# DEAN OF STUDIES REPORT

In the 1990's, the pressure placed upon students to be academically competitive is probably greater than at any other time we have known so far. As a consequence, the support structures both at home and at the college need to be constantly reviewed to ensure we are best serving the students' academic and also pastoral needs.

I suppose the initiatives taken by the Board of Studies and the domestic decisions here at Marist are a constant reminder of the curriculum changes required to cater for the perceived needs of the student.

The introduction of Excellence and Equity in 1992 is designed to give students a broader and a more meaningful education across the Key Learning Areas. This programme has had an impact at Marist in so much as the introduction of subjects such as Australian Studies and Dance/Drama, as well as consolidating languages such as Latin, French and Italian.

The staff at Marist have responded to the need for continuing curriculum review by devoting a great deal of time and resources to professional development.

In 1991 the College was extremely fortunate to have worked with Dr Julia Atkin, a highly respected Educational Consultant. Dr Atkin spent a great deal of time with each Subject Department in the College and there is an on-going process of developing new programmes and teaching strategies taking place.

Other initiatives designed to promote good learning habits in the College are already in place or about to be introduced in 1992.

Among these are the very successful Silent Reading Programme and a Study Skills Programme which will in fact be timetabled into the cyclic programme. The latter programme will be facilitated by the students' tutor and will allow a greater degree of face to face tutor-student time to discuss individual concerns with study and performance.

Of course all of the above initiatives will not help the students reach their potential if they do not go hand in hand with a successful pastoral care programme. To this end the role of the tutor at Marist has been greatly expanded. The Study Skills Programme, taught by the tutors, will be supplemented with a timetabled Pastoral meeting for each year group and attended by the tutors. The tutor, in most cases, will also be the student's Religious Education teacher, allowing a real pastoral bond between student and tutor.

Of course as we all know, the greatest pastoral care programme is at home. We at the College are only a supplement to it. Both at home and at school, we must always challenge the students but at the same time encourage them.

So it is at the end of the 1991 school year that I believe here at Marist we are accepting the challenge of creating excellent academic and pastoral support structures and we do so in the knowledge of it always being an on-going process.

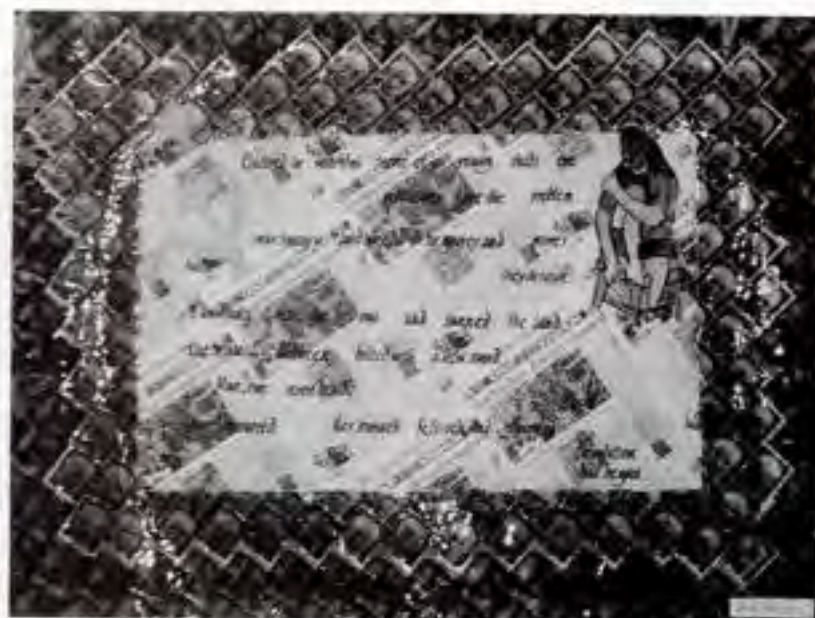

# RELIGIOUS EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

Religious Education at Marist College North Shore encompasses many experiences of a daily nature. It occurs in the classroom, including the Religion Studies classes, the playground, on camps and retreats, during liturgical celebrations and from the atmosphere of the school.

The classroom curriculum is always a significant part of the religious education experience, and as such must be a dynamic and relevant part of the education of the students. Over the past two years we have implemented new programmes in all forms. During 1992, these programmes will be reviewed and evaluated so that we can develop our programme further.

The liturgy has again been an integral part of the religious education of the boys. Apart from the main celebrations, such as the Champagnat Mass, the Year Seven Family Mass and the Year Twelve Graduation Mass, the weekly college mass has been well supported throughout the year. It is a time when the boys and the staff have the opportunity to celebrate the mass together. During 1991 a number of important paraliturgies have also occurred. Ash Wednesday, Easter Week and Anzac Day were celebrated with a prayer service. Anzac Day was an especially significant day, as an officer from H.M.A.S. Sydney addressed the assembly about the Middle East conflict, in particular the reality of war. It was a most moving service. Environment Week was also concluded with a paraliturgy which utilized the dramatic and musical skills of our students, but at the same time placed environmental issues into the perspective of God's creation.

At Marist we are very fortunate to be served by a generous clergy — both the Jesuits of St Mary's and the priests of the Deanery. These priests celebrate mass with us every Friday and also willingly participated in our Parish Day — where the boys visited their parish to meet with the local clergy.

One of the highlights of the year, both for the boys and the staff involved, were the retreats. Both the Year Twelve and Eleven retreats were held with a spirit of friendship and an atmosphere encouraging spiritual and personal growth. Many thanks go to the staff who were so willingly involved in the retreat programme and contributed to its overall success.

Finally, I would like to thank the Religious Studies staff and the staff in general for their enthusiasm and support for all our events during the year and their witness to the Christian values of the College. I would also like to thank the boys for their involvement throughout the year, especially those boys involved in the music, performance and preparation of our liturgies. Thanks also go to Father Joseph Sobb, S.J., the College Chaplain, for his continued support and time throughout the year. In particular I would like to thank Brother Peter Pemble for his support and enthusiasm for everything we do in the religious education of the boys in the College.

## ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

As with other departments at Marist College, the English Department derived considerable benefit from an intensive phase of professional development throughout 1991. The brief was clear; we aimed at improving the educational environment in our classes to thereby accelerate and maximise the learning outcomes for our students. The following outlines some of our initiatives.

In Year Ten in 1991 students approached their units of work thematically. Each piece of work (novel study, poetry, drama, short story, writing activities and so on) was linked by a common thread. Some of the major themes were: Law and Order, War and Aggression, Adventure, Mateship and Loyalty, Love and Romance.

In 1991 all students in Years Seven, Eight, Nine and Ten were issued with updated and relevant language texts and units of work on THE MEDIA were systematically organized. Year Seven focussed on ADVERTISING and PERSUASION; Year Eight on the structure and composition of NEWSPAPERS; Year Nine on the MEDIA as ENTERTAINMENT; Year Ten on the elements of BIAS/SENSATIONALISM in CURRENT AFFAIRS.

In 1991 a programme aimed at extending gifted students was introduced in the English department. Approximately thirty boys in total were selected from Years Eight, Nine and Ten. Selection was based on the following criteria: a love of and passion for reading and a proven record of academic excellence in English. A wide selection of novels was chosen by the librarian, Mrs Laws. In the early stages of the programme, students met frequently, discussed novels read, made recommendations and swapped titles. Out of this emerged a group of students who documented and published these discussions for the benefit of the total school community. This was the birth of "WRITERS BLOC". More about this student based initiative can be found in the Library Report. Also in '91 all students in Years Seven to Ten were presented with a COURSE OBJECTIVES CHECKLIST consisting of fifteen to twenty items. For example, just four of the components of the Year Seven programme were:

- \* reading of four class novels
- \* recitation of one well known Australian ballad
- \* participation in group project on Aboriginal mythology
- \* writing assignment on the topic "my unusual pet"

A number of new titles were added to the book hire list in 1991. These were chosen on their interest value to students, their literary quality and their award winning credentials. Some examples are: Year Seven — "Little Brother" by Alan Baillie; Year Eight — "So Much to Tell You" by John Marsden; Year Nine — "Thunderwith" by Libby Hathorn and Year Eleven — "Classic Short Stories".

In 1991 Drama became a separate entity with the introduction of Drama as a subject in its own right in Year Eight. This will be extended to other years in 1992. Students at Marist continued to experience a variety of dramatic performances. Year Twelve were audience at Henry IV, I at the Wharf Theatre and also at a dramatization of the poetry of John Keats. The junior years saw two excellent plays presented by the Toe-Truck Theatre Company — "Wolf Boy" and "Learn or Burn".

Throughout 1991 the English department, in conjunction with Social Sciences and History faculties developed an additional reporting measure; a profile report which aimed at providing more information about the specific abilities of each student within the individual subject. These were completed for each boy in Years Seven, Eight and Nine at the end of Term Three.

The English department hopes to continue the energetic pursuit of better means of teaching the boys at Marist College. At the time of writing we are investigating ways to provide students with greater individual choice in their selections of assessable requirements, study of different facets of English and valuable weightings in assignments.

## MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

The word 'Mathematics' elicits strong emotional responses from most people. Individuals generally categorise themselves as either hopeless or capable when it comes to Maths and their associated memories of it as a subject at school.

A great number of the population believe that we have been blessed with an innate ability which enables us to achieve ongoing success in Mathematics throughout our school years. Mathematics is a very honest subject and by that I mean the degree of success achieved is proportional to the time spent constantly revising old concepts. It is essential that students remain familiar with all work, even months after it has been covered in class.

Further to the theme of achieving success in Mathematics, it has been a long held belief of mine that students arriving at Marist North Shore have already started to form an opinion about the subject. It is then essential that the Mathematical 'experience' in those early years is a pleasant one and, in pursuit of this aim, we have called on the services this year of Dr. Julia Atkin, an educational psychologist.

As a result of these discussions with Dr Atkin, we have attempted to introduce a more 'hands-on' approach to Mathematics in Year 7, working with concrete materials and in groups for different topics. The group relies on a peer support system, where students help each other to fully understand the more difficult concepts and, without exception, students enjoy attending Maths lessons. Not only has Mathematics become an enjoyable experience but students have been able to retain information more successfully.

Next year the Mathematics Department plans to more fully develop the Year 7 programme around topics that will enable students to work more frequently in the group situation and hopefully outside of the classroom! I look forward to working with the Mathematics Department, a very conscientious and innovative group, in 1992.

## SOCIAL SCIENCES DEPARTMENT

The inaugural Environment Week was organised and implemented by the Social Science Department during May. As well, guest speakers from the political arena and various action groups addressed the student body at the special assemblies held during the week. The whole week was a great success due to the enthusiasm of both the staff and students at the College.

Australian Studies was introduced to the curriculum of the department from the beginning of the school year. This has proved to be a wise move, as the Year 7 and 8 boys have appreciated the chance to learn more about our country. These boys participated in fieldwork related to the course by attending "The Story of Sydney" exhibition and a walking tour of the Rocks, which they enjoyed very much.

## MUSIC DEPARTMENT

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION/HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The early years of the 90's have ushered in a number of changes for our department. In 1991 the P.E. staff increased from one to three teachers and Health was introduced as a separate subject. In 1992 a double period for Physical Education lessons will be implemented when the timetable allows, and senior years will have the option of a 2 Unit Higher School Certificate course. Other changes will probably result in smaller classes overall, which can be considered advantageous for students and teachers alike.

The introduction of Health in the 1991 School Curriculum has provided students with the opportunity to research and explore real-life issues which effect them and the society in which they reside. Through the investigation of topics such as drugs, communicable diseases, nutrition, and prevention of injury, students have been equipped with strategies to deal with problems they generally encounter in life. It will be an on-going process as the student passes through Years 7-12, which will enable him to determine the 'right' decision on each issue. Therein lies the very strength of Health as a subject within the school, i.e. the relevance of the content to the students' everyday lives. Making each Marist student more conscious of a broad spectrum of health issues can only benefit their individual lifestyles.

## COMPUTER STUDIES DEPARTMENT

Computers, computing and information processing are part of everyday life and changing the nature of work and the nature of society in fundamental ways. Schools, as part of the society in which we live, have to be aware of this technology and make informed decisions about ways to reflect it in teaching and learning methods, and in the content of what is taught. At Marist College North Shore we are addressing this challenge with the intention of being at the forefront of computer education.

In 1991 for the first time at Marist a Year 12 class will sit for the 2 Unit Computer Studies Course in the Higher School Certificate. The course, while requiring no prerequisite computing ability, introduces senior students to a wide range of experiences in the field of computer technology. Those that undertake the course learn to: carry out simple maintenance tasks; operate common application packages (word processors, data bases, spreadsheets, communications and graphics programmes); programming techniques and appreciate social implications of such technology.

1991 has seen the beginning of an update of the facilities at Marist. Earlier this year the College purchased three new Archimedes computers from Acorn. These thirty-two bit machines will form the basis for a network to eventually replace the existing eight bit network of BBC Model computers installed in 1986. With these new

computers we will be able to expose the students to the latest in graphics and text processing, to introduce them to Computer Aided Design which is becoming an important part of the technics subjects.

In 1992 the elective course in Years 9 and 10 will continue; as will the compulsory introductory course in Year 7. Also in 1992 we hope to offer to Year 8 students a course in typing and wordprocessing. The main emphasis of this course will be to improve the students' typing ability and to also encourage the use of computers in the presentation of their work in all subjects, not just Computer Studies. I feel this is a worthwhile objective and if it is achieved will assist the boys throughout much of their future study.

Another aim of 1992 is the expansion of the computer facilities beyond Room 4. At the present time the Computer Room is used extensively by Computer Studies classes in Years 7, 9, 10, 11 and 12 so therefore other subjects are restricted in the use of software relevant to their study. Expansion beyond Room 4 should alleviate this problem. Initially a single Model B computer will be placed in Room 3 to evaluate the degree of interest.

In conclusion I would like to express my satisfaction with the progress of 1991 and look forward to future developments within the department.

Years 10 and 12 have had their food tastings too with Year 10 having displayed good personal cooking skills.

A visit to a French restaurant and movie will be a fitting end to the year's work in November.

Several Year 10 and Year 12 students sat for the Alliance Francaise exams in both the written and spoken sections. We await the results. As well, Year 10 sat for the Australian Language Exams in August. Such exposure to hearing and reading the language can only help develop a better understanding. It is interesting to note the number of French films currently showing at the cinema complexes in the city. So too have the students noticed the increased frequency of French in many television advertisements. Exposure such as this to other cultures has positive benefits. It is through language study that one's personality and one's society is enriched.

The fact too, that governments are now in favour of language learning and that businesses are starting to see the financial value of language skills, must reinforce the value of language learning at school. This must, in turn, produce a more tolerant generation with enhanced international understanding.

## HISTORY DEPARTMENT

Once again, the year has been an extremely busy and eventful one for the History Department at Marist College North Shore. Staff and students have striven for excellence in the pursuit of all things historical.

In Years Nine and Ten, the students have undertaken the study of Australian History ranging from the early years of British colonisation, convict settlement, involvement in two World Wars, and up to the present day with particular emphasis on foreign policy after 1945. Field study trips to Hill End, (near Bathurst) and Canberra, complemented the topics covered and certainly made them more alive and relevant to those students involved.

At school, from a newsworthy point of view, it has been a quiet year in the Industrial Arts department. The only exception to that is staffing. After a short stay in 1990, Mr M. Duggan decided to leave and he was replaced by Mr W. Locke, who has had the responsibility of the senior Industrial Technology classes, along with some junior classes. Mr Locke comes to us from Balmain Christian Brothers, which closed last year.

On the whole it has been a good, pleasant and fruitful year.

### VISUAL ARTS

## LIBRARY REPORT

The introduction of a six day cycle and a seven period day has meant greater flexibility for the number of classes that can be accommodated in the library at any one time. Small groups of individuals can work in Seminar Rooms while a whole class can use the main area. These lessons provide an excellent opportunity to teach and reinforce information skills.

An encouraging trend is the number of students independently visiting the library either before school or at lunch time. One reason for this is the success of the Sustained Silent Reading Programme introduced last year. Fiction borrowing has dramatically increased but, more importantly, many boys have discovered they actually enjoy reading. The success of this programme has emphasised the need to continually expand and evaluate the fiction collection. During regular library lessons for Years 7, 8 and 9 new novels are reviewed and the boys discuss the books they are reading.



At the beginning of the year a special collection of quality children's literature was organized to be used by the students selected for the Advanced Reading Programme. This collection includes many winners of the Newbery and Carnegie medals and other works of high literary merit.

From the group of boys in the Advanced Reading Programme a committee was formed to publish a newspaper that would report on school activities as well as publishing book reviews, poetry and short stories written by students. Five editions of "Writers Bloc" were produced during 1991. An enthusiastic editorial team, led by Stephen Campbell, includes Wayne Davis, John Dimitropoulos and Peter Sarkis as journalists and Matthew Houlst and Ricardo Aravena as illustrators. All students are welcome to submit items for publication.

Another special programme started last year that continues to increase in value is PIRRP (Parental Involvement in Remedial Reading Programme). Volunteers come to the library each Thursday to work with two Year 7 classes. During this year we have been helped by Nola Molloy, Lina Bivona, Chris Pechey, Anne Marie Filgate, Lyle Goodyear, Elizabeth Stanley, Norah Short, Cheryl Cunnane, Michelle Kamper and Christine de Bondt. Mrs Sue Foster organizes the content of these lessons and the students working in groups of two or three are able to proceed at their own pace. The value of this programme cannot be overstated.

The Archives have been removed from the library and are now housed in the Andrew Power Centre. Mrs Christina Toller has accepted the challenge of Honorary Archivist and is busily engaged in organizing the collection.

Once again this year I would like to thank all the mothers who are rostered to help in the library each month. They carry out many necessary routine tasks that enable the library to operate smoothly.

### MOCK TRIAL

Year 11 students who took part in this year's Mock Trial Competition found it an enlightening and pleasing experience. The competition is run by the Law Society of New South Wales and consists of two opposing teams of six participants, each of whom perform the roles of a person in court.

Both teams are given the facts relating to one side of a case and meet in a Mock Court, adjudicated by a professional barrister or solicitor. Realism is enhanced by the ability to use the old Criminal Court room in Circular Quay, which our school did for our final round.

Our school took part in four rounds and achieved the following outcomes of the cases (nominal awards):

- \* \$4,000 in damages for a cut thumb
- \* gained the conviction of a shoplifter
- \* successfully defended a client who was sued for \$3,000 in a motor vehicle case

While not winning a round on points, we won three out of four cases. Throughout the competition the spirit was high and preparation times were filled with nervous anticipation. All boys participating were impressed with the realism of the competition and would highly recommend it to others who might be interested.

Several magistrates complimented our team on the level of their preparation and our thanks go to Mrs Katrina Henty, who was our coach, for the time spent helping our team. Fine performances were given by our acting solicitors, Jerry Miara, Frank Vukas and Noel McDermott.

Our witnesses gave highly credible accounts of their stories and failed to crack under severe cross examination; these roles were played by Robert Ruja, Anthony Mirotsos and Anthony Zibara. Our magistrate's clerks were all given perfect scores and congratulations to Peter Grundy, David Macheski and Robespierre Santos.
