37th ANNUAL REPORT

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

The Committee has pride and pleasure in submitting for your consideration the Thirty-seventh Annual Report of the Club's activities.

The season under review, the Jubilee of Rugby League football in Australia, proved to be the most successful since the Club's foundation, both from financial and playing results. The Club was able to repeat its remarkable achievement of the previous season by winning the coveted First Grade Premiership, the Minor Premiership, and the Flowers' Memorial Club Championship Pennant. Added to these honours are the Reserve Grade Minor Premiership and the Third Grade Premiership. Our Junior League won the President's Cup competition and the Lennox Cup was awarded to our District after the result of the All Schools Carnival conducted by the N.S.W.R.F.L. When a final analysis of this outstanding performance is taken, it can readily be acclaimed that the Jubilee Year of League football was also "St. George's Year," and should we have been successful in the Reserve Grade competition, the District would have completed the "grand slam," a feat never yet attained by any club in district football.

The strength of the Club was again indicated by our eighth win, and the third in succession of the Club Championship, and we have now annexed this trophy more times than any other club. Our continued success in this event proves the remarkable club spirit permeating through our members where the efforts of the most inexperienced Third Grade boy is just as important as the effort from an International in First Grade. From these facts it is axiomatic that through our three grades and into Junior and School football, St. George has never been so well equipped with talented players and while these conditions maintain themselves the future well being of the Club is assured.

The First Grade team at all times played football of an entertaining nature, and this was further exemplified when it is recorded that 400,554 patrons attended our fixtures, including the match against Newcastle at the Sydney Cricket Ground. Gate receipt records were broken against South Sydney, (£2,584) and North Sydney (£1,343) at the Sports Ground and Kogarah Oval respectively, while the attendance of 13,764 at Leichhardt Oval against Balmain created a record. Further, the Grand Final gate takings exceeded by £33 the record established by St. George and Balmain in 1956. When these figures are taken in retrospect it can be readily perceived how our financial returns and bonus of 514 is the highest ever in the annals of Rugby League in this country.

During the season the First Grade team played 20 matches, won 17 and lost 3, scoring 469 points to 248. The Reserve Grade team played 20 matches, won 13, drew 3 and lost 5, scoring 302 points to 157, and the Third Grade team played 21 matches, won 15, drew 1 and lost 5, scoring 273 points to 121. The brilliant effort of our Thirds in the Grand Final is worthy of special mention when after being down 11-3 at half-time, played the outstanding game of the day in the second half and finally won the premiership 25 to 11.

Coach Lance Handley is to be congratulated for his effort with this team and no doubt if he continues his coaching addresses as he did on this particular occasion, further success will naturally come his way. However, more detailed reports of our Reserve and Third Grades' performances are given in a later stage of this report.

The Club again won the £250 Minor Premiership prize donated by the N.S.W.R.F.L., and the committee decided to again pay the money to the First Grade players in proportion to the number of games in which they participated.

Your First Grade team defeated Newcastle 42-23 at the Sydney Cricket Ground on 11th May in the City fixtures.

The following players represented the Club: D. Fleming, T. Ryan, G. Weekes, J. Fifield, E. Lumaden, P. Carroll, R. Bugden, B. Clay, N. Provan, H. Melville, H. Bath, K. Kearney, K. Brown, K. O'Brien and B. Henderson. Tries were scored by N. Provan, H. Bath, R. Bugden, R. Melville, G. Weekes, J. Fifield, P. Carroll and E. Lumaden, and goals by R. Bath (6), and D. Fleming (3).

Coach, Ken Kearney, added further lustre to his great record with the ultimate success of the team and no doubt his experience of all football conditions and knowledge of the rules played no small part in his team's success. No fewer than six new players appeared in our Grand Final side, as compared with that of the previous season, and of these, E. Lumaden, B. Clay and H. Bath attained representative honours. The latter mentioned soon proved his versatility by immediately adapting himself to Australian conditions and then later taking over the important role of goal kicker, at which he landed eight successive goals in the final game. Norm Provan further emphasised his ability and is now acclaimed by all as one of the greatest players ever in his position. Norm was unlucky to be beaten by one point for a television set and a £50 trophy for the best and fairest Australian player in the World Series.

During the latter part of the season opinions had been expressed that St. George was being carried by its great power in the forwards, but, to win a premiership a team must be well balanced in all departments and our backs contributed 79 of the 93 tries scored, with 50 tries coming from the wingers. Kangaroo Tommy Ryan after probably his best season, scored 26 tries and apart from breaking the Club record held by Ron Roberts since 1949, was once again the leading try scorer in the competition. Tom was the recipient of a trophy for his record breaking effort. Ray Smith played his first game of the season in our Thirds, yet through opportunity and sheer ability he was able to maintain his position in the First Grade team for the last five games. This performance should encourage young players to appear in District Club trial matches, with the knowledge that present form and not reputations are the sole guide of Selection Committees.

A dominating factor in our success during the season was the eager spirit shown by the players to win the premiership. When the Interstate series ended in Brisbane, Messrs. K. Kearney, N. Provan, B. Clay, E. Lumaden and K. Brown flew home and were available to play against Eastern Suburbs the next day. Later in the season six of our players who appeared in a Representative match in Sydney made themselves available to play the next day against Newtown. It is worth recording that we were successful in both of these fixtures.

The late Dr. F. Reynolds, Honorary Medical Officer, once again was a pillar of strength to our players with his practical and personal support. Everybody realises the heavy call placed on persons in this profession yet at no time did Dr. Reynolds forego his honorary duties to the Club in favour of his own practice, and his final effort in getting Bryan Orrock and Brian Clay fit for the Grand Final played no small part in the result.

Your Club was honoured by having nine players chosen for Representative games and of these K. Kearney, N. Provan, B. Clay were finally chosen to represent Australia in the World Series. Thus the Club supplied half of the Australian forwards which completely dominated those of any other nation competing in the Series.

Injuries of a serious nature were again predominant, but due to astute administration and good selection the replacements at all times were successful and in most cases the individuals grasped their opportunity and consolidated their respective positions. The most serious injuries were: B. Orrock (fractured arm and dislocated shoulder), K. O'Brien (injured

cartilage), B. Clay (fractured rib), G. Weekes (fractured foot), A. O'Sullivan (injured knee), and P. Carroll and B. Welsell (fractured jaws). Kevin O'Brien has now had his cartilage removed and should be fit for next season.

At the conclusion of the season a twelve day tour embracing Warwick and Lismore was organised for the First Grade players and a party of Third and Reserve Grade players and officials had a week-end visit to Bathurst.

Messrs. F. Facer, A. Mackie and G. Price (deputy) were your Club delegates to the N.S.W.R.F.L. and on all occasions the Head Body met the Club was fully represented.

Prominent and progressive Kogarah businessman, Mr. Michael Tynan, of the Central Pharmacy, Kogarah, with permission of your Committee, most graciously donated a J. Farren Price watch and "Parker 51" pen to the outstanding St. George player of the week. These watches were won by N. Provan (2), K. Kearney, R. Bugden, T. Ryan, B. Graham, K. Moffat, H. Bath, B. Clay, R. Smith, J. Horsley, B. Orrock and M. Porter, and pens by E. Lumsden, E. Glossop, R. Smith, H. Melville, K. Brown, R. Ambrose, P. Carroll, J. Horsley and J. Stathers.

Mr. L. Barlow also donated six overnight bags and the winners were B. Clay, H. Bath, K. Moffat, K. Brown, B. Orrock and R. Smith.

Mr. H. Maher, with assistance from Mr. J. Osborne, was judge for Mr. Tynan's award, and the selectors for Mr. Barlow's. These gentlemen are to be congratulated on their selection of winners and the Club conveys its thanks and appreciation to the donors.

Junior League activities were controlled by Messrs. L. Stephens (President), A. Jones (Secretary), W. Thompson (Treasurer), and a hard working, virile Management Committee. The winning of the President's Cup was a just reward to these gentlemen for their labours in Junior Football and with the talent available in our junior ranks this trophy could quite easily be retained during the coming season. We extend our thanks to this body for the courteous manner in which District Club officials were received, and look forward to similar co-operation in the future.

The Directors of St. George League's Club have given every possible support to the players and officials, and we convey our sincere thanks to this body for their spontaneous and generous assistance. Our premiership celebrations were naturally held at the Club and at a later date the two winning teams were guests of the Directors at a dinner and social evening.

Mr. K. Brown, ambulance officer, Mr. B. Glover, timekeeper, and Master Warren Green, ball boy, once again performed their duties in a manner that leaves no doubt as to their keenness and ability. We offer our congratulations to Warren on his appointment as ball boy in the World Series fixtures. We extend our thanks to these gentlemen and hope to see them in their respective positions next season.

Your Committee also extends its thanks to the public for its continued support and patronage, the Sydney Press, Radio and Television Stations for the space and time allocated to Rugby League, and Mr. H. Maher, Publicity Officer, for his comments and descriptions in the "St. George Call." This gentleman is to be commended for his diligent and thorough reports in the "Call" and no doubt creates tremendous interest in our supporters.

We of the Committee are fully aware of the fact that any premiership team requires a certain amount of good fortune to achieve its object. However, it is my personal opinion that the honours attained this season were more by design than by accident when one reflects on the splendid performance of the players, the harmonious atmosphere between players and officials, together with the zeal and pride your Committee take in their respective positions and the administration of their various duties.

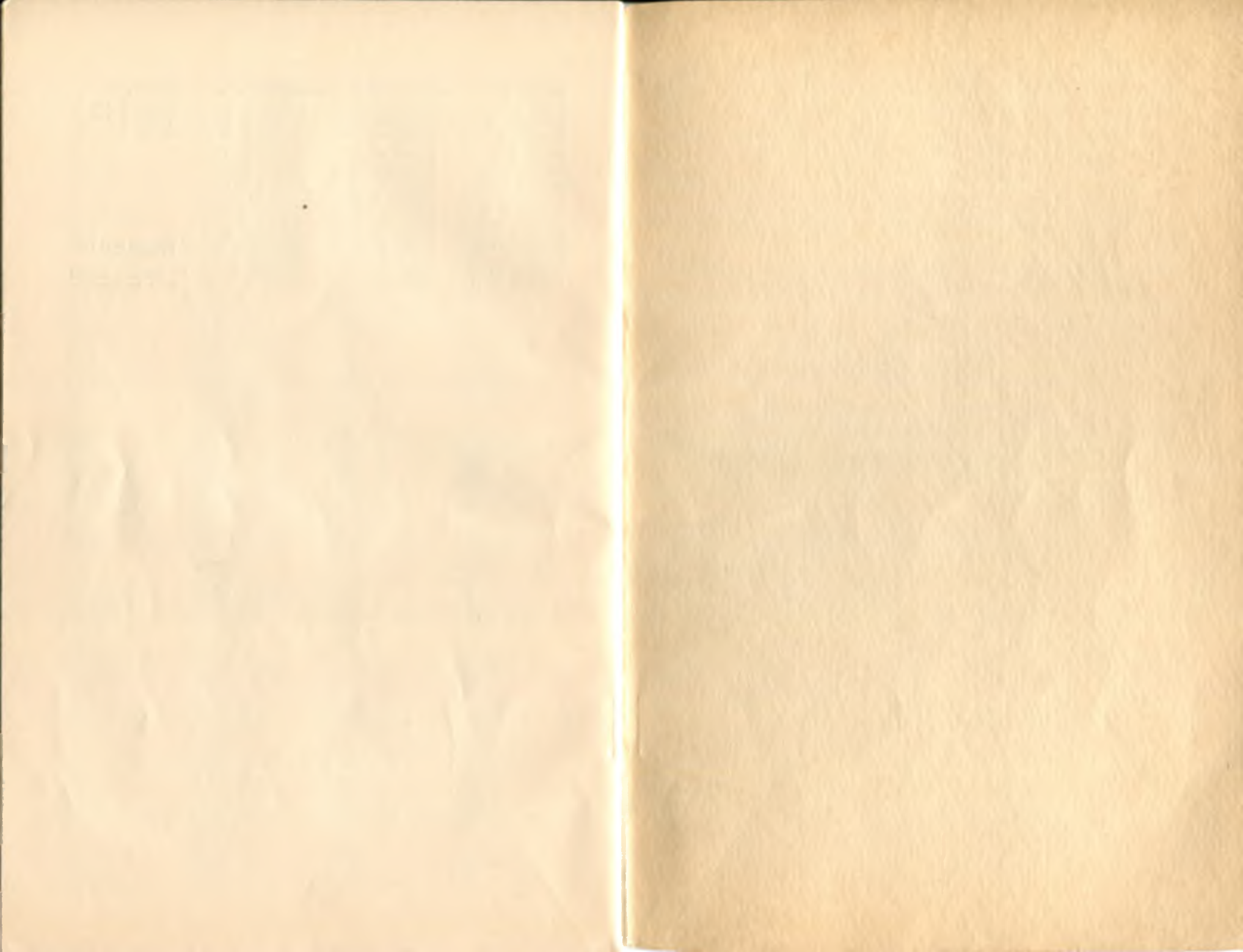
