
Information Provided by Erin




Among the stories related by Mr. Daveson and his brother, Jack, who took up residence in Cleveland in 1898, is that of their attendance at school, having to walk from Capalaba to Ormiston, the only house on the way being "The Pines" (now the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. Cotton) while the only house visible from the school was the home of the Ware family.

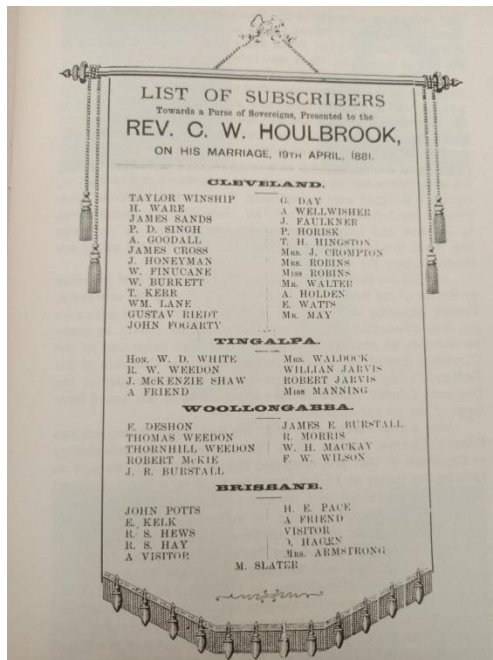

Further information gleaned from English and Australian newspapers:

The following ships have been chartered by the Immigration Commissioners to embark Government emigrants from Plymouth:-The Mangerton, March 31, and the Gloriana, April 4, for Sydney ; the Cambodia, April 13, for Moreton Bay ;

The *Cambodia* was cleared with cargo at the Custom-House, London on 3rd April 1855, sailed from Gravesend 4th April, arrived Plymouth 12th April, and departed Plymouth 20th April. Emigrants probably boarded in Plymouth. On 23rd April, the *Cambodia* was seen at lat 44.28 N long 15.10 W, in the North Atlantic Ocean about 500 km off the northwest coast of Spain. On 28th May, the ship was at lat 10.1 s long 32.10 W, in the South Atlantic Ocean about 360 km southeast of Recife, Brazil.

Only two deaths occurred on board of the Cambodia during the passage. The immigrants are all healthy, and it is expected, will be brought up to Brisbane on Monday. It will be seen that the Immigration Agent has adopted the proper course of publishing an official statement respecting the passengers.

THE CAMBODIA'S IMMIGRANTS.—The whole of the Cambodia's immigrants, together with their luggage, were landed in Brisbane at the close of last week. They are a healthy and cleanly body of people, and their appearance reflects credit upon those who have had charge of them. The hiring has gone on with tolerable briskness, and there remained in the depot yesterday, out of the whole number landed, 130 married people (65 couples), 7 single men, and 15 single women, besides children. The Surgeon-Superintendent of the ship, Dr. Beale, is a gentleman who visited Brisbane

BEFORE HIS HONOR CHIEF JUSTICE COCKLE.
ATTEMPT TO COMMIT A CAPITAL OFFENCE.
John Clarke was charged with having on the 10th February endeavored to commit a rape on the person of *Fredericka Kliever*.
Fredericka Kliever, called by the ATTORNEY-GENERAL, recognised the prisoner; she saw him about ten days ago at Cleveland at the point; she saw him in a cart, and got into it with him; after he committed the offence she jumped off the cart; she then saw Mr. Ware; he was in sight of the cart when she jumped out; she made a complaint to him when she saw him.
Henry Ware corroborated the testimony of the principal witness; *Fredericka Kliever* on jumping out of the cart came up to witness, and complained to him that the boy in the cart had been beating her.
His Honor charged the jury.
The jury returned a verdict acquitting the prisoner of the graver crime, but finding him guilty of an assault. He was strongly recommended to mercy.
The prisoner was sentenced to three months' imprisonment.

CLEVELAND DIVISIONAL BOARD.

A SPECIAL meeting of the Cleveland Divisional Board was held on Friday last. The members present were Messrs. W. Ross (chairman), J. Cross, J. Fogarty, P. Horik, W. Kefferd, and J. Woodgate. The object of the meeting was to consider a letter received from Messrs. Bunton and Little, solicitors for D. Denholm, contractor for the divisional hall, stating that he had finished the hall in accordance with plans and specifications, and demanding payment of £71 5s., balance due to the contractor.

The CHAIRMAN mentioned that he had seen Mr. Denholm recently, and that with reference to the portions of work condemned by the Improvement Committee Mr. Denholm had said he preferred that the board should deduct something from his account rather than come to Cleveland to make the required alterations.

It was resolved, on the motion of Mr. KEFFORD, that £25 2s. be paid to the contractor in final settlement of his account.

Celebrations at Cleveland

The jubilee celebrations at Cleveland in connection with St. Paul's Church of England, which commenced last Sunday, were marked on Saturday afternoon by a united social event in which the parishioners of St. Andrew's (Ormiston), St. George's (Birkdale), and St. James's (Wellington Point) identified themselves with the ladies' guilds of Cleveland and Victoria Point.

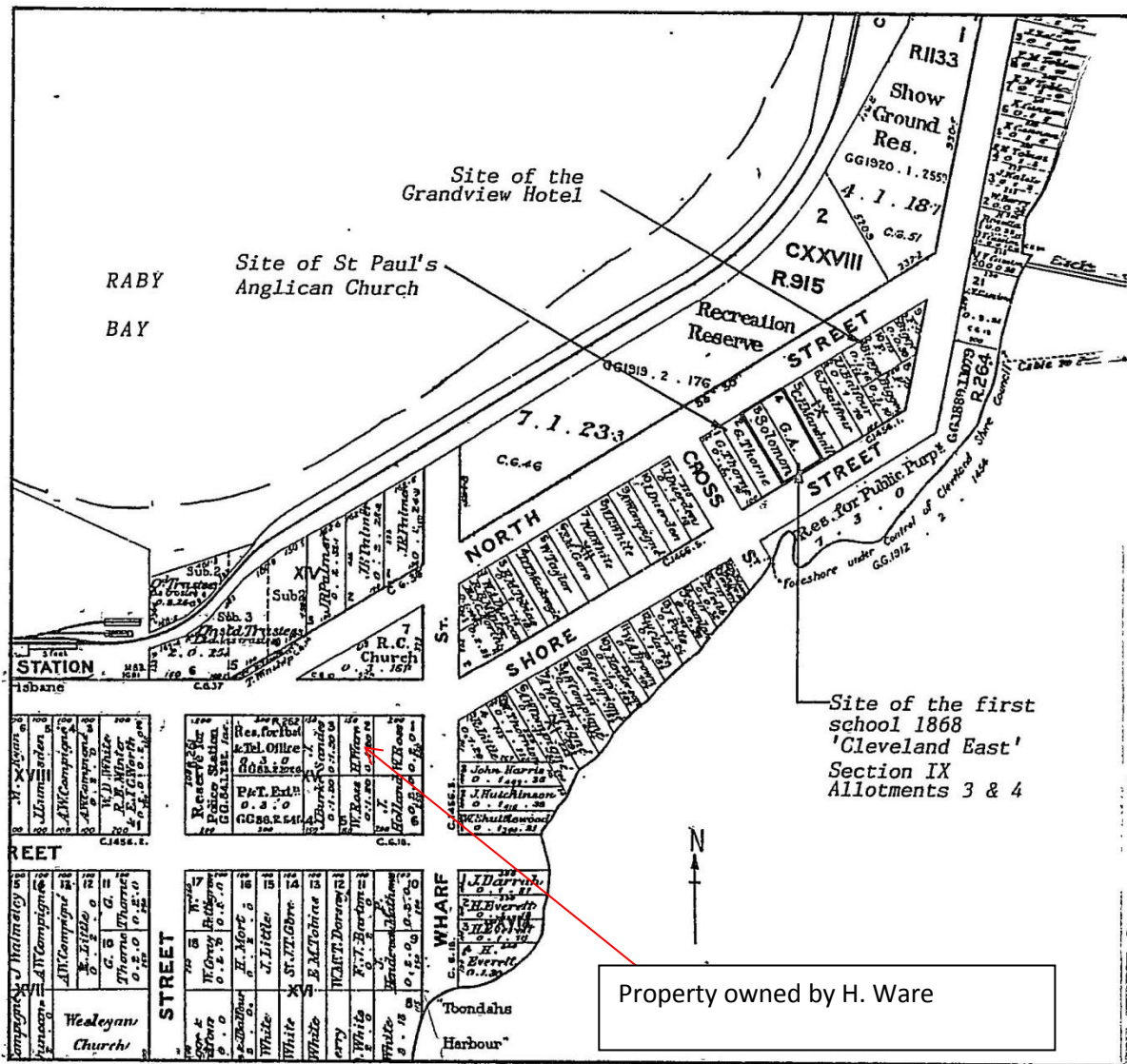

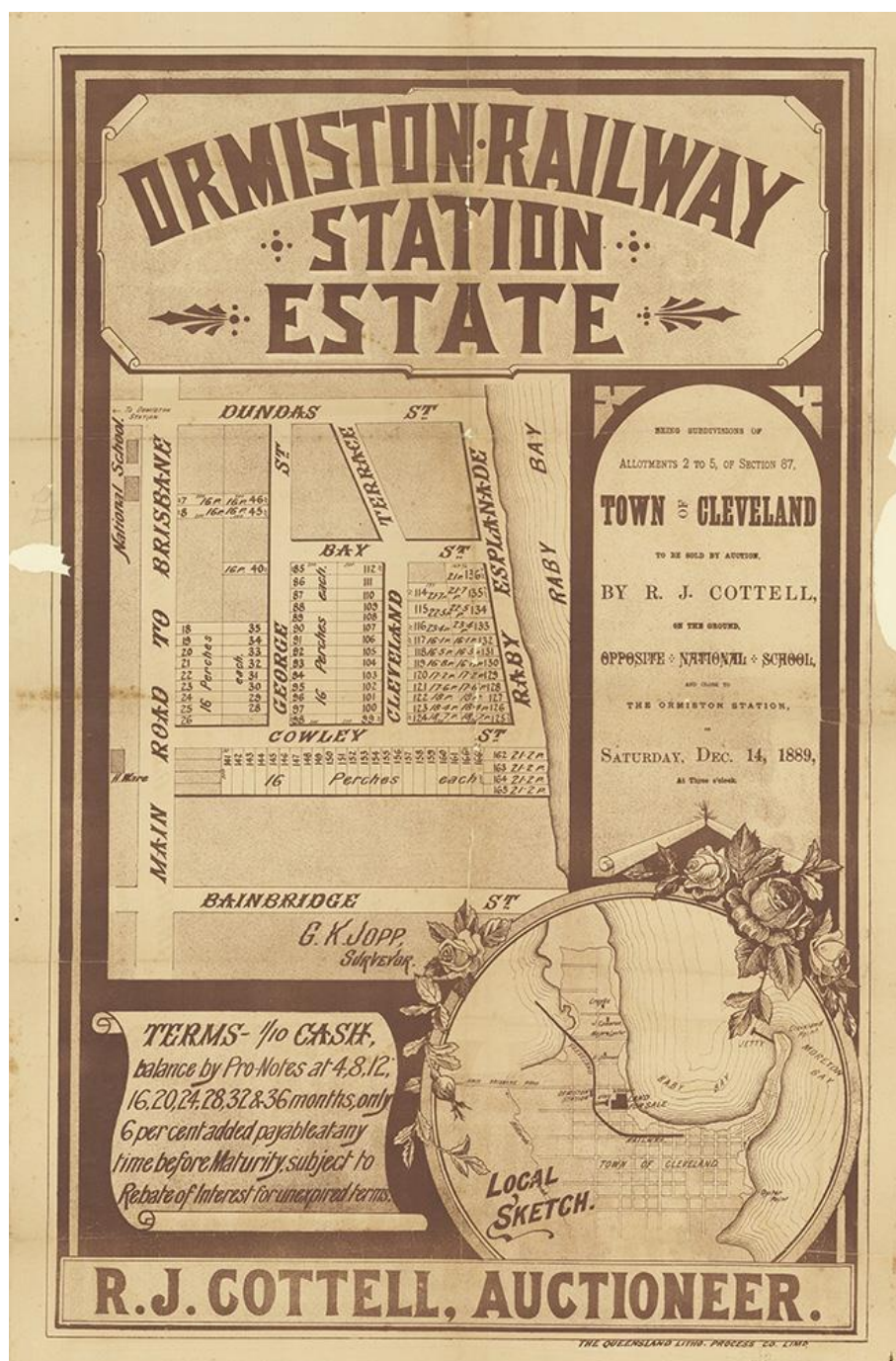

Further searching on Ancestry.com.au reveals that Henry Ware and Louisa Gristwood married on 2 April 1855, not long before emigrating, at the Parish Church of St Mary, Harmondsworth, Middlesex. Henry was a labourer and Louisa a servant, and both were residing in Harmondsworth. Henry was baptised at Chalfont Saint Giles, Buckinghamshire, on 15 August 1824, his parents being George and Frances (nee Bowler). Louisa was born 28 September 1828 and baptised 26 October 1828 at St Mary the Virgin, Parish Church, Harefield, Middlesex, being the daughter of Thomas and Hannah (nee Pag(g)et).
