Acting Headmaster's Address: *Speech Night 2001*

Acting Headmaster

An address in circumstances such as these must be based on some uncertainties – the Headmaster's condition foremost among them. At this time, our thoughts and prayers are with John Bednall, with Jo and with Peter.

There are uncertainties about tonight – we thank Mrs Hadley for, at short notice, taking the place of the moderator Mrs Burns, who is also ill. One member of the newly appointed student executive is on a delayed flight from Melbourne and may or may not arrive in time. However, with the work and support of the staff backstage and on stage and of the students I am sure that tonight will be a suitable finale to the year.

There is always interest in the uncertainty of length of this address and, without wanting to upset the betting too much, I would like to reflect on four events of 2001.

We began the year celebrating with the class of 2000 their final results. The greatest satisfaction was the overall performance of the entire group - the average TES was the highest for a number of years and the WSA results were most pleasing. The biggest dilemma for a Year 12 student is that university entry and TAFE entry require quite different course selections and that it isn't really possible to have an each way bet. The class of 2000 made sensible subject and course choices and worked to ensure their success in these choices.

Wesley's performances in the major interschool carnivals reflected a spirit and a level of support that really helped our competitors. The improvements in the swimming; the breaking of the Head of the River drought and the progress in athletics are a credit to both those involved as participants and coaches and the encouragement of parents, of other students and of Old Boys. If you weren't at Canning Bridge on 31 March you missed, not only one of the highlights of the year but, the writing of an important chapter in Wesley's sporting history.

Earlier this term I attended the 25th reunion of the class of '76, which was Wesley's first Year 12 group – previously called 5th Year. The class of '76 was my first leaving class and a group with which I still have a particular affinity. At the reunion I took the opportunity to consider something of the uniqueness of Wesley. Many independent schools have strong ex-student connections with gatherings of different years, dinners and so on. Few schools, however, match the mixture of acceptance of understanding, of tolerance and of support for one another that Wesley had in 1976 and I believe still has today. There is a sense of camaraderie in nearly every Old Boy gathering in all schools; Wesley engenders not just the camaraderie but a sense of affection for the school, and most importantly, for the people who are the school community. Long may the spirit of '76 continue.

One of the most moving occasions of the school year occurred on September 12. Most of you were either there, or have heard about the service – in the assembly hall and the candle vigil afterwards. You will have read the student reflections published in the newsletter. As we conclude the school year, as we head our different ways into Christmas and the year ahead, I leave you with the image of Aaron dressed as an American SWOT operative and Abdel, in robes and headdress walking off the stage of the Joseph Green Centre, arms around each others' shoulders, saying we have too much in common and too many things we both enjoy doing for us to waste the opportunities by fighting.

These two young men have left a valuable lesson for us all.



Chairman's Address: Wesley Speech Night 2001

On behalf of the College Council, I welcome you all to the Wesley College Speech Night 2001. Unfortunately the Headmaster Mr Bednall is unwell and cannot be present this evening. He sends his apologies and best wishes.

Speech Night is arguably the most important occasion on Wesley's calendar - an event where we come together to celebrate the achievements of our great School and to pay tribute to our Year 12 leavers for their contribution as student leaders to the life of the School. This event culminates with the handing over of the banners from the departing student leaders to the incoming executive - a poignant moment when we symbolically recognise the achievements of the past year and receive a glimmer of the promise of things to come.

Amongst a number of other successes achieved by this School this year, Wesley's first Head of the River win is truly historic. After a number of near misses over the years, Brenton Jenke and the crew of the First Eight finally did it. Focus, commitment and good coaching paid off. All old boys, students and parents acknowledge your success and the contribution of Rhett Ayliffe as coach.

While still on the subject of sport, I acknowledge the rapid improvement in the performance of the Wesley swimming team under the leadership of coach Nic Watkins. A win at the PSA Interschool swimming in the next couple of years would also be very significant as Wesley has only won the event once before many years ago.

Turning now to College Council activities during 2001, I can report that, in addition to the usual and ongoing matters of school

governance, the following matters should be noted:

Site Development Plan

After an extensive selection process, the College Council recently appointed James Christou & Associates as architects to assist in the refurbishment of the Joseph Green Complex and linkage with a new design and technology building to the east of Joseph Green and in front of the science building. Mr Christou's innovative initial design concepts for those facilities greatly impressed the College Council.

The detailed planning, consultation and tendering still has to occur but it is envisaged that contracts would be awarded towards the end of 2002. The facilities will include performing arts, design and technology and school community catering. It may also include some other uses not yet specified.

These new facilities will be constructed with funding to be provided by the Endowment Fund.

Another project which will be completed during the Christmas Holidays will be the conversion of the Headmaster's residence to a School heritage centre which will house the School archives, museum, teaching area, the OWCA and School Development Office activities. I believe that this Centre will be an important step in preserving the proud heritage of Wesley.

During 2002 the College Council will also be examining the implementation of the second stage of the boarding school development plan which relates to improved

facilities for Years 9 to 11 boarders. The new Residential Services Committee will undertake this work.

Finally, I can report that a Chapel refurbishment plan has been developed and it will be implemented as funding becomes available.

School's History

In February next year, the recently completed School History will be launched. It is called *Honest and Unsullied Days: History of Wesley College*. This work was commissioned in the School's 75th Anniversary Year and has been written by Emeritus Professor Peter Boyce AO, an illustrious old boy of the School.

Council Membership

I am pleased to advise that the Uniting Church Synod recently approved the nominations of two new Council members. They are Leonie Kirke and Carol Devitt. Leonie Kirke is a former parent of the College and a distinguished educator. Carol Devitt is a current boarding parent and a former Rhodes Scholar. She has a business background and is a member of a number of boards, including Western Power.

I look forward to the contribution that each of these outstanding ladies will make to College Council.

Director of Finance

In July this year, Council appointed Mr Tim McIntyre to the newly created position of Director of Finance. Tim is extremely well credentialled and has lost no time in making a strong positive impact on the financial management of the School.

Teachers

A successful School is not just a matter of bricks and mortar. It is the

Headmaster

Before I speak to our Year 12 leavers I would like to acknowledge the ongoing commitment of the Headmaster. He is the educational

leader of the School and its Chief Executive Officer. He drives the quality of the teaching and learning program and also runs a multimillion dollar organisation. It is an enormous task which he performs with a very high standard of professionalism.

I should note that Mr Bednall has now completed his five year contract but has accepted the invitation of College Council to lead us for a further three year term, and, hopefully, beyond.

What is your favourite past time?

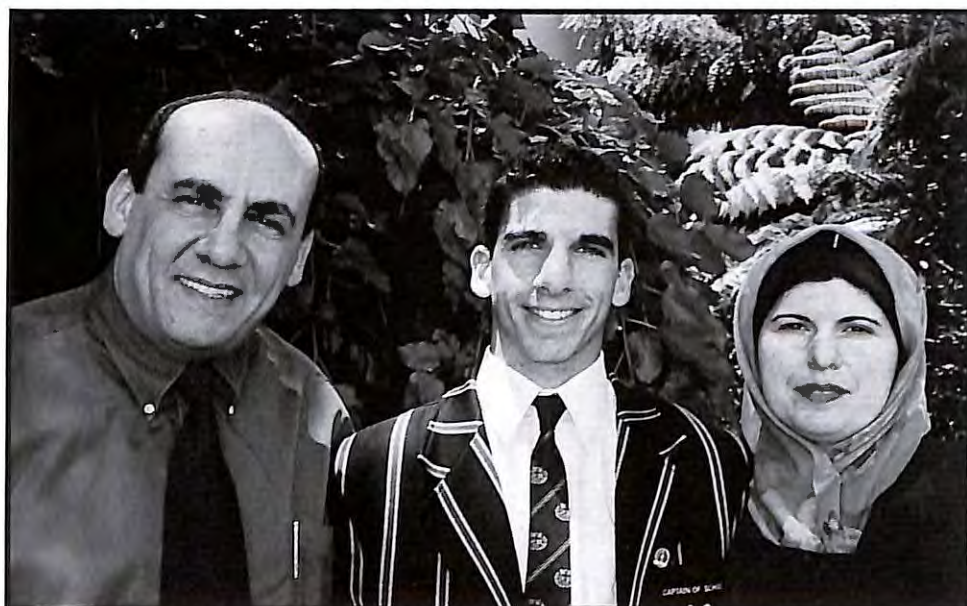

Although Walton did not see any great changes of fortune in the Klem

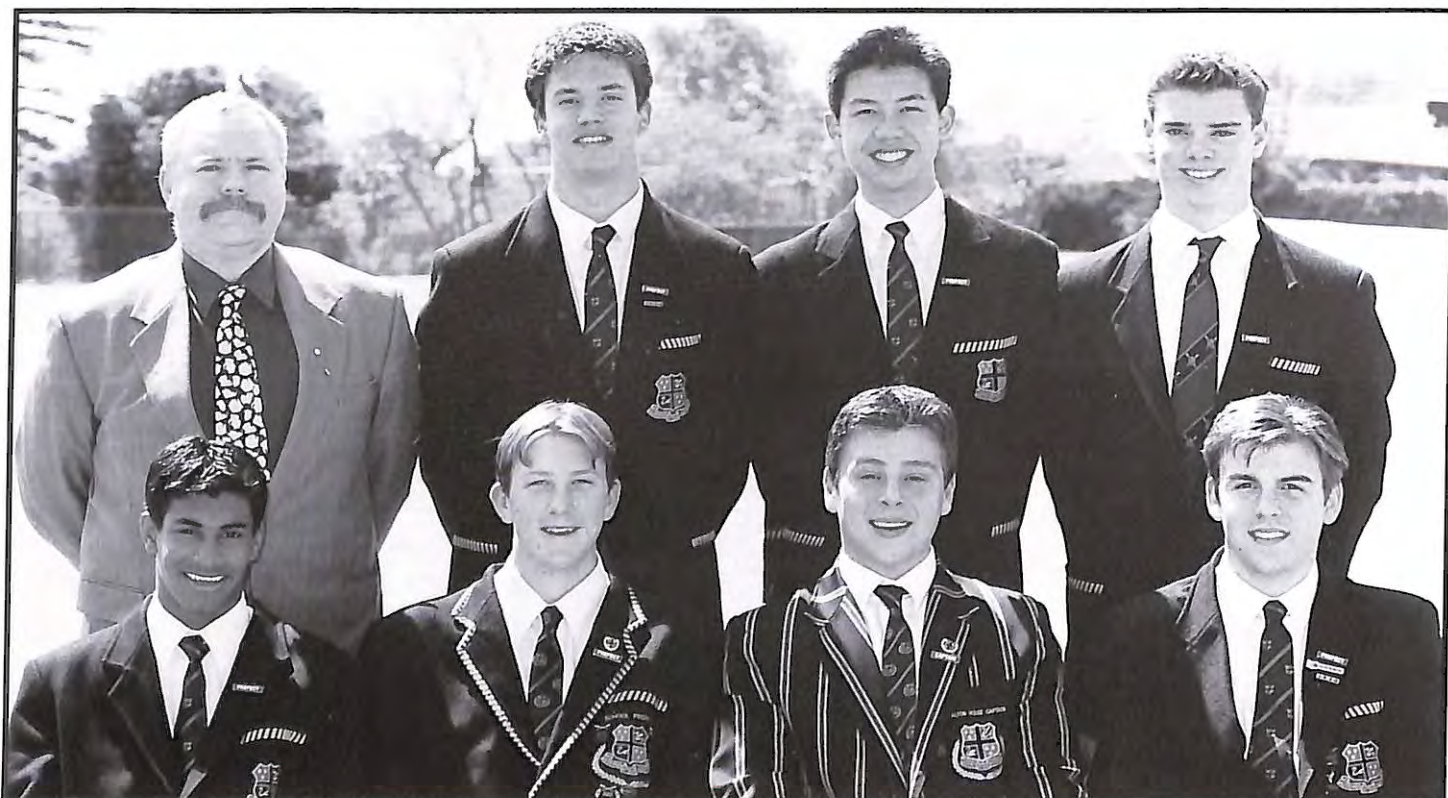

Walton may not currently excel in Klem Cup events, but it does excel in

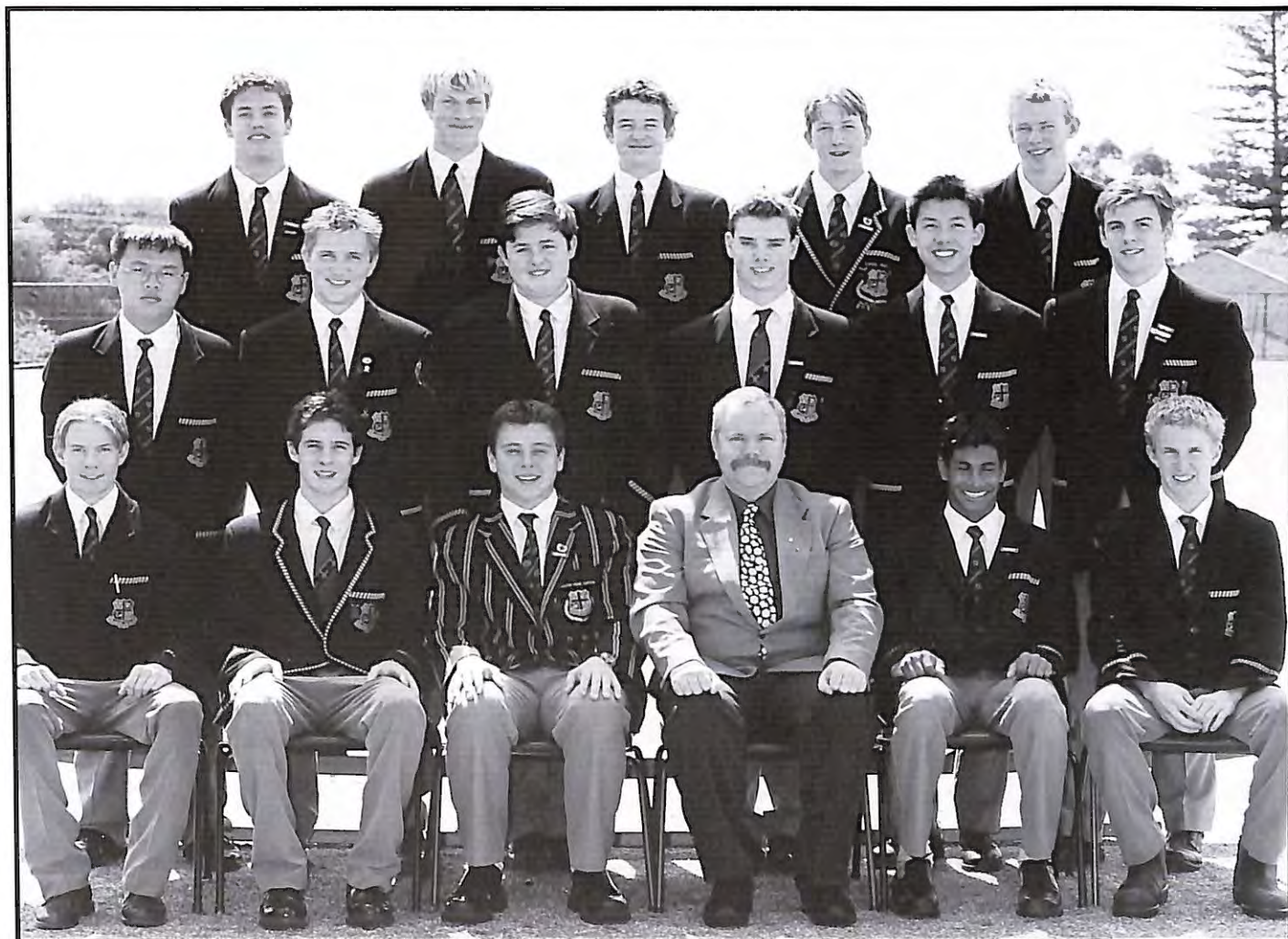

Faculty Reports

ENGLISH FACULTY

This year has been another busy and yet fulfilling and creative year for the English Faculty. Through both classroom-based and external activities, students have had the opportunity to explore and refine their literacy skills, public speaking, debating, creative and analytical writing, film and theatre appreciation and personal reading.

The Perth Festival of Arts figures prominently in our programs and once again provided a rich smorgasbord of events. Year 12 Literature students attended a performance of *Ghosts and Eva Luna* whilst the Year 12 TEE students were treated to a night of song and narrative in the entertaining production of *Alice*. Year 10 students were given the opportunity to step into a different era with the costumes, social context and witty dialogue of *A Servant to Two Masters*. As a result of these experiences, the students were then able to reflect more effectively on how the drama scripts that they studied in class could be transposed to the stage.

Other excursions this year included full day workshops at the Fremantle Literature Centre (Year 10s), a very sobering visit to the Holocaust Centre (Year 11 Senior English) and an informative visit to the Channel 7 News Studios (Year 9 Media).

On campus, the English programs were also enriched by the involvement of guest speakers. As part of a Common Assessment Task, Lt Commander Greg Laxton from the Stirling Base spoke to the Year 12 Senior English students about careers in the Armed Forces. Ken Spillman, the Faculty's Writer-in-Residence, provided students in Years 8 and 10 with creative writing workshops culminating in a competition. Ken judged the entries, selecting Kieran

Chute (10D) as the winner, Dustin Stuart (8J) as second and Ehsan Ramzan (10M) as third. Highly commended were Irza Basrewan (10D) and Tom Sippe (8J). Jared Addison (10G) and Craig Rainbird (10W) were also commended.

Students from Years 3 – 10 also participated in the Australian Schools' English Competition. This year's results were very strong with students presented with 12 certificates of High Distinction, 90 certificates of Distinction and 149 certificates of Credit. All Year 8 – 10 students were also involved in the English Speaking Board examinations, which once again served to highlight the diverse array of passions enjoyed by our students. The examiners and audience were treated to olive oil demonstrations, the art of violin construction, a sign language narrative, the finer points of fishing and even how to make (and eat) rocky road.

However, perhaps one of the most significant highlights of the year has to be Book Week, which engaged students on a number of different levels. English staff, dressed as book characters, launched the week's activities, which included lunch time storytelling sessions run by staff and students, a Year 8 book mark competition and a special Assembly. The pleasure of reading and listening to stories was certainly reinforced throughout the College.

Overall, the energy and enthusiasm of the individual members of the English Faculty have been instrumental in making this yet another successful and productive year in which students have been challenged to engage with literature, film and media in a range of different learning styles.

MATHEMATICS

This was another busy year for students and teachers with many students were involved in national and local competitions. In the Australian Mathematics Competition, the 248 Wesley students from Years 7 to 12 were among 390,000 entrants from 2,530 schools nationwide. Our students again fared well with boys earning 121 certificates of credit, 76 certificates of distinction, 16 certificates of high distinction (i.e. in the top 2% of the state) and two prizes (i.e. in the top 0.3% of the state). Congratulations to all students, but especially to Gerald Storer (9D) and Craig Earl-Spurr (10J), who won prizes in the Intermediate (Year 9 and 10) division. Tim Yates (12D) continued his long and distinguished record in Mathematics competitions by finishing in the top 1% in the very challenging Senior Division.

In the University of New South Wales Mathematics Competition for Primary Schools, Wesley entered 244 students from Years 2 to 7 inclusive. Results in general were very good but two, in particular, were outstanding. Neil Thomas (Year 6) was the top student in the state in his year group as was Benjamin Edwards (Year 3). Each boy received a medal to acknowledge his great achievement.

Another excellent performance was that of the Year 10 team who won the overall competition at the annual Maths Games Camp, run by the Mathematical Association of W.A. The team of Nicholas Cockran (10J), Robert Crawford (10D), Matthew Jenke (10M) and Craig Rainbird (10W) were worthy victors in a class field. In an unrelated achievement, Matthew Jenke was one of 56 students selected statewide to attend the January 2002 science and engineering camp, an annual event organised by the University of W.A.



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In the Math-O-Quest Competition, seven Wesley projects from the Middle and Senior schools were entered for judging at state level. Nick Ward (10J), Peter Platell (10H) and Nicholas Cockran (10J) won second prize for their entry in the topic "Clock, Clock", while Ananth Tayal (10G) and Adam Promnitz (10H) were highly commended for their entry in the topic "Geodesics".

Wesley entered teams in the Have Sum Fun competition and finished an impressive third (out of 38 teams) in the lower secondary event, fourth in the upper secondary event and both first and third (two teams) in the primary section. The winning team was made up of Andrew Barrett-Lennard, David Herbert (both Year 7), Lindon Roberts, Shu Masuda (Year 6), and Timothy Sariaatmadja and Joshua Chong (from Year 5). The students achieving third place included Zac Conduit (Year 7), Neil Thomas, Jaron Stafford, Gareth Doogue (Year 6), and John Gunawan and Steven Lee (from Year 5). In the lower secondary competition, teams must consist of two boys each from Years 8, 9 and 10 with the Wesley representatives being Stephen Barrett (8D), Dustin Stewart (8J), Timothy Oo (9H), Craig Bear (9H), Nicholas Cockran (10J) and Peter Platell (10H). Andrew Plavina (11W), Patrick Salvaris (11M), Aoning Li (11T), Tim Yates (12D), Dennis Nurjadi (12T) and Mark Pazolli (12H) competed for Wesley in the upper secondary competition, in which teams had to have three representatives from each of Years 11 and 12.

Two teams of four boys each competed in the Junior Mathematical Olympiad and found it very challenging. Congratulations to James Eley (9J), Tyson Russell (9G), Brett Cox (9M), James Cameron (9H), Dale Bosenberg (9T), Andrew Lai (9M), Timothy Oo (9H) and Craig Bear (9H).

The Primary Schools Mathematical Olympiad competition is central to mathematics extension program in Years 5 to 7. This year the team of 30 boys worked superbly to achieve a top 1% finish nationally. Three of the boys achieved an outstanding and rare "perfect score". Special congratulations to Lindon Roberts, Shu Masuda and Neil Thomas (all of Year 6) for scoring 100%.

SCIENCE

The Year 2000 Science TEE results again proved pleasing, indicating that our courses in Year 10 and below are providing a firm foundation.

Changes were made to the Year 10-course structure in 2001 to allow the students to choose their Science subjects in Semester 2. Positive feedback from both staff and students indicate that this system allows them to make more informed choices regarding their Year 11 subject selection.

Our assessment system (GASP) for Years 8 to 10 is still the backbone for student success (along with an excellent teaching staff). Other subject areas have shown interest with the possibility of developing a similar system.

Our congratulations go to the following students who fared well in the various science competitions: Jonathan Rumble (12M) gained the Bronze Medal Award in the National Chemistry Olympiad and the Western Australian Silver Medal Award in the Qualifying Final of the Chemistry Olympiad. (Presented by Dr Geoff Gallop, Premier of WA). The following students were presented with medals in the Australian Science Competition (highest result in WA): - Winston Kint (3J), Samuel Parker (4H), Neil

Thomas (6J), Lindon Roberts (6H) and Dustin Stuart (8J).

In the Senior School our new Yabby Aquaculture venture has been a tremendous success along with Aeronautics – a number of Year 11 students have started their flight training as part of their program.

Science continues to flourish in Middle School and Manning House. Our science budget has increased considerably in these schools suggesting that Science is important. Young students are very curious about their 'environment' and frequently like to 'investigate'. They often like to know how or why something does what it does and can be quite surprised when they find out the 'real' reason. This curiosity and interest can be developed (and put to good use!) in a subject such as Science.

Mr Greg Miller from Manning House gives us some insight on how Science is conducted with young students:

Science in Manning house can best be thought of as 'Team Building' experiences. That is, much emphasis is placed on working co-operatively as a group (team). The students are typically provided with materials and resources to investigate and work towards a 'desired outcome' with the teacher playing the role of both leader and guide. Lessons are also adapted to suit both individual and class needs. However, the attainment of the 'desired outcome' does not determine whether the Science lesson was successful. Rather, how did the team go about achieving their resulting outcome? If, for example, a team did not experience the expected results during a particular lesson, the teacher and team can work through a wide range of issues, such as – were all the instructions carried out correctly?; did each student work well in the team?; did each team member do

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what they were supposed to do?; was the equipment used correctly?; and so on. Through such investigations students can see why the 'desired outcome' was achieved and perhaps, why not?

Whilst undertaking the lessons, students will also develop a wide range of skills. By working as a team, for example, they develop communication and leadership skills. Other skills (where appropriate) include recording of information, describing, observing, comparing, explaining, and so on. Many of these skills are used in other subject areas.

Manning House also held three Science Nights this year in which students from K – 4 attended. In addition, some great SPECTRA Science projects were displayed in the Junior Library.

Mr Shawn Stone provided the Middle School with some interesting Science through the 2001 Science Fair. On Wednesday the 2nd of August the Middle School held their annual science fair. As part of the Science Curriculum the boys in Year 7 had to complete an experiment, investigation or invention with two girls from Penrhos College. The students were given a reasonable amount of time to complete their experiments over Term Two. They worked with the girls from Penrhos College and shared e-mail, class work, and homework experiences.

During the term the groups were closely monitored through timelines and teacher checks of the boys' progress. On the day of the fair students set up their work from early in the morning so other students within the school, and surrounding communities could view them. Middle school teachers, students and parents appeared very impressed with the standard of work presented. During morning recess and lunch, many students from Manning house

and the Senior School came down and examined the experiments. Altogether the day went without a hitch considering there were over 40 different experiments on display during the day.

All of the boys were winners with school awards going to a variety of different experiments and displays in the year group. Well done! A special thank you to all those who worked very hard to prepare the science fair and helped make it a very successful day.

In closing, this year was a scientific highlight for most of the boys. They worked tremendously hard on their projects and produced standards of a very high quality. It is very pleasing to see the boys enjoy themselves as they explore, discover and inquire about the world they live in. The year presented great opportunities for individuals, as well as group co-operation in achieving many scientific and social outcomes. It has been a very pleasing and rewarding year as the progression of scientific understanding and application is reflected in the standard of their work from start to finish.

As you can see, Science is alive and well at Wesley. We look forward to 2002 with high expectations.

SOCIETY AND ENVIRONMENT REPORT

Ms Keryn Zeeb and Ms Katie Young accepted offers of permanency on the staff at the beginning of the year. We are indeed privileged to gain the services of two extremely competent and talented professionals. Mrs Kathy Krajcar accepted the position as subject co-ordinator of Politics and Legal Studies. Mrs Janelle McGann took long service leave during Semester Two and we were indeed fortunate to attract Mrs Catherine White to fill the position, one that

she did with great enthusiasm and dedication. We will be sad to farewell Mrs White but we also look forward to Mrs McGann's tales of life in the United States, upon her return next year.

All Society and Environment teachers completed a very detailed audit of their courses during the year. The audit cross-referenced the K to Year 10 course contents and concepts with Curriculum Framework. It is pleasing to note that our courses address fully the legislated requirements of Curriculum Framework. The course changes implemented over the past few years have contributed in no small measure to this finding, with concepts and outcomes being a major focus to our programs.

Once again Wesley students performed with distinction in state and national competitions. This year 116 students competed in the Australian Geography Teachers Association Competition. In the Over 14 years of age section, five students received the same excellent mark: Cameron Jones (10T), Colin Graham (10G), Gareth Cox-Martin (10J), Keenan Edinger (10M) and Mathew Lyons (10J) were all in the top 3.5% of the 39,442 Australasian students who entered the competition. Another 6 students received high distinctions being within the top 10% of all competitors. James Little (9J) was a very clear stand-out in the Under 14 section with a mark placing him in the top 1.5% of the 14,402 competitors and, pleasingly, 7 students received high distinctions in this section.

Fifty-five Year 11 and 12 participated in the Australasian AMP Economics Competition. Ten students received high distinctions whilst nine distinctions were awarded. Abdel Ildayhid (12G) and Aoning Li (11T) received prizes. Three groups of four



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Year 12 students competed in the Murdoch University Economic Forecasting Competition. These teams had to forecast a number of key Australian economic indicators six months ahead such as GDP inflation and unemployment. These competitions are an excellent means of developing skills and interests beyond the usual class work.

Ms Zeeb, in conjunction with Mrs Jane Graham from the library, undertook a Teaching and Learning Project that used WebQuest as the framework for a research topic on Australia's Federation in her Year 9 classes. They worked in groups, with each group representing one of Australian colonies. After researching reasons for and against federation, each student gave a speech at a mock Federation Convention where they subsequently voted on the federation proposal.

The traditional Year 12 Geography field trips to the town of Northam and a crop livestock farm ("Paradym Farm"), Alcoa's bauxite mine at Huntly and the guided tour of the land use zones of Perth were well received and greatly appreciated by the students. Ms Lesley Affleck, from the Department for Planning, spoke to the students about the factors affecting the nature, characteristics and direction of Perth's growth. Her PowerPoint presentation was an excellent summary of this section of the course.

Another of the traditions in the Society and Environment faculty is the Year 11 Geography Camp to Rottneest. The camp is an excellent way to fulfil the course's fieldwork requirements and for students to revise and consolidate topics studied throughout the year. It was a tiring experience but the students worked diligently for four days and completed a number of assessment pieces. When, at 11.45pm, one has to ask students to stop writing their

reports and to go to bed, despite working most of the day, one has the feeling that the experience and outcomes are highly valued.

Earlier in the year the Year 11 Geographers travelled between North Fremantle and Hillarys Boat Harbour to conduct their coastal field studies. This gave the students an opportunity to observe a range of coastal features and processes as well as human impact on the coastline.

The Year 10 Geographers were involved in a number of activities beyond the classroom. A number of students studied Booragoon Lake, identifying the elements affecting the quality of water in an environmentally sensitive Swan Coastal Plain interdunal lake. Later in the year Mr Justin Sauvage, from the Department of the Environmental Protection, spoke to the students about strategies related to caring for the environment through implementing sound recycling techniques and principles.

Year 9 students had a busy year visiting the Fremantle Maritime Museum, Parliament House, Perth's underground water supply treatment works and waste-water treatment works, and studied the alternative locations for the Convention/Exhibition Centre and a soccer stadium in Perth. The annual visit from the Class Act Theatre Company once again proved entertaining as they retold the history of Western Australia to all Year 9s.

Two Aboriginal elders visited the Middle School during the year providing students with the opportunity to study Aboriginal culture in Semester One. The "cleansing" ceremony smoked the entire Middle School building as well as having an effect on the Senior Campus. The elders short, but worthwhile, stay brought about a

broader appreciation of their culture. Similar activities are planned for next year. Aboriginal elder, Mr Boori Pryor visited late in the year and performed and spoke to all Years 5 to 8 on his books, his life and issues affecting Aborigines today.

As part of the Year 5 course on the study of the local environment, the students visited the Old Mill and Heritage House in South Perth as part of the Heritage Trail. They also went to the WA Museum where spoken to by an Aboriginal Education Officer about past and current issues affecting aborigines. Such visits are always wonderful learning experiences for the students as they reinforce topics and concepts addressed in their classwork.

2001 has been a very busy year in Manning House. Many topics are studied throughout the year as part of their integrated curriculum and a few highlights are outlined below. The Kindergarten children have been initiating play and learning to become more independent, while discovering the importance of family and rules in the classroom. The Pre-Primary children have been busy discovering how important sharing is and how to play together outside while abiding by the rules so everyone stays safe.

Water conservation is an integral part of the Year 1s learning while also looking at the different cultures that make up this great nation. The Year 2s investigate themselves and what their needs and wants are as well as their likes and dislikes. They also investigating the rain forests and what trees have been used for in the past and present, and is an area of great interest.

Traditions, family and change make up the Year 3 program while looking at how buildings have formed and changed over the years. The Year 4s love the space topic in their final year

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in Manning House and then enjoy finding out about the earth and all the countries and continents that make up this amazing planet.

Finally, I wish to express my thanks to the Subject and School Coordinators, Mr David King (Economics), Mr Mal Poole (History), Ms Kathy Krajcar (Politics and Legal Studies), Mr Brad Hilliard (Middle School) and Mr Campbell Madden (Manning House) for their assistance in the administrative duties and curriculum development that have occurred throughout this very busy, yet productive, year.

DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY FACULTY REPORT

The year has been a particularly busy and successful one for the department. Mr Warren O'Neill has settled in well and is making a good contribution to the department and with the ever-enthusiastic Mr Howlett they make a great team developing Woodwork in the school. It is not uncommon to see boys working at lunchtime, after school, evenings and holidays, such is their enthusiasm for their work.

Mr Keenan has joined the department on a part-time basis to teach Middle School classes in Years 7 and 8 and his classes are also full of very keen Woodwork and Metalwork students often working well through recess and lunchtimes. Numbers opting for Design and Technology in Year Nine are very high with good numbers of boys following through to Year 12.

Work was displayed in two exhibitions this year with the boys putting on a very impressive collection of work at the Wesley Art Festival and many people described the work as being "good enough for

a Margaret River exhibition". The pick of the presented work was Andrew Shearing's (12C) 'Wrought Iron Garden Table' which also won him the award of "The Top Secondary Student" in 'The Value Adding Quest' Competition which was open to any school in the state and this table was later displayed at the Furniture Expo in Wembley along with a jarrah hall table that Andrew also made and a jarrah cabinet made by Scott Miller (12W).

There were numerous other excellent items made in the department this year – Todd Fotheringhame (12C) did some excellent work in wood, so too did Chris Evans (12W), Chris Klatt (12W), Scott Pickering (12H), Fabien Bauwens (11G), Simon Jodrell (10H), Ryan Brogmus (11T) to name just a few.

Simon Hyde (12H) was the top student in Technical Graphics and produced some excellent work, as well as other good work being done by Michael Wylde (12W), Brad Hall (11C), Kenichi Tonokura (11C) and Simon Armstrong (11J).

Numbers in Technical Graphics continue to grow as boys see the benefits and opportunities that this subject offers them in their own personal development as well as possible job opportunities and career paths.

In line with the schools 'Teaching and Learning' program there was some excellent work done involving several year groups in the production of a project; the Year 3 students produced the idea, Year 9 students developed the design of the idea and Year 10 students constructed these ideas in the workshop to end up with the finished product. All three year groups enjoyed the interaction of working with students of different age groups.

The Department continues to expand with five staff now teaching the

subject and discussion is still taking place on the proposed new building or upgrade of the present one.

Future Problem Solving

The Future Problem Solving Program at Wesley College was first offered to a small group of Year Six boys in 1999 and has continued to grow and flourish. In 2002, we will have boys in Years 5 to 9 involved at both competitive and non-competitive levels, in all three sections of this outstanding program.

"Future Problem Solving" is an internationally respected educational program and competition for students from Years 3 – 12. It focuses on the development of creative thinking skills and in particular, it focuses on the skills of problem identification and the creation of positive solutions to those problems. Above all, it aims to give young people the skills to "design and promote positive futures" for the society in which they live.

The program encourages creativity amidst teamwork, systematic and critical thought, and the development of a lateral outlook on real-world situations. It has a heavy emphasis on research and knowledge.

The challenging materials of the Future Problem Solving Program are designed to help students learn how to think (not what to think). Although many of the scenarios encountered are based exclusively in the future, the problem solving methods employed are equally applicable to many of the complexities encountered in the world today.

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Future Problem Solving allows great scope for creative and futuristic thinking and encourages students not only to analyse and synthesise the information they have before them, but also to express their ideas in a cohesive, fluent manner.

For the successful FPS team, teamwork, critical thinking, decision-making and time management are all vital skills.

The National Finals

In 2001 our Year Eight team made the National Finals of the competition beating several hundred of the best teams from around the country and then achieving a top ten place in the Nationals.

Congratulations to Peter Anthonisz (8M), Stephen Barrett (8D), Jeremy Francis (8H), Dustin Stuart (8J) and Simon Treadgold (8D) for their outstanding performance. The boys and some new team members have chosen to continue with FPS as an elective in 2002 and are directing their energies towards reaching the International Finals in 2003 or 2004.

Our teams in Year 6 and in Year 7 are looking forward to their program in 2002 and have set themselves the challenge of reaching the National Finals. We wish all the boys luck.

It's Academic

Congratulations to Colin Graham (10G), Craig Earl-Spurr (10J), Sarun Kunakool (10W) and Matt Jenke (10M) (reserve) who so ably represented Wesley College in the reborn "It's Academic".

Thirty boys who identified themselves as having a chance took place in a series of selection trials, demonstrating very clearly the depth of general knowledge evident in our College. Many thanks to all those boys who stayed on to support the final four.

The boys were unfortunate to meet one of eventual grand finalists in their first outing. Even then they were highly competitive, and their final score would have been enough to beat almost all other teams in the competition.

The World Of Trivia (General Knowledge Competition)

Congratulations to nine boys in Year 6 and 7, for their outstanding effort in the World of Trivia (General Knowledge) competition. The teams competed against the best from around the state and performed exceptionally well.

The Year 6 team of general knowledge experts; Richard Anthonisz (6M), Scott Ingram (6D), Lindon Roberts (6H), and Neil Thomas (6J) won the State Finals of the Competition. They competed against the top teams from over 50 schools and emerged victorious. Not only did they receive superb medallions, and a trophy for the school, but also \$1200 for the purchase of books for the library and the Future Problem Solving program.

Our boys from Year 7 also had a tremendous day. Four boys – Callum Ponton (7H), Matthew Woodall (7D), Andrew Barrett-Lennard (7D) and Shanek Wickramasinghe (7M) – made it through the Qualifying Finals, competing against over 60 of the best teams available. At that point unfortunately, Callum and Andrew had another commitment (the State Finals of the Dance Sport competition – more congratulations). They were replaced by David Herbert (7M). Unfortunately, our fourth member was unable to make it. Matthew, Shanek and David performed superbly at quite a disadvantage to achieve a wonderful fourth place – one point behind the three teams who drew for first place.

The Mathematics Extension Program

Some 50 students in Years 5, 6 and 7 enjoy the challenge of the very rigorous mathematics enrichment program which has been designed to develop problem solving skills, and mathematical intuition and flexibility. The quality and level of participation serves to highlight just how many tremendously talented young mathematicians we have at Wesley College.

Have Sum Fun

This year Wesley College entered two teams of six boys from Years 5, 6 and 7 in the annual "Have Sum Fun" mathematics competition. They enjoyed an afternoon of fun and challenge at Penrhos College, where they competed against teams from around the city.

Congratulations to David Herbert (7M) and Andrew Barrett-Lennard (7D) Shu Masuda (6M) and Lindon Roberts (6H), Joshua Chong (5D) and Timothy Sariaatmadja (5M). These boys were the outright winners across the metropolitan area.

Congratulations to Zac Conduit (7M), Jaron Stafford (6H), Gareth Doogue (6W) and Neil Thomas (6J), Steven Lee (5D) and John Gunawan (5J). These boys achieved a fantastic third place – in the south metropolitan region – (they were only one point from second place) and came fifth in the whole competition.

The Australian Primary Schools Mathematical Olympiads

The competition runs over five months and consists of five papers each with five questions – a total of 25 questions. Last year some 28,139 students from around the country competed and of those only 43 achieved a perfect score. This year at Wesley, three Year 6 students achieved the perfect score.

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Congratulations Shu Masuda (6M), Lindon Roberts (6H) and Neil Thomas (6J). These are outstanding results.

There were several others who came so very close, including Andrew Barrett-Lennard (7D) (24), David Herbert (7M) (23), Shanek Wickramasinghe (7M) (22), Zac Conduit (7M) (22), Gareth Doogue (6W) (21) and a "special mention" to Lachy Astfalck (5G) (19) who is only in Year 5.

The team, as a whole, performed remarkably well and is likely to be in the top 1 – 2 % of teams from around the country.

LIBRARY REPORT

A successful year in the Library is not measured in terms of premierships, championships or, indeed, being Head of anything. Rather, our successes are much more difficult to measure. On average, 200 books are borrowed each day with almost constant use of the Internet in the library. Our aim is

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LANGUAGES OTHER THAN ENGLISH

Although Australia is one of the most multi-cultural countries in the world, there was for many years a resistance within the general community to learning a Language other than English (LOTE). Learning a second language was seen as enjoyable but not particularly relevant to a nation of English-speaking island dwellers. The present policy of compulsory LOTE in state schools from Years 3 - 10 is a government initiative to redress this situation and enable Australia to become more competitive in the world market.

In 2001 the Wesley LOTE staff once again energetically took up the challenge of making learning a second language both stimulating and relevant for their students. The success of the LOTE learning program bears testament to their commitment. This year the new programs established in 2000 were consolidated and existing programs were modified, extended or refined. The staff remained unchanged, but French students very much enjoyed time spent with Mme Fraize during Mme Creewel's absence on Long Service Leave in Term 4. Some highlights of the 2001 LOTE programs are listed below.

French

For Year 1s, their first taste of LOTE came alive with the help of Madame Broun. They sang, danced and 'hand-jived' to learn new vocabulary. They made cards for Pâques and Noël as well as decorations to hang on their trees at home.

Years 7 and 8 enjoyed working with the interactive 'Language Market' computer program. Year 8s again exchanged penpal letters with Penrhos College students. The boys who had been on the Tour de France trip in 2000 continued to correspond

with friends they had made in France. Years 10 - 12 visited the 'Monet' exhibition and participated successfully in the Alliance Francaise examinations, for which Kade Brown (11J) was among the top performers in the state. M. Laurent, the French assistant, worked enthusiastically with all French classes. Of course all students enjoyed sampling French cuisine – crêpes for Mardi Gras and croque-monsieurs.

A very special event was the week of chapel services which Year 12 students organised and conducted. It was wonderful to see students from Year 1, and Years 8 – 12 participating in this special service.

German

For Year 2s the versatile Madame Broun became Frau Broun and the students delighted in her puppets, rhymes, songs, hand-jiving, hand-crafts and particularly the Advent celebrations. Parents appreciated their 'Frohe Ostern' and 'Frohe Weihnachten' cards and were eager to become part of the excitement of the German classes themselves.

Year 7s each made a Hampelmann as part of their study of the body. They also enjoyed working with 'The Language Market', as did the Year 8 students. Years 8 and 9 corresponded with German students at Penrhos and then joined them for dinner at the Alpine restaurant. Years 10 – 12 practised their conversation skills at Miss Maud's with Frau Cooke and students from Penrhos and St Mary's. All students had the opportunity to sample Pfannkuchen for Rosenmontag and other Deutsche Spezialitaeten. Particularly interesting were the creative Brezeln baked by Year 10s with the kind help of the kitchen staff at the Boarding House!

Students from years 8 – 11 appreciated the input of Harald Ohlendorf (the Language Advisor

from South Australia) and Rudolf Neutze helped Year 12 students develop their conversation skills. Years 10 and 11 attended the International Film Festival and then had lunch together.

Students from Years 9 – 12 again acquitted themselves very well in the DAS (Deutsch-Australischer Sprachverein) examinations, gaining a first prize (Coli Nurimba 12T), a third prize (Thomas Freeman 9G), 5 High Distinctions and 7 Distinctions. Daniel Tarkowien from Hamburg spent the year as a guest of the Wheatley family and Les Edwards (11H) and Andrew Silvan (11D) joined students from St Mary's AGS and Penrhos on the Deutsch in Deutschland 2001 tour.

Indonesian

Year 3 students visited Perth Zoo to see a production of "Orangutastic" by the Hayman Theatre Company and Years 3 and 4 together with the Year 3 Penrhos class enjoyed a performance by the Melbourne company - Musik Kabau.

Year 4s organised a Money Trail, involving all students from Kindy to Year 4, in order to raise money to continue their adoption of an Orangutan and Sumatran tiger from Perth Zoo. They were also able to donate \$80 to the new Orangutan enclosure. Both Year 4 classes listened to a talk at the zoo about S.E. Asian endangered animals and visited the Asian Rainforest. They participated in a kite-making workshop with Michael Alvares and an Exotic Fruit tasting afternoon.

Year 5s made Wayang Kulit and Wayang Golek puppets and performed puppet plays at South Kensington primary school where they also taught Congklak.

Year 6s enjoyed several joint activities with Penrhos College: the exchange of letters and Christmas cards, a visit

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to Penrhos to teach the girls to play Congklak and to take part in an Indonesian dance workshop and a meal at the Sparrow restaurant. They also sold drinks at the Interschool Athletics carnival to raise \$100 for the organisation "Orang-u-friends". The whole event - making posters, presenting information at assembly and for the Newsletter, manning the drinks stall, ordering the drinks - was organised by the students themselves.

Year 7s created their own weather reports and filmed them. Years 8 and 9 exchanged letters with students from Perth College and enjoyed an evening meal with their penpals at the Sparrow restaurant. Year 9s constructed model houses.

Year 10s wrote a film script and performed it, produced a storybook and competed in an Indonesian cooking competition. They took part in the National Bank Languages competition and achieved excellent results. Some Year 10 students took part in a cultural (and eventful!) trip with Bu The to Penang. Years 11 and 12 attended the Cultural Festival at Curtin University and worked with Ibu Indrawati to improve their conversation skills. All students had many opportunities to sample authentic Indonesian dishes.

2001 was a full and satisfying year, but plans are already underway for new activities in 2002: eg. Mesdames Creewel and Broun will escort a French tour to Dinan and Frau Cooke will lead the 2002 Deutsch in Deutschland tour to Austria and Germany.

In Manning House a fully integrated values program was taught across all year groups. This was supplemented in Year 4 by Dr Millett, who took both classes once a week all year.

After a shaky start because of resignation and illness, the year has been one of consolidation for Philosophy and Ethical Inquiry. The program continues to attract strong interest from outside the College and Dr Millett has responded to a number of invitations to address conferences and meetings on the progress of Philosophy and Ethical Inquiry at Wesley.

The appointment of another staff member for 2002 augurs well for the continued growth and development of philosophy at Wesley.

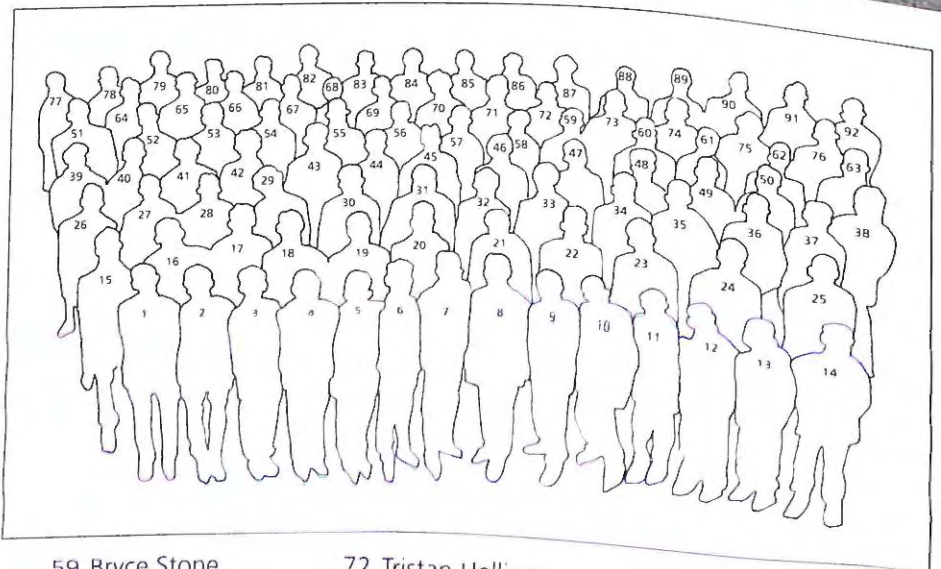

With the successes of previous years, the Wesley Badminton Team of 2001 has striven to continue the dominance in Badminton which the college proudly holds.

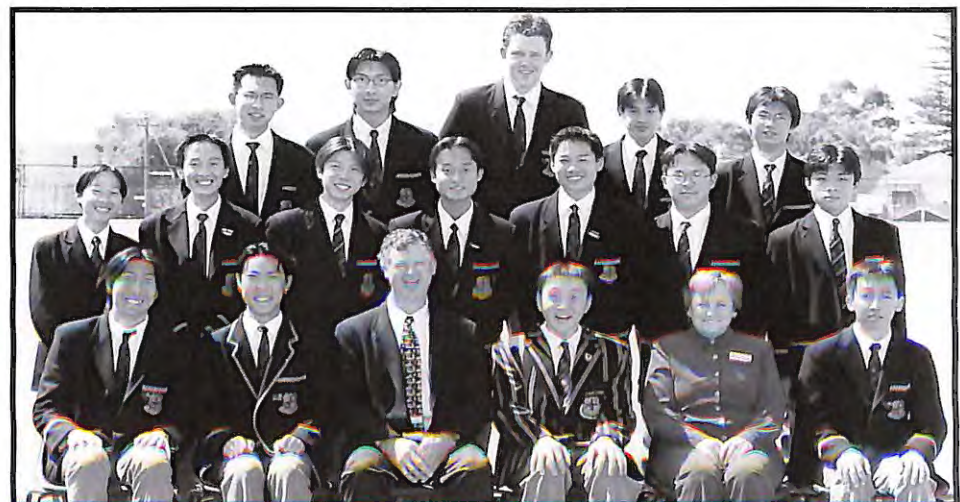

SWIMMING

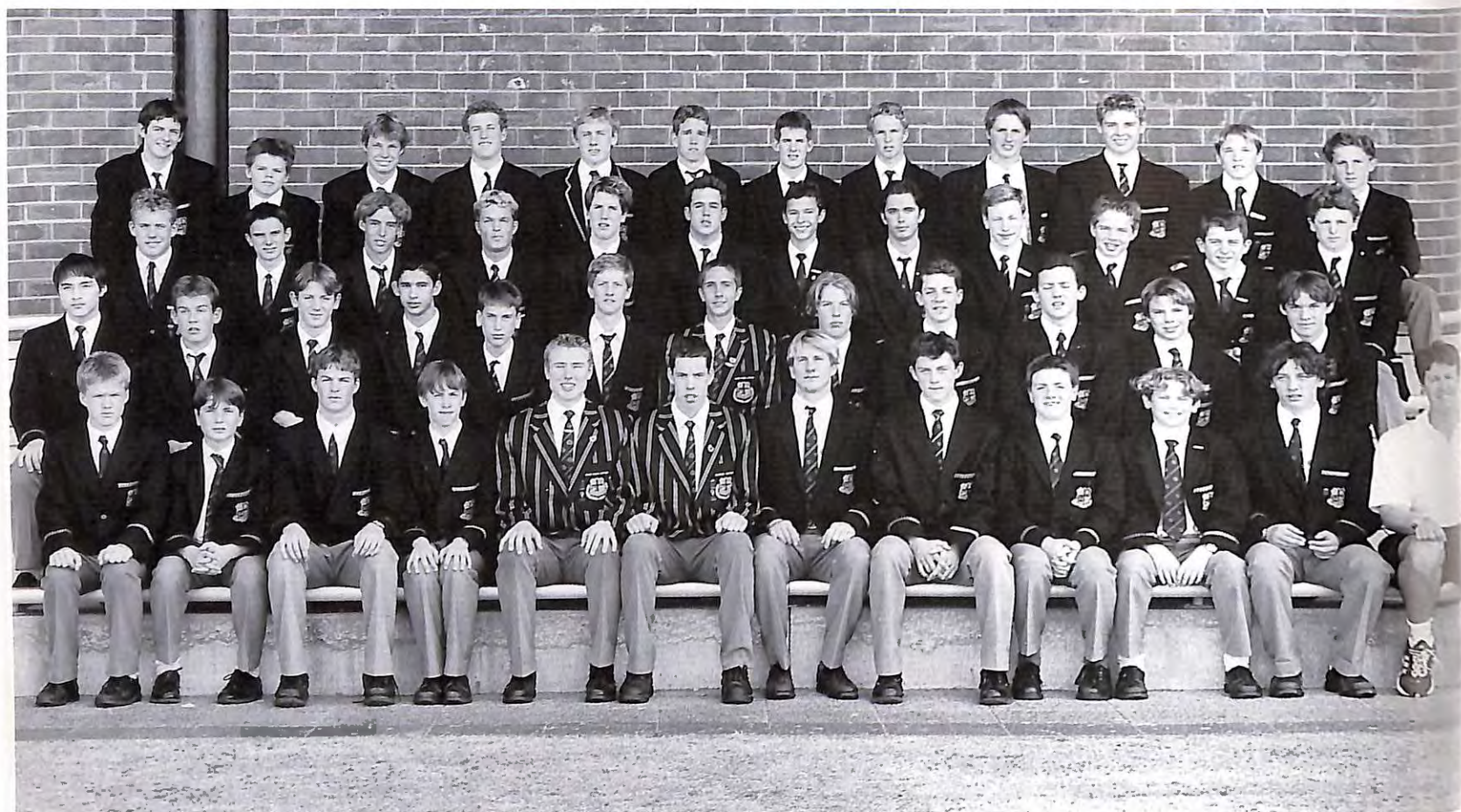
As always, our swimming season started with high hopes for a move up the inter school ladder and this year we weren't disappointed.

CRICKET TOUR TO ENGLAND AND THE NETHERLANDS – JULY 2001

On June 30th 2001, fourteen boys and two staff members set off for England on the Cricket tour of a lifetime.

We visited The Oval to see a county match between Surrey and Lancashire and to Lords where Middlesex were playing Sussex, and after two days of sightseeing in London, including going on the world's biggest Ferris wheel—the London Eye, we travelled to Kent for our first match against Sevenoaks School.

Some excellent swing bowling by Tom McIntyre (4/30) and Callum Ginks (2/12) saw us dismiss Sevenoaks for 137. We set out for our first win on English soil and with

Scott Marshall scoring 50* and Nick Sayer 30, we passed the Sevenoaks score with just four wickets down. Our next match against our hosts, Whitgift School, resulted in a win by 96 runs; Tom McIntyre again in the action making 50 in our score of 194 and Whitgift replied with 98.

The London leg of the tour over, we travelled to Dorset to play Clayesmore School. Wesley batting first scored 7/177 from 35 overs and dismissed Clayesmore for 59.

We then played Victoria College, a school from the Channel Island of Jersey and this resulted in a draw. On a soft wicket we struggled early but recovered to reach 6/244, Wegecsanyi scoring 96 and Cameron Taylor 46*. Some good batting from the Victoria College boys took them to 3/152 before Stephen Fitzgerald claimed 5 wickets for 10 runs to have them 9/170 at the close.

Our next stop of the tour was at Taunton School in Somerset for our 4-day cricket festival. The teams for this festival included St. Bedes from Melbourne, The Sunil Gavaskar Foundation XI from Calcutta, and the host school, Taunton.

The first day was claimed by bad weather—no play. Despite the second day being as bleak, we played a 35 over game and batting first, Cam Taylor and Nick Sayer put on 66 runs for the opening stand, with the final score reaching 7/158. Taunton were dismissed for 107 with Shane Terrace taking 3/12, well supported by Tom McIntyre, Ben Thornton and Tarquin Van Rooyen who took two wickets each.

Our second match of the festival was played against the touring side from India who were a very strong side. In an innings where our top score was 23 we were routed for 90 by some good quality pace and freakish spin bowlers, losing the game by 6 wickets.

Our game against St. Bedes was another 35 over game where attacking cricket ruled the day. After losing the toss we were put in the field and were looking down the barrel of a huge score with St. Bedes cruising at 2/55 after 8 overs. However, some tight bowling from Wes Lind with 4/15 saw them collapse to be all out for 112. We got off to a bad start at 1/1, but good batting by Steffan Wegecsanyi and Cam Taylor took the score to 40 and we passed their total for the loss of only 3 wickets with Wega finishing with 42 and Callum Ginks with a handy 29*.

Our next game in Kent was against a Tunbridge Wells representative XI. On a very picturesque 'village green' they posted a huge total of 270 off just 40 overs, the pick of the bowlers being Wega taking 3/38. Everyone had written us off when we were 4/64 after 18 overs but Stephen Fitzgerald came to the crease and hit 101 off just 75 balls which included 6 sixes and 11 fours. Unfortunately our score of 259 wasn't enough to get us over the line but it was a great game of cricket on a lovely ground.

The last two matches in England were played against Surrey representative sides. Against a league XI we won by 7 wickets, passing their score of 113 in 18 overs and then won an entertaining 20 over game by six runs. A few addresses were exchanged after this game which was played in good spirit and all agreed it was fun to get away from the seriousness of competitive cricket and play one of the most enjoyable games on tour.

Despite the laid back game of the previous day we were all ready to take on a much stronger Surrey invitation XI—the strongest side we would play on tour. They batted well amassing 4/276 from their 55 overs leaving us with a huge total to chase. We started our chase in stylish

fashion with Ginks hitting the first ball of the innings for 4 but then things went down from there with Wesley being all out for 182. Ben Thornton with 33 providing the only resistance.

Well, that was the end of the England leg of the tour and we were off to the sunny land of Holland...at least we thought it was sunny.

After the 45-minute flight we stayed in our Hotel Ann Zee on the beachfront in classy Noordwijk. A few boys went for a walk into town to see the markets while others were happy to have a stroll along the beach.

The next morning we travelled to Blumendaal Cricket Club to play our first match on the hessian matting. The weather was looking bleak for this game against the Dutch u/19 team but play was scheduled to start at the normal time. All was going well until we realised that no one had brought the kit bags to the ground, so we were put in the field and after a rain-interrupted innings we had them all out for 168. The main contributor being Stephen Fitzgerald who took 3/33 off 10. We started our run chase but were soon halted by rain and called the game off at 2/40.

Our second match in Holland was against the National u/17 'B' XI and even though some of the lads were a tad distracted by the girls at the bar we won the game by 125 runs; Leif Powis scoring 100* in our total of 252 and bowling them out for 127. After saying our last goodbyes we set off for our last night in Noordwijk, which was fun for all.

Another early morning and another hour bus ride to The Hague Cricket Club where we were scheduled to play our last game on tour and the Year 12s last game for the school. Excitement and also a little sadness dominated the day for the senior

boys. We started late due to rain and shortly after play started we found ourselves struggling at 2/16 with both openers being dismissed cheaply. Callum Ginks and Steffan Wegecsanyi took the score to 90 with their scores being 38 and 40 respectively. We then lost a few more quick wickets to be looking down the barrel at 7/122 until Stephen Fitzgerald (40) and Tom McIntyre (24) steadied the ship, giving us a defendable target of 185. We ended our tour on a winning note having the inexperienced Dutch side all out for 117, Wegecsanyi finishing with 3/29 and Wes Lind 3/32.

After the game we had a match of another sort when a soccer ball was produced and as expected the Dutch side had a win, but the "Ozzies" put up a good fight to go down narrowly, 4-3. After a kick of the footy we retired to the balcony of the clubrooms to watch the seniors game being played. 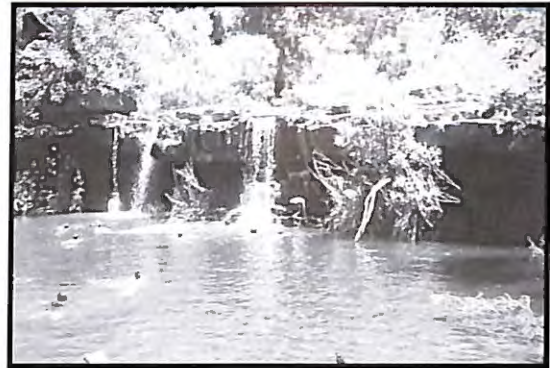

DRAMA STUDIES

Drama studies made the quantum leap this year when a small group of Wesley students presented themselves for both Practical and Written components for TEE in Drama Studies. It was a statement by the students themselves that Drama, and Drama Studies, was easing itself, albeit at a low profile, in transition from extracurricular to mainstream curriculum at Wesley.

Going "main stream" was indeed the keynote of an extremely busy year for Drama, for all concerned. We had found our home and haven in what is now known affectionately by all of us in Performing Arts as the "Black and White Studio," also known as known as Performing Arts 3 and 4. To venture from this and make a foray into other venues and indeed the bigger Joseph Green Centre for our main production-Lionel Bart's *Oliver* was a decision not easily reached, and one which required a lot of planning. But first to matters Greek!

FIFTH ANNUAL GREEK AND ROMAN DIONYSIA

We were tentative about participating in the main stream of open and tough competition in this annual festival, which was hosted at Shenton College. Apart from happening right in the middle of our major production, its demands would, I knew, take its toll on students, already committed to taking leading roles in *Oliver*. Not to be daunted, I was enormously encouraged when the year 11 Drama students fronted up by Jeffery Fowler and Garreth Bradshaw insisted that we take it on board. I listened to them as they insisted that they knew the competitive levels and owing to the fact that they had come very close to winning in the previous year that they were very anxious to go ahead again. Prudent stewardship

was hopefully again offered, and the rehearsal schedule and countdown began.

About the festival – It is largely the brainchild of Doctor Judith Maitland, Department of Classics and Ancient History and UWA. It calls all secondary students in the greater metropolitan area and far beyond to "Prepare and present a 10 minute extract of comedy and tragedy," in keeping with the format of the great Dionysia in ancient Athens. The fact that the entries comply with tasks 1 and 6 of the set assessment program for Drama means that some schools use this and only this as their main public platform and invest enormous time and resources into their participation. Ray Omedei, one of Perth's prestigious directors adjudicates this happening, and it is a really tough and highly competitive affair. The main challenge lies in the area of how the students interpret the dramas in a contemporary yet meaningful way, for themselves. Jeffery Fowler had already set to work during the long summer break and the scripts were well in readiness.

We arrived at Shenton Park on the day, and went through all the heats in one exhausting day. Garreth Bradshaw, black-shirted with a dark military tunic and a very commanding Oedipus won the day. Jeffery Fowler's direction and adaptation was skillfully executed so that the chorus moved around the static Oedipus from snap-shot, to snap-shot in dark red shadow. Mr Omedei, commented how brave it was that the adaptation was unique in that it attempted to synopsis the entire complex story into minutes, but agreed that it was done with incredible skill and was entirely appropriate. The competition was enormously grueling.

As the day progressed the visibility of stress and focus was evident in equal

measure in the remaining few schools. It was a fantastic honour for Drama at Wesley, that our students brought the Laurels home, and most definitely seized the day!

OLIVER

Lionel Bart's *Oliver* is most definitely mainstream musical theatre. It had mysteriously departed from the musical theatre circuit in schools and colleges for a few years and we all wondered why. We had made approaches to the company last year and the occasional call was made to keep tabs on the matter. When we received a call in October of last year that we were top of the list on a standby situation, it was decided that we would go ahead with it for the Wesley musical production of the year on a K-12 basis. – A daunting challenge!

It is entirely appropriate, that at the outset that all the hard work was a collaborative effort. Precisely around the time of the copyright clearance it was planned that Miss Prue Ashurst would join us as Head of Faculty in Performing Arts. Ms Ashurst is held in incredible regard in Perth musical circles, as a uniquely gifted choral director, and we were thrilled that she offered to put her enormous expertise behind this production in the role of Music Director. This was going to be solid slog for Miss Ashurst as well, particularly owing to her administrative and teaching commitments throughout the college.

The fact that we both approached the project from the outset, knowing full well that the constraints of the Joseph Green Centre would not deter us, we immediately set to our task and began auditioning on a daily basis, right across the entire college.

Auditions were done on a completely democratic basis. Students filled in

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audition slips and were given a pretty rigorous run-through both musically and dialogue. It would be no exaggeration at all to say that the name of the Artful Dodger appeared again and again as the most sought-after part, by all. Timothy Little, a year 6 student shone on his first audition, and continued to grow in confidence and self-assuredness, and delivered an incredible Artful Dodger for the production.

Fagin was dual-casted. Mark Marshall and Wyatt Nixon-Lloyd shared the honours and brought their own individual interpretation to the role. The Fagin boys were adept at adapting to each Fagin and appeared to experience no difficulty at all in going with the flow.

We were twice blessed when Jessica Colgan appeared through the network as our Nancy. Jess as she affectionately became known to all of us, had played this part at Sacred Heart College a few years ago to acclaim. All agreed that she brought to our Wesley Production not just a professional edge, but a willingness to share in the workload with the Fagin's gang. Jessica certainly made a lot of new friends. The Perth College and Penrhos College Music and Drama students had a huge input as well, and our numbers swelled to the near hundred.

The logistics of rehearsing different groups from Manning House to Middle School right through to Senior School, combined with our visitors proved to be the single most challenging exercise. It was enormously demanding on all. The cooperation of the parents of all students in ferrying their kids in and out of rehearsal over several weekends was something Miss Ashurst and myself are extremely grateful for.

The establishment of Backstage Parents was the strongest backup for

this production, and hopefully productions to come. Their very regular meetings ensured us that what could have been a very scary nightmare had order and organisation. They tirelessly worked on the acquisition of over a hundred and thirty costumes that speaks volumes.

Focusing on the K-12 Production aspect, I think its fair to say that when any PSA school embarks on a musical Production, that the school's ability to deliver is very much on show. This is highlighted even more when a show such as *Oliver* has been off the circuit for a while. It means that the potential audience is enormous, they all want to check it out and indeed we were rewarded with sold-out houses prior to the performances.

This report is certainly not a critique, and indeed it is extremely difficult to single out one student's input more than the other. It is as important to highlight a Manning House student Daniel Tan's poster design and the incredible marketing strategy that arose out of it, as it is to remember Trent Wrightson's unforgettable singing of *Where Is Love?*

As the Headmaster remarked, "It was our willingness to put such large numbers on the stage," and involve them in both carnival and Drama and work as an ensemble group that will remain in our memories.

ARTS FESTIVAL 2001

After a week of darkness, doom and disaster from news abroad, the Perth dawn of September 19th, revealed a clear spring sky of sapphire blue. A gentle sunlight, warming to 21°C was tempered by the slightest breeze, enough only to carry the scent of spring blossoms from the gardens of the College. The sky remained clear and blue all day but the temperature and excitement climbed for artists and performers and the smell of sizzling onions and sausages filled the festival space.

The sudden transition of the Jenkins Quadrangle into the arts festival site has left students and staff in awe of the rapid involvement of the whole school participation and performance in visual art activities and displays. Students and staff, both individuals and groups, from every level of the College, found themselves immersed in a celebration of community, sharing, creating, cooperating, communicating and being connected with a sense of optimism and joy for life.

From the moment that Year 11 students turned the Jenkins Quad sculpture into a tribute to the artist Christo, wrapping it entirely in black plastic, a carnival atmosphere became contagious in the area. Head of Middle School Report

In this our second year as a Years 5 – 8 Middle School we planned to consolidate our first year's achievements and take further initiatives based on our experiences and previous planning. This ongoing revision of what we do is an essential element of middle schooling. Because we aim to be student-centred, our activities should respond to, and reflect the character of our student community from year-to-year, plus our long-standing core practices and beliefs. The many ways in which we have extended our program provide the focus of this report.

These initiatives sat within the developments occurring in middle schooling across Australia, with increased activity at government, state association and schools levels. The Middle Years Research and Development Project in Victoria continued to produce findings to support our planning and practice, and middle schooling organisations have experiencing rapid growth. There were over 2000 delegates at the Melbourne annual conference, and our own state association held another very successful conference for over 250 middle school teachers.

The learning and teaching program continued to develop according to the Curriculum Frameworks being implemented across Western Australia, and our understanding of boys' learning styles. In Year 5 there was some splendid work in the Visual and Performing Arts, with their Art based on the Monet and Japan exhibition providing great colour around the school, and their performance at the JSHAA Performing Arts Festival being a real crowd-pleaser! The school garden plot came to life for the Year 6 program, especially environmental science. The inclusion of a multi-disciplinary forensic unit was one of many problem-solving exercises that

characterised the year. Our first collaborative Year 7 Science Fair with Penrhos was a great success, as was the visit to hear the author Deborah Lisson at Penrhos and the construction of many brightly coloured dinosaurs floating around the school. The Society and Environment program had a more international theme, and boys enjoyed their first semester of Design and Technology. In Year 8 those experiencing difficulties in Mathematics received extra support through the restructuring of classes at the end of Term One, and there was an increasing focus on Aboriginal Studies, especially through the visit of several Noongar elders. The reconciliation theme was supported by Boori Pryor, who, along with fellow authors Andy Griffiths and Matthew Reilly, visited the school and encouraged boys to read and consider the issues raised in their books. Fieldwork during the Year 6 Camp to Albany and the longer Year 7 Camp at Point Walter was further integrated into the broader curriculum.

All boys were encouraged by some outstanding individual and group performances in national and state-level competitions. These included medals to several boys in the University of New South Wales Science and Mathematics competitions and the Maths Olympiad; the Mathematics Have Some Fun Competition; Future Problem Solving, where our Year 8 team competed in the national finals; and World of Trivia, won by our Year 6 team. At the same time our awards system gave greater recognition to progress, effort, and peer assessment.

This revision and development of the academic program was supported by a large amount of professional development, including close networking with other middle

schools, including Penrhos. One priority was to further investigate and develop staff teaming, especially in Year 8, where the research of our three Year 8 Co-ordinators revealed the positive impact teaming was having upon the welfare of boys settling into the school. Emotional literacy, leadership in times of change, Aboriginal Studies, boys and their learning, information technology and problem solving were other major themes. With staff also attending courses on Future Problem Solving we can expect further initiatives in 2002.

Our co-curricular program brought many initiatives and successes. The sporting program was strengthened considerably by the policy of having more specialists coaching teams. In particular, there was a more cohesive and intensive coaching program developed for Athletics. Triathlon's popularity continued to grow, and our performance at the Schools' Championships was outstanding with the Year 7 and Year 8 teams winning their events. The Karate and Chess Clubs continued to develop with the "A" Chess Team winning the Metropolitan Primary Schools Competition, and over 70 boys spent their Friday winter evenings at Penrhos for Dancesport. For the first time several Year 7 boys and their Penrhos partners competed successfully at the Western Australian Dancesport Championships at Challenge Stadium. Many of our boys enjoyed their participation in the whole-school performance of Oliver. Our service program continued to strengthen, with boys raising the highest amount per capita for the Epilepsy Association in the annual World of Trivia quiz and the Year 6 initiative to support Orang-u-friends.

Congratulations to Jenkins House for their all-round performance during the Year, winning three of the four

inter-House competitions and the Inter-House Shield. One initiative in the House Competition this year was the Standards competition in Athletics, which gave all boys an opportunity to contribute to their House performance.

Our move of the Swimming Carnival to Challenge Stadium on the same day as the Senior Carnival added greatly to the day. Separate days were held for Swimming and Athletics Championships, and it was very pleasing that so many boys were prepared to compete so strongly.

This year we continued to develop our framework for parental

involvement and support through the House Representatives. Features were a parent evening on parenting Middle School boys led by Mr Andrew Horabin and a combined evening with Manning House parents and boys at "Sci-Tech". Following a suggestion from parents we expanded our mentoring program to include a pool of Year 7 boys ready to mentor Year 8 students where requested. Thank you to Mrs Bellamy and Mrs Sauer for being our Middle School P & F Representatives; our fortnightly meetings gave many opportunities to share ideas and develop policy.

We finished off the year with a Final Assembly that focussed on the Years 5-7 and a Year 8 Valedictory. Both events took place in the Atrium, which provided a more appropriate and intimate setting to recognise and thank all boys and congratulate those identified by peers and Staff for their outstanding academic endeavour and citizenship. For the Year 8's, there was a formal transition into the Senior School. These events proved to be a fitting way to conclude another very exciting year in Middle School.

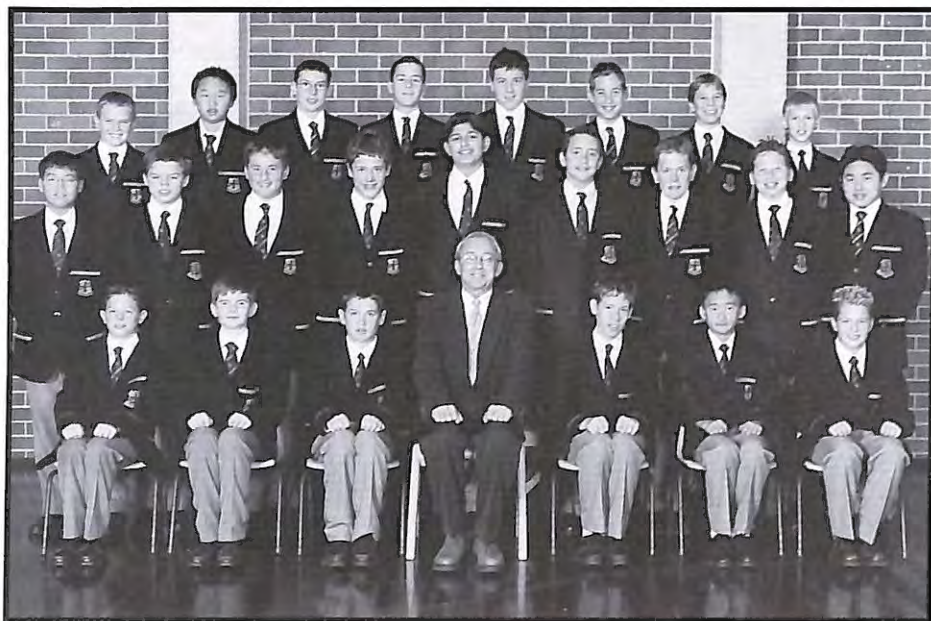

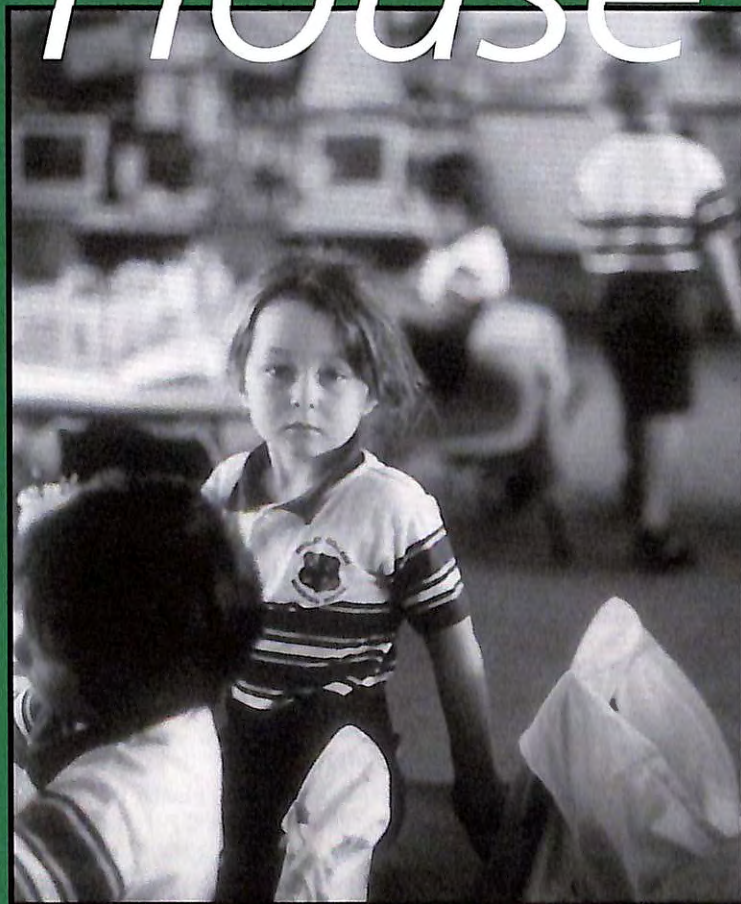

Structured and unstructured play situations have helped young students accomplish intended outcomes within the eight Key Learning Areas of the Western Australian Curriculum Framework. Children from Kindergarten to Year 4 have worked in collaborative situations to learn about
