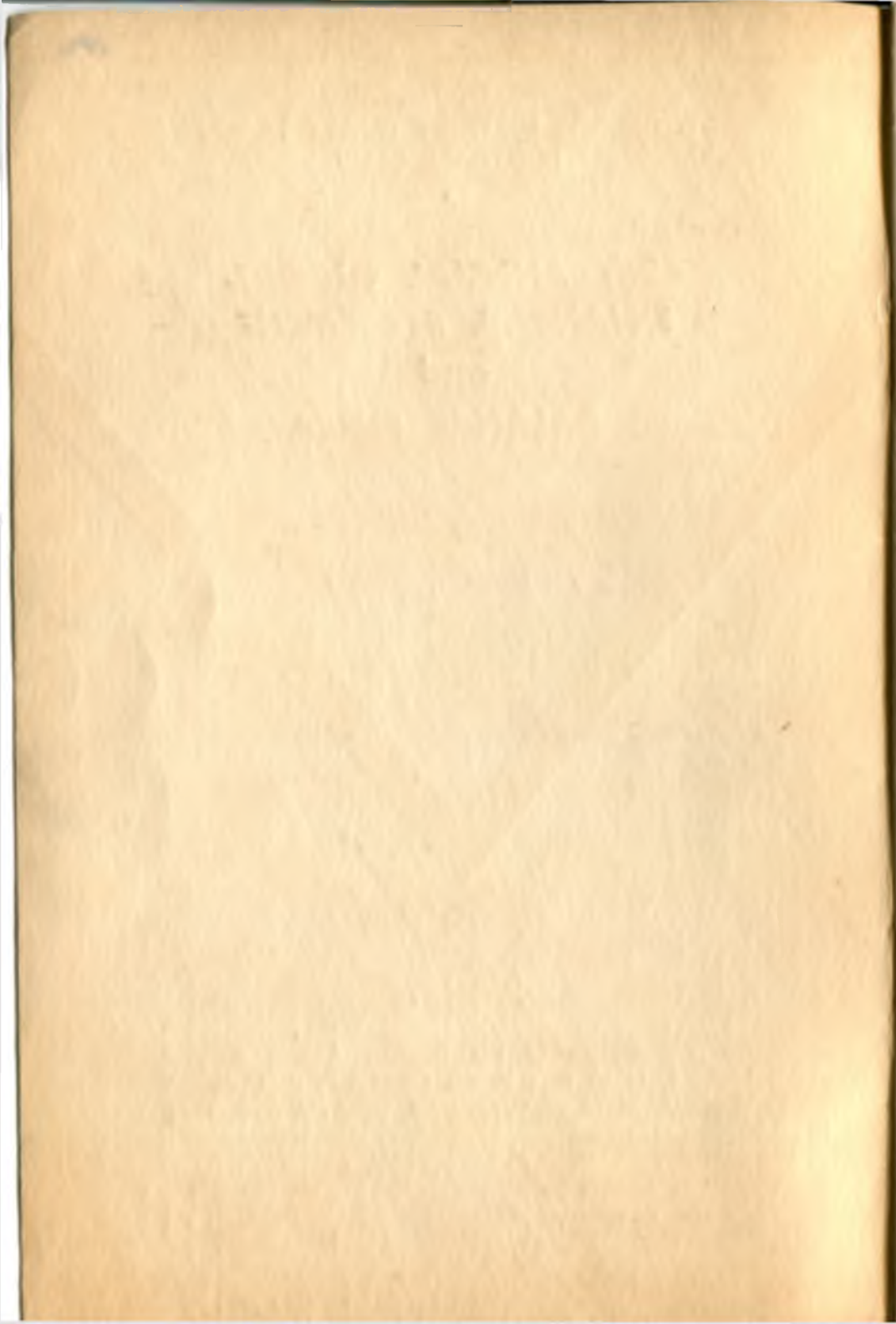

President's Foreword

Season 1960 completed forty years of St. George Club's participation in the Rugby League District Competition, and looking over that period the members must feel proud of what has been achieved during these years.

In this era twenty-five players from your Club have represented Australia and forty-six their State, and in this record of St. George representatives you will find some of the greatest players in the history of the code have worn the red and white jersey since the Club's inception in 1921. It is with pleasure, therefore, that in our fortieth year we should climax our successes by again winning the 1st Grade Premiership for the fifth successive year, thus equalling the feat of the South Sydney Club established some 30 years ago.

I would extend to Ken Kearney and his players our heartiest congratulations on their success of last season, the brilliance of their football, the efficiency of their teamwork and club spirit all blended to make St. George the outstanding combination of 1960. We look forward to 1961, and trust that we can continue our successes and make it six in a row, which, I feel sure, would remain an unbeatable record.

Unfortunately, our lower grades were not as successful as in previous years; as a result, we lost the Club Championship for the first time in six years. The Reserve Grade was hard hit by injuries, particularly at the end of the season, and fielded a number of juniors players in the semi-final; however, these players have excellent potential, and we look forward to "big things" from them in the new season. The 3rd Grade side never really settled down during the year and, although they played some excellent games, their form was not consistent enough to be a premiership danger.

Congratulations to the coaches of the lower grades, Messrs. Harry Bath and Bill Summerell, for excellent work performed under difficult conditions, and I must compliment the players of all grades for the manner in which they conducted themselves, both on and off the field. They were a credit to the Club and Rugby League generally.

The Junior League had a difficult season from a financial viewpoint, but the standard of players particularly in the lower grades was good. This was emphasised in the Reserve Grade semi-final, when most of the team's back line consisted of players who were playing Junior football until near the end of the season. We must congratulate the new Junior League executives on a very fine job, and feel sure the experiences they gained in 1960 will benefit Junior football in the coming season.

I must again pay tribute to keenness of the sportsmasters in all schools. Their efforts to assist the lads extends beyond their normal school duties, and a number of them are taking an active part in the Saturday morning competitions north and south of the George's River. They are at all times endeavouring to popularise the game throughout their schools.

The St. George League's Club again gave financial aid to the Juniors and schools. The assistance to schools increases each year with the growth of the code, and their aid to the Juniors, I know, was appreciated in a difficult year. I thank the Directors for their interest in the propagation of the game, and I trust that they will continue to help in this phase of the Club's activities.

In conclusion, gentlemen, I would congratulate my fellow executive officers and general committee for the manner in which they conducted the various activities of the Club during 1960, and to you members for your faithful and enthusiastic support during the season.

40th ANNUAL REPORT

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

The Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the Fortieth Annual Report detailing the Club's activities during the 1960 season.

The season under review culminated for St. George Club on the 3rd September when 52,156 spectators witnessed our victory over Eastern Suburbs in the Grand Final, and thus equalled the performance of South Sydney Club in this grade.

Our Grand Final team of 1960 with its pace and intelligent play, aided by superb cover defence and the ability of players to maintain these attributes through correct conditioning and training, compares favourably with that of any in previous years. These players, with the remainder of other team members throughout the year, are commended for their performances.

It may be confidently assumed that even the most ardent of our supporters would never have envisaged such a remarkable and outstanding record of performances as established by your Club during the last decade, and this meeting may rest assured that these results have not been accidental, but the outcome of a carefully devised and operated policy. St. George Club's playing record and reputation over past seasons has for some time now extended overseas where Rugby League is played, and quite often the Club is mentioned by the Press of these countries in various sporting columns.

During recent seasons it has been suggested and probably earnestly desired from sections of the sporting community both here and abroad that your Club should be matched with a leading English team. However, before such a game could eventuate permission must be obtained for same by the Board of Control from both nations of the interested Clubs. It would appear redundant to further dilate on the proposal at this stage, but members are informed that the Committee would welcome such an opportunity and deem it a great honour to be chosen to play a Club side from any country at a suitable venue, providing that conditions are reasonable.

Winning a premiership in any grade of football is indeed a distinguished and signal exploit, so when previously mentioned performances in First Grade are taken in retrospect and analysed, it naturally reflects great credit to the administration, coaching and standard and depth of class players associated with the Club. With a confident, yet humble, demeanour we approach the 1961 Competition and, without reservations, have high hopes of eclipsing our joint record held with Souths by annexing our sixth consecutive premiership.

Perhaps those who are alien to this Club and its ramifications will query our policy, but if members of your Committee had not have made such sterling efforts to keep the Club in the forefront of Rugby League, they would have failed in their duties to the District and general members. We have enough common sense and realism to understand that it is verging on the impossible to permanently maintain our exalted position of today in Rugby League, but members may rest assured that every possible avenue will be explored and, if necessary, developed to maintain our position, and any loss of such position and prestige will only be after a terrific struggle by administrators and players.

The Reserve Grade team, coached by Harry Bath, was eliminated from premiership calculations by their defeat in the Semi-Final. At full strength this team would extend any Reserve Grade side in the Competition and probably would provide strong opposition to some First Grade teams.

However, the heavy list of injuries incurred by the Club, plus players being called to higher honours, severely weakened the team, and only through Harry Bath's expert and keen coaching aptly responded to by his players was the team able to finish in the final four.

The Thirds were coached in a similar manner by Bill Summerell, and at times played excellently, but could not maintain any near standard of consistency as in 1959, failed to qualify for the semi-finals. Players from this team promoted to higher grades acquitted themselves well, one notable example being John King, who finally established himself as a regular First Grade player. John's rise should be an object lesson to all lower grade players, that natural ability grounded on a diligent approach to training are the characteristics Club selectors seek in graded players, and that these astute gentlemen prefer to choose players on current form and not reputation.

However, the general results of this team, which is our football nursery, has caused some concern to your officials, but we trust the grade experience gained, with possible additions from Junior League and other sources, will enable the Thirds to field their youthful yet powerful team during the ensuing season.

Probably 1960 season was one of our most serious regarding injuries which immobilised several promising players and, naturally, marred their progression to higher honours, whilst in the case of Eddie Lumden probably cost him World Cup selection. It is pleasing to report that Eddie has recovered from a cartilage operation, as have B. Messiter, G. Weekes, A. May, R. Stephens, K. Neal, J. Gibson, J. Riley and N. Provan also from their various impediments sustained, and all should be among our ranks next year.

The loss of the Club Championship after five successive victories cannot be solely attributed to these injuries, but without any doubt the loss of these players so far as our Club is concerned affected the result in this particular competition. However, as stated previously, machinery is now in progress which we trust shall assist to bring this coveted pennant back to St. George, for to be successful a Club must have depth of players, and the performance of a tyro Third Grader is just as important to the Club regarding points as that of an outstanding International in First Grade.

We are pleased to report that due to the cohesion and teamwork exhibited by the First Grade team the Club was once again honoured by having R. Gasnier (25 tries) and H. Graham (189 points) the leading try and points scorer respectively in the competition. These players were recipients of trophies from the Club in recognition of their feats, as also was Ken Kearney in recognition of his captaincy over the past five years. John Raper was awarded the annual Reg. Smith trophy by the Selectors after being declared the most conscientious and best player for the Club during the entire season.

The performances of John Raper and Reg. Gasnier in winning and being placed equal third respectively in the "Herald" best and fairest player competition demonstrates the wealth of ability possessed by these two young Internationals. Apart from being absent or tired from the heavy call placed on representative players, they were still able to overcome the abundance of challenges from team mates which is natural from a star-studded side as we possess and still fill two of the major positions.

Further distinction was also reflected in our direction when a total of nine players from St. George were selected in representative fixtures throughout the season. A detailed report of their respective performances is given in another section of this report.

During the season 324,780 patrons witnessed our games with an average attendance of 16,239. These figures are just slightly below last year, but still allowed a bonus of £420 for the entire season. The combined added revenue of £1,900 received from the City Cup and New Zealand tour in 1959 greatly assisted to swell the bonus of that year, so the final analyses proves that attendance and gate receipts were comparatively stable.

The past season saw the innovation of two new rules controlling the playing and administration of our game, viz., the elimination of the tap penalty and the lifting of the residential rule combined with the transfer of players. The latter rule being in its infancy has not been in operation long enough to prove or disprove its merit, but as stated in last year's Report, regardless of our feelings in this direction we must strive to prove its value for the progress of Rugby League, as any new method of conduct-

ing and controlling our game must be given fair and extensive trials if we are to prosper.

Fundamentally the transfer system allows a Club to place its players on a Transfer or Retain List. Should a retained player desire a transfer he must make application to his Club. When a player is on transfer any other interested Club may then negotiate for his services. Should a Club desire the services of a retained player from another Club, permission must first be obtained from the player's Club for the privilege to negotiate. Transfer and signing on fees are entirely optional but may be requested or imposed according to the desires of respective Clubs. Players have the right of appeal to the N.S.W.R.F.L. should they not receive satisfaction with any of the above mentioned conditions or the imposition of alleged excessive transfer fees.

Messrs. F. Facer, A. Mackie and G. Price (Deputy) were again delegates to the N.S.W.R.F.L. general committee, and at every meeting your Club had regular and punctual representation.

The direction from last year's Annual Meeting regarding a full-time Secretary was referred by the General Committee of the N.S.W.R.F.L. to its special committee for consideration and recommendation. This Committee's recommendation that Clubs may have a Secretary and Treasurer or Secretary-Treasurer to be elected by the Club's Committee was vetoed by the General Committee.

As this was a unanimous direction last year we are disappointed with the result, as only your Club and possibly Newtown were involved, and regardless of the time being opportune or not, the machinery and Constitution would have been provided and valid for the necessary alteration in the future.

St. George Junior League activities were controlled by Messrs. L. Speakman (President), K. McSweyn (Secretary) and G. Taylor (Treasurer). A pleasant feature of Junior League was the vast increase in registered players and the advent of Kingsgrove Colts, a new Club.

The heavy increase in registrations of lower grade Junior players should prove a stimulant to this section of football, and we trust the continual supply and advance of these lads will strengthen the organisation both numerically and financially. Gate receipts this season showed a marked decline on previous years, and whether Junior League has temporarily lost its spectator appeal and support or Sunday Grade football is the cause, is being closely observed by the District Club Committee and the N.S.W.R.F.L.

Messrs. F. Erickson (President), W. White (Secretary) and C. Hudson (Treasurer) controlled the destiny of St. George Referees' Association, and it is pleasing to report the Association again enjoyed a successful year.

We extend our thanks to these two kindred organisations for the courteous manner in which District Club officials were received, and look forward to similar co-operation in the coming season.

The Directors of St. George League's Club are once again sincerely thanked for their commendable approach and assistance to this Club, with its Junior League and School football commitments. The charitable demeanour of the League's Club is now well known to members of the sporting fraternity, and during the season a grant of £700 was advanced to the Junior League and one of £450 was made for distribution and promoting School football in the District.

Dr. A. Millar and Mr. C. Graham were again appointed Honorary Medical Officer and Honorary Solicitor respectively, and their efforts in their particular spheres were appreciated by the Committee and players.

Mr. K. Brown was again Ambulance Officer and carried out his duties in his usual capable manner, whilst "Bunny" Glover again proved an efficient timekeeper on all occasions and was punctual for his appointments. We extend our thanks to these gentlemen and hope to see them in our ranks during the coming season.

Your Committee also extend thanks to the public for its continued support and patronage, the Sydney Press, Radio and Television Stations for presenting our game to the public, and also to Mr. H. Maher, Publicity Officer, for his comments and descriptions in the local Press. Mr. Maher's Press writings create considerable interest and no doubt prove a great stimulant to our host of followers.

The importance of goodwill and friendship between players and officials cannot be emphasised too strongly as an essential trait that must characterise any successful sporting organisation. Bearing these facts in mind,

It is indeed pleasing to inform members that these conditions are prevalent in your Club, and while this position is maintained in the same regular manner the future success and well being of the Club is assured.

The type of footballer obtained by this Committee and standard of his play reflects great credit in its direction when the performances of Kevin Ryan and David Brown are considered as examples. One was an experienced Rugby Union International and the other a tyro of eighteen years of age, untried in Grade football, yet after a brief initiation in Grade ranks they were both promoted to First Grade and played prominent roles in our ultimate success.

Reflecting momentarily back to our 1956 Grade Final team, it is of interest to note that only four of its players represented the Club in the 1960 Grand Final, viz., R. Hugden, W. Wilson, N. Provan and K. Kearney. During the intervening years such great players as D. Fleming, K. O'Brien, R. Kite, T. Ryan, B. Orrock, P. Carroll, M. Lees, H. Bath and H. Melville have retired or left St. George, and also remembering the heavy call placed on our Club through Representative games, yet the Management Committee in conjunction with the Selectors and coaches aided by the natural progress of outstanding Juniors have with great diligence and foresight been able to recommend and produce players that have at least maintained and possibly improved the original high standard.

scheme, providing for coverage of medical costs and compensation for loss of employment for all players engaged in junior competitions.

(b) Further growth and consolidation in boys' competitions, more than 30 teams being engaged in Saturday morning boys' fixtures, with further substantial increases in playing strength assured for season 1961.

(c) Preparation, in conjunction with other districts' Junior Leagues, for introduction of an under-17 inter-district boys' knockout competition in 1961, sponsored by the N.S.W.R.F.L., and to be known as the "H. (Jersey) Flegg Memorial Trophy" Competition.

(d) A leading part, through our boys' sub-committees, in the establishment of an 8 stone 7 lbs. boys' inter-district knockout competition to provide representative opportunities at school age level for players participating in Saturday morning competitions.

Throughout the season, Junior Football has been most generously assisted by St. George District Club and by St. George League's Club, and we gratefully acknowledge the substantial support received. The Junior League is proud of its close and successful relationship with these organisations, each of which enjoys continuing supremacy in its respective sphere. In return, the Junior League has emulated its success of recent seasons in developing for its District Club yet another outstanding prospect in John King, of Arncliffe Scots Club, who progressed within the span of one season from Junior Football to the First Grade Grand Final. To John King and all other players who reached grade status, and to the clubs responsible for their development, we extend congratulations. We are sure that St. George District Club will continue to receive from junior ranks players of the calibre necessary to maintain its present-day supremacy.

Once again it gives me much pleasure to present for your perusal a financial report on Season 1960.

Revenue from the competition matches and refunds from the N.S.W. R.F.L. totalled £10,600 as against £11,559 the previous year.

The bonus paid to players who participated in all First Grade games was £400/10/-, plus £19 for the winning of the Minor Premiership, this being the fourth consecutive season the bonus exceeded £400.

Trophy grants, referees' fees, etc., paid to the Junior League amounted to £237 as against £191 last season.

Country tours showed a loss of £317 as against last year's profit of £353.
