


KATITJIN




BATHIGAMA

HEADMASTER'S SPEECH NIGHT ADDRESS



Mr David Gee, Headmaster

As in previous years, I do not intend to go through the written report which was provided in the Speech Night program, although I will highlight some of the initiatives that have been introduced through the course of this year.

It would be remiss of me tonight to not acknowledge Dustin Stuart's outstanding achievement in winning a Bronze Medal in this year's Chemistry Olympiad. Dustin is a wonderful young man destined to have a distinguished academic career. This year we also appreciated the wonderful successes of our Future Problem Solving teams at both a national and international level.

I believe that tonight it is also important to acknowledge the impressive achievements of our two indigenous students this year: Rhonen Maher and Bradley Angus. Rhonen looks like getting a TEE score that will enable him to enter university, something not many indigenous boys attending PSA schools have done in recent years. Having come to Perth this year from One Arm Point, to do Year 11, Bradley has also experienced significant successes, receiving a Headmaster's Gold Endeavour Award.

It is also appropriate for us tonight to acknowledge a number of staff members who will be leaving the College at the end of the year: Mr Alan Roberts, Mrs Rosemary King, Mr John Rogers, Mrs Barbara Vercoe and Miss Kirsty Button. We also thank Mr Peter Trend for his outstanding contribution to the College over many years and in a number of different roles and are thankful that, although he steps down from the role of Head of Senior School at the end of this year, he will be remaining on staff to teach Mathematics.

Major Initiatives in 2005

There have been a number of significant initiatives introduced in 2005.

Perhaps the most significant one has been the development of the Year 9 Katitjin Program, which was pilot trialled during Term 4. This program has been designed to try to engage boys in their learning at a time when the research clearly indicates that their motivation levels drop off. Problem-based learning activities, where connections across subject disciplines are explicitly developed, are central to the program's ethos which also includes a range of remote modules and outdoor experiences. Throughout all activities there is a very strong emphasis on the development of both intra and interpersonal skills.

The Pedal Prix program has been another successful initiative designed to contextualise the boys' learning and make connections across disciplines. A human-powered vehicle was designed and built by one group, a sponsorship plan developed by another, and a fitness program and athlete selection criteria by a third group. A team of selected athletes then travelled to South Australia to participate in this 24 hour race in front of 20,000 spectators.

In the Junior School the development of a Wesley-flavoured Reggio Emilia approach has taken a significant step forward this year following the study trip to Italy in January by four of our teachers: Ms Kirri Moore, Mrs Amanda Whitford, Mrs Sara Barrett and Mrs Louise Jackson.

Throughout the course of 2005, a Kindergarten to Year 10 Thinking Skills Program has been developed by the staff to ensure that all students are explicitly taught a range of thinking skills and strategies. In this information era, the ability to analyse, utilise and create information is going to be vital if students are to develop the capacity to be effective and adaptive learners.

In a similar vein we started Year 8 with a "Step Up" Program where a range of learning and self-management skills were focussed on in the first few weeks of the year. Later on, an integrated collaborative unit titled Septic Solutions was run. These two initiatives will be developed further in 2006.

Six "smartboards" were installed across the campus throughout the course of the year. These new tools allow teachers to effectively run the laptop computer from the whiteboard making them an innovative and interactive opportunity to enhance learning while embracing technology. We hope to be able to install more of these in coming years.

The other major initiative of 2005 has been the resurgence of the Community Service Program at Wesley under the capable tutelage of Miss Pam Clausen, with the assistance of Ms Lynette De San Miguel and others. We have once again run a number of successful fundraising activities. We have also developed a number of initiatives where "doing" and "being" was the primary method of involvement. The Year 11 Soup Kitchen and Year 9 Meals On Wheels programs have been two amongst many of these, but undoubtedly our signature activity has been the adopting of the Bathigama School in Sri Lanka that was devastated by the tsunami almost a year ago. A significant amount of money has been raised and we have undertaken two trips where boys have been involved in the teaching of English and sport. On the last trip, we purchased a computer, a satellite phone and a printer, and built an office in which to house this equipment. This will be an ongoing project for the College.

After a long and extensive research and consultative process, the College's new Bullying Policy has finally been put in place. Associated with this has been the development of a Child Protection Policy, a Code of Expectations and a draft Behaviour Management Policy. All of these are designed to enable us to be more consistent and responsive in our approach.

The Campus Development Program has continued with the extensive refurbishment of the Boarding House and the continued phasing-in of air conditioning occurring this year.

Major Initiatives for 2006

The focus for 2006 at the College will be two-fold:

1. The consolidation and embedment of the raft of changes that have been implemented over the last two years;
2. The preparation for the implementation of the new Courses of Study in 2007 and 2008.

The College Strategic Plan, which has, in effect, already moved into the implementation phase, will be formally communicated to the wider community in coming months.

The major priorities to come out of this are:

- The development of an ICT strategic plan. One critical element of this will be the development of a revamped website which is almost ready and the subsequent development of an intranet which will improve communications with you and enable us to develop an electronic learning management system.
- The Assessment, Monitoring and Reporting Project Management Team, which has been working for much of this year, will undertake an extensive consultative, research and design process over the coming 18 months as they seek to develop a whole school blueprint to accommodate the assessment, monitoring and reporting needs of various interest groups at the College.
- The Year 10 Stocktake Model will be developed further for implementation in 2007. In simple terms, this model is designed to make Year 10 look more

like a senior year, allowing individual students to develop a more tailored program designed to meet their learning and development needs. It may include extension, consolidation, a degree of specialisation and the earlier shift to non-TEE and vocational pathways (which is an area we are just starting to investigate seriously).

- The offering of elective courses in Leadership, World Faiths and Global Inequity to Year 11 students, in addition to the currently offered Philosophy & Ethics Course.
- The further integration of Art Costa's Habits of Mind into our existing Thinking Skills program and the broader educational offering.
- The continued review of formal Pastoral Care structures that was commenced in earnest during Term 4 of this year.

In terms of staffing resources, a number of initiatives are being implemented in the Junior School. We have engaged Ms Shelly Farrows' services as a Junior School psychologist, two days a week; Mr Jim Howard will be released from standard classroom duties one day per week to further develop the Junior School art program; and Mrs Caroline Moseley next year will be given time release to further develop the Junior School Philosophy program and to initiate an early intervention literacy approach in Kindergarten and Pre Primary classes.

I am also pleased to announce that we will be significantly enhanced, expanding the provision of our gifted and talented education services during the latter stages of 2006 for full implementation in 2007. I have appointed Mr Brad Hilliard, one of our outstanding Middle School teachers, to this important role which will focus on both withdrawal work in the Wyvern Centre and in-class assistance to teachers across the curriculum.

For staff who teach in Years 8 to 12, the major area of focus will be the development of the new Courses of Study for Years 11 and 12 to be implemented in 2007, 2008 and 2009. We are working hard to minimise the impact

that this will have on classes (although some will be unavoidable) through careful planning of professional development time and by providing time release to teachers where possible.

As outlined by the Chairman of Council, in terms of the Campus Master Plan, we hope to shortly be able to commence Stage 1 with the fit out of the undercroft area of the Design & Technology/Visual Arts building as a Business & Enterprise Centre. The concept design plans for the refurbishment of the Joseph Green Centre (as broadly outlined by the Chairman tonight) continue to move forward. Our Junior School classrooms will be made bigger and more intimately connected to the outdoor classroom with decking. Future planning for the refurbishment of the Senior School classrooms has commenced (but will need to wait for the completion of the Business & Enterprise Centre and the Joseph Green Centre refurbishment to create the space that will be needed to do this properly). Continued improvements to our socialisation spaces across the campus are also an ongoing priority. As an example of this, early next year, the Middle School Adventure Playground will be extended and handball courts will be developed on the paved area between the Middle School and Jenkins Quadrangle.

Given all of this, it needs to be noted that there are three main ways for a school to generate revenue:

1. Through fees
2. Through government funding
3. Through other sources such as fundraising

As per the Chairman's address, we fully appreciate many parents are already stretched through existing fee levels and that government funding is not going to increase. Accordingly, the College Council has taken the decision to embark on a fundraising program with the aim of embedding this into the school culture over time. This will allow members of the Wesley community to contribute at a level appropriate

to their capacity. This is a daunting task as it has never really been part of the College's culture but, nonetheless, we are hopeful that it will assist us to accelerate the implementation of a substantial campus development program that will significantly enhance our educational offering. We hope to be able to raise \$3-4 million dollars over the next four years.

Another major staffing initiative that is being phased in next year is the appointment of sports-specific coaching co-ordinators. There is no doubt in my mind that the sports where we are better resourced and with quality people (for example, Swimming, Soccer, Cricket and Badminton), are those where we tend to be more consistently successful. Equally, I firmly believe that a planned, developmental coaching program needs to be in place if we are to improve our performance in sport over time and ensure that it is a meaningful experience for students (just as it is crucial in our other learning programs).

Hence, we will be appointing coaching co-ordinators who will oversee the development of a program from Year 5 to Year 12, focussing strongly on coach education and improvement, and working across all age groups and teams. This initiative will, no doubt, take some time to lead to improved results, but when they come, they will be more sustainable. Stronger planning emphasis will also be given to our strength and conditioning programs in the senior years.

As you will have read elsewhere, in an exciting step forward we are in the process of undertaking a complete overhaul of our sporting uniforms for implementation in 2007.

Hence, while you can see that 2006 will be largely a year where we plan to embed and consolidate a number of changes that have already been introduced or announced, it promises to be another exciting one for the College. We have continued to develop a whole-school approach as it relates to our Vision, Mission and Values while embracing the benefits that our three-tiered sub-school structure can provide to our students.

I feel very fortunate indeed to be charged with the responsibility of leading this fine school, with a group of dedicated and excellent teachers, and some wonderful young people who continue to amaze me on an almost daily basis. To affirm the Chairman's view, I am also confident that we have managed to build one of the most talented governing bodies and senior management teams of any school in Perth and possibly even Australia. I thank them for their important contributions this year.

In conclusion, I thank you for your support over the last 12 months, I warmly acknowledge the outstanding achievements of so many fine young men who will be recognised tonight and I take this opportunity to wish you all a safe and blessed Christmas. Thank You.

Chairman of Council, Peter Shack (OW 63-70)

Last year, in my first report to the College community as Wesley College chairman, I outlined the broad directions that the Council wishes to take for the school into the future.

This year, I wish to discuss in some detail the structure of the Council and highlight some specific decisions the Council has taken to move Wesley College forward from being a good school to a great school.

Under its Constitution, the Wesley College Council is a self-appointing council. Suggestions for council membership are sought from the Parents' and Friends' Association and the Old Wesley Collegians' Association and appointments have to be confirmed by the Synod of the Uniting Church.

However, the Wesley College Council has the autonomy to appoint its own membership. This situation was brought about by a major constitutional reform spearheaded by my predecessor, Mr Craig Readhead.

It allows Council to appoint men and women with appropriate and relevant skill-sets to assist in the running of a multi-million dollar business. Historically, and perhaps still typically, schools like Wesley College have representative

councils without reference to skill-sets. Wesley has a council with expert skill-sets, with reference to appropriate representation.

Nowhere is this more apparent than in the appointment of two new councillors in 2005. Brenton Sivior is a self-employed forensic accountant and management consultant who chairs the Finance Committee. Angela Doyle is the CEO of Sids and Kids and contributes to the Marketing Committee.

It is important that the school community understand the constitutional structure of the Wesley Council so that this crucial reform is maintained in future corporate memory and practice.

Council is currently made up of six men and four women, Old Boys and current and former parents, all leaders in their own fields of education, law, finance, property and marketing, all with skills and experience to lead Wesley forward. To complete Council membership are the Headmaster and the Moderator of the Uniting Church as a perpetual visitor, with the Director of Finance and Administration and the Head of Senior School in attendance at meetings.

This year marks the retirement of Peter Trend as a member of Council. Peter will continue as a valued member of the Wesley College teaching staff where he has been for more than thirty years. On stepping down as Head of Senior School and Deputy Headmaster and, therefore, as a member of College Council, I would like to express my personal thanks to Peter for a job truly well done!

Gemmell Sherwood is also completing his term as the Moderator of the Uniting Church. He has been a personal mentor and friend to me

through some challenging times and I wish to express to him my heartfelt appreciation.

There are five Council Committees, each chaired by a member of Council and made up typically of seven to ten members.

These committees are Finance, Property, Education, Marketing and Governance, and Council is always looking for committed people to play a role. Like Council, these committees are self-appointing, but not self-perpetuating nor self-serving and it is vital that we build in on-going lines of succession.

The Education Committee is worth singling out. Education is what we as a college are all about. This Committee has senior students on its membership. There is no better representation and they continue to make an extremely valuable input. Council is proud of its budget allocation to staff professional development. New staff to Wesley, when surveyed, comment that they are excited by the professional opportunities to not only teach, but also for them to learn at work in a challenging, collaborative setting. Our greatest college asset is not our buildings, but our staff and Council seeks to make Wesley College a school of first choice for parents, students and educators.

Professor Lesley Parker AM is retiring this year as Chair of the Education Committee of Council. She has made an outstanding intellectual contribution to Council since 1996 and we will sorely miss her wisdom and advice. This year also has seen our Headmaster, David Gee, complete the selection of his key team. Anne Bell has joined us as Head of Junior School, Stephen Webber commences as Head of Senior School in 2006, and with Geoff Kay continuing as Head of Middle School, Council is

excited that this "gang of four" has experience and enthusiasm that is second to none in schools in Australia.

On the Property front, 2005 saw the fast-tracking of the boarding house refurbishments. Council remains firmly committed to modern boarding facilities and an emphasis on pastoral care that is exemplary.

The next major capital works projects are the redevelopment of the Joseph Green Centre, the fitting out of the Business and Enterprise Centre and the east wing extension of the OWCA Memorial Chapel.

The redevelopment of the Joseph Green Centre will be our largest and most important project, delivering amongst other things:

- an upgraded teaching centre for the Performing Arts;
- upgraded cafeteria services;
- upgraded toilet facilities;
- an upgraded multi-purpose auditorium, which will probably include a lecture theatre;
- upgraded library facilities; and
- (if finances allow) a staff room/function centre with Swan River and Perth city views.

The recurrent finances and the annual budget of the College are in sound shape.

However, to afford and achieve all that Council and the college community wishes to achieve, Council has decided to introduce into the culture and practice of the school a targeted and on-going fundraising effort.

Council is well aware of the family effort and sacrifices that parents make to give their children a Christian education at Wesley College. However, equally there are members of the school community, parents past and present and Old Boys who would like to contribute, if given the opportunity.

Why should anyone contribute over and above fees paid? The answer to this is that we seek to do more than fee increases can allow or afford.

Why should anyone contribute when the results and benefits of the fundraising are experienced long after any one child attends the College? The answer to this is that we can thank the parents of the 1960s who provided the funding for the first swimming pool. We can thank the parents of the 1980s for providing the funding for the Blanckensee Centre and our sports and recreational facilities.

We are building an exciting institution which will have a life longer than the involvement of any one of us and for the benefit of children and grandchildren to come thereafter.

Why should anyone contribute when the Endowment Fund has \$10,000,000 under its management? The answer to this is that when the second history of the College is written the second most important decision of our times was to establish the Endowment Fund, and the foremost decision was and is not to plunder it!

Other schools have typically made decisions to short-sightedly collapse their foundations when the capital reaches \$2-3,000,000 in order to build a building.

The Wesley way has so far funded two buildings (the Middle School and the Design, Technology and Visual Arts Centre) and the refurbishment of a further two (the boarding houses and the Ward Building) without fundraising. In time, the growth of the Endowment Fund will allow further such improvements, but to afford more now, we have to raise more.

2006 portents to be a very exciting year for Wesley College, setting the financial foundations for our collective goal to continue to move Wesley from being a good school to a great one.

Good Evening, Moderator, Chairman College Council, Headmaster, Ladies & Gentlemen, Boys of Wesley.

During the coming summer break, Wesley's classrooms will be empty, the playgrounds deserted and, devoid of people, it won't feel like much of a school at all. The times we are gathered as a school, like here tonight, I feel privileged in that I am one of few who get a chance to tell their stories, for after all; Wesley's story of 2005 is simply the collection of all the individual and group stories gathered throughout the year.

At the beginning of the year I told this story to the Middle School, that in Year 6 I was asked to fill in for a game in the mighty 7A cricket XI playing over at the Guildford mudflats. While our team was fielding, I was standing out at square leg, when, horror of horrors, the ball was hit up and was floating towards me for a catch. I remember being so nervous, I did the only thing a Year 6 boy way out of his depth can do, by putting my hands up, my eyes down, and hoping the ball would stick. Miraculously, my fingers reflexively grabbed the ball upon impact, I took the catch, we won the match, and have been beating Guildford ever since.

Through to Year 7, and while most boys were busy discussing the latest yo-yo or Pokemon trading card craze, I had a genius classmate who happened to be building crystal radio sets, and strobe lights in his spare time, while on the side holding serious metaphysical discussions with my science teachers. Now that I look back, I feel the insight of some of our junior students should be truly treasured.

In Year 8 our year group doubled in size, with the influx of the 'public school' boys. These brought with them a brand of mindless hooliganism that we found initially disgusting, then quite exciting. The girls, the movies, sleepovers and also some of my now best friends came from that wonderful group of guys.

Year 9 introduction to sledging on the cricket field - opposition players thought it thoroughly humorous to make duck like quack noises when I was dismissed without score. Over the years, this morphed quickly into fully fledged verbal abuse of the sort that emanated from recent games; as I was walking off, one player

offered: "You're a Future Problem Solver. Solve this. You're out!" to the general amusement of his team-mates. Ah, taunts I'll cherish for a lifetime.

It was in Year 11 that I realised musicians were a very unique bunch of people. During the Jesus Christ Superstar pre-show warm up, the actors had linked arms and were in a serious huddle, psyching each other up and practising their vocal parts, preparing for the coming show. The musicians showed a much more relaxed attitude in their preparation, by also gathering in a big circle a few metres away, but to the absolute horror of the director of the play, preferring to engage in a serious game of duck-duck-goose.

And Year 12- What a wonderful year, the sport, the exams, the ball, valedictory, so much more; but only during leavers did I realise how lucky I was to be a part of the PSA. One Rottnest morning heralded a crowd of Trinity, Christ Church, Scotch and Wesley boys listening to a bloke from Aquinas recount his nights events, to the general hilarity of those listening. From the boys I had once thought sworn enemies, the PSA has provided a platform for friendships with boys from all different schools, though it must be remembered how proud we all are, if you'll excuse my ghetto talk, to be a part of the W.C. crew.

But that's just my story, as the leavers here tonight will all have their own stories. As the leader of the Prefect group this year, our story is a very proud one, of the successes we've enjoyed in leading the school this year. Undoubtedly, the proudest moments come from the fact that some of the recommendations made to the College Council and the Headmaster have already been implemented, in order to make Wesley still a greater school.

I've no doubt the coming year holds many

I thank the staff and students who have acted as mentors throughout the years, and especially to my brothers-in-arms this year: Brad Roberts, Rob Vickery, and Matt Suter. Thanks also to the unbelievable support and guidance given by Mr Trend and Mr Gee. This time last year, I remember hoping the Headmaster would simply be sensitive and reasonable in his

approach to our ideas. The Chief did that and went a step further, by making us challenge our own reasoning processes, for which we are now very thankful. I couldn't have asked for more wonderful people to work with.

A few years back, school captain Kieran Chute quoted Pink Floyd's "Another Brick In The Wall". Tonight I'll expose my love of Bob Dylan, by quoting, simply, "The Times They Are A Changing", and what a wonderful thing that is for our great school, Wesley College.

ENDOWMENT FUND

The Wesley College Endowment Fund was established in 1982 as an incorporated body under a separate constitution from that of Wesley College.

The purpose of the Endowment Fund was to be the recipient for discreet donations and bequests and since 1985 it has become the recipient for all admission fees charged by Wesley College. Admission fees were introduced in 1985 as a result of a poor response to a building appeal and in anticipation that Commonwealth funding to private schools could reduce or cease by 1992.

As the Endowment Fund developed in size and complexity, the appointment of management personnel was made to enhance potential donations and bequests and to relieve the workload from Wesley College administration. In conjunction with the Old Wesley Collegians' Association (Inc) initial accommodation was secured at 43 Coode Street as no facilities were available on campus to accommodate this organisation.

The Endowment Fund has worked closely with the College and the growth of the Fund has allowed the Endowment Fund to finance building projects and reduce the level of borrowings and/or repayments that the College would normally have to provide for these projects. The ability of the Endowment Fund to make this disbursement to the College has significantly reduced the College's reliance upon other forms of fundraising, including those through the school community.

The Endowment Fund has taken on the total financial responsibility to cover projects including underwriting the financing of the Middle School building, the Design and Technology building, upgrades to the Boarding House and upgrades to the school air-conditioning. These commitments require the Fund to repay \$850,000 per year for the next 15 years. With prudent management and sound investment choices it is anticipated that this commitment on behalf of the College will

be fulfilled from income generated by the Fund, without eroding its capital base.

It is pleasing to see the net assets of the Endowment Fund presently total \$13.0 million and that it continues to fulfil the important purpose for which it was established.

The Endowment Fund Management Committee is comprised of Wesley College Old Boys who have various business specialities, together with a strong and dedicated commitment to the wellbeing and financial success of the College.

Since 1992 the Endowment Fund has made disbursements to the College totalling \$4.6 million. These payments have been either in the form of loan repayments or direct contributions to capital projects or payments for endowed scholarships.

MILDRED MANNING SCHOLARSHIPS

The Trust was originally formed in 1997, with the injection of \$50 000 seed capital from the Old Wesley Collegians' Association, supporting a bequest made by long serving and much loved staff member, Mrs Mildred Manning. The Trust's charter was to raise funds in order to provide scholarships for the sons and/or grandsons of Old Boys. Over time that objective has been broadened to include members of the wider community and currently four senior students have been provided assistance via the income generated by way of the Mildred Manning Scholarship Trust.

Originally a notional target of \$500 000 was set and extraordinarily through the financial support of a great number of Old Boys and the careful management by the Trustees of the funds, that figure will have been reached by the end of 2005.

Of course the journey does not end there, with further plans to grow the capital base of the Trust to enable even further scholarships to be offered to worthy students.

A significant benefit which the Trust will enjoy from 1 July 2006, will be tax deductibility for donations received. It is envisaged this will provide the opportunity for a significant boost in support and accordingly will again feature as an option in the 2006 annual giving program, a program that for the first time will be offered to Old Boys to support.

2006 will also see the retirement of three long serving Trustees in Old Boys Andrew Watson, Geoff Baker and Gerard Milne. We thank them for their support and guidance in the formative years of the Trust. We also welcome new Trustees in Robert Davies, Bruce Milne and David Mellor, each a current or recently retired member of the OWCA Executive and look forward to their input and guidance in the coming period.

This has been a busy, but also most rewarding year for the Association. Early in the year the Association again hosted the Year 12 students to a welcome breakfast as they commenced their final year of schooling, before joining the ranks of the OWCA. This growing focus on building closer ties with our senior students continued later in the year, with the inaugural Lunch with the Boss gathering, where senior students had the opportunity to discuss career options with Old Boys from that field. It was a resounding success and a forerunner to further efforts next year.

This Year 2 special events involved a number of Old Boys.

ANZAC Day saw the culmination of a fundraising effort to restore the College's memorial Lych Gate, which had fallen into a poor state of repair over time. In addition to its careful restoration, the Association through the support of a number of donations also relocated the Gate, so that it is now passed through when entering the College from its western entrance. The rededication was attended by over 100 Old Boys and family members of the 56 Old Boys to whom the Gate is dedicated.

2005 also marked the Centenary of the Public Schools' Association and the OWCA joined with committees from our fellow schools in hosting a Centenary Cocktail Party in the grounds of Government House. Well over 500 attended the occasion which was an outstanding success and testament to the continued solidarity of the PSA.

The continued focus of the Association remains in providing opportunities for Old Boys to reunite in a social environment. As such reunions in 2005 involved members of the Classes of; 1945, 1955, 1965, 1975, 1980, 1985, 1990, 1995 and 2000, with a regional reunion held in Albany. In addition to Pioneers' Day, the reunion program brought together over 600 Old Boys, to celebrate their common link to the College. Pioneers' Day, which brings together Old Boys who attended the College at least 50 years ago, continues to grow, despite its own challenges. This year the mercury climbed to over 44 degrees, with the atmosphere in the College Assembly, particularly "close". However a cold drink over lunch quickly ensured the day was its usual success, with many a story told.

The continuation of the Association's Business Luncheons was again very well received.

Over 100 guests attended each of the luncheons held at the Royal Perth Yacht Club, with Fremantle Chamber of Commerce and America's Cup hero, Mr John Longley acting as guest speaker and the Royal Perth Golf Club with new Rugby WA and Western Force CEO, Mr Peter O'Meara our special guests. Both were well received and are now a permanent fixture on the OWCA calendar.

Another fixture is the OWCA Golf Day, this year won for the second time by Ben Kay, Jonathan Remta, Brendan Nazar and Glenn Meadowcroft. Played at the Mt Lawley Golf

Club and followed by a presentation dinner in the Club House, the day is growing in popularity.

Financially the Association is in a sound position, with well performing investments shared amongst blue-chip Australian shares and cash. Challenges are looming however as the OWCA seeks to continue to provide even further service to the wide ranging requirements of the College's Old Boy community, whilst still looking to "balance its books".

In speaking with similar schools in the Eastern States, this is not an uncommon issue. With life membership fees often above \$500.00 (which in turn expire after 10 years), significant organisations (and services) are being offered to members – unfinancial members are often disadvantaged when it comes to receipt of college magazines or pay premiums to attend college reunions and functions. Issues such as these will no doubt be considered by the OWCA, who at \$175.00 for life time membership and over 3000 members unfinancial with no current diminution of services, will need to reassess its position in the future.

Currently however the Association continues to receive strong support from its membership and will continue its charter of the facilitation and fostering of communication and connection amongst members of the old boys and wider college community.

THE ARCHIVE

The major work of the archive in 2005 has been the development of a special archive project, the Wesley College Heritage Walk. The concept was initially put forward by College Council in 2004, with a view to acknowledging the outstanding people after whom buildings and facilities have been named, while simultaneously promoting the history and development of the campus. In all, 24 buildings and facilities across the campus have been named by Council in honour of the outstanding personal contribution made by trustees, council members, staff, former students or parents. The first naming occurred in 1950 when the Council agreed to name the two existing school ovals after Ward and Rossiter, the first two Headmasters. The most recent, in September 2005, was the naming of The Craig Readhead Room.

The project evolved into two parts. The first involved the design, manufacture and installation of enamelled plaques to identify each of the buildings and facilities making up the Heritage Walk. The distinctive green oval plaques carry the College crest, the name of the facility and several lines of text focussing on the person after whom it is named and their connection to Wesley College.

Part two involved the production of an illustrated brochure that features a brief history of the development of the campus, focussing particularly on each of the named facilities. The brochure allows visitors, staff or students to undertake a self-guided walk around the campus. The walk path has been broken down into three precincts, the earliest developments around Ward Wing and the Chapel; Senior School; and the area north of Swan Street including the Boarding House and Junior School.

Meantime the archive collection has been expanding, with more than 40 private donations this year. As well as donations from amongst the Old Scholars it has been pleasing to

receive three noteworthy collections from former staff members – papers from former Deputy Headmaster, Don Carter, hockey uniforms from Revd. Barry Angus, and a very substantial collection of photographs (predominately relating to the boarding house) from former boarding house and preparatory school master David Harrison. Building the collection throws new light on our past and is essential to the success of future displays and research projects. A few of the Harrison photographs have already appeared in the display that was mounted to celebrate the opening of the boarding house link building.

Displays continue to provide a means of showcasing the collection. In May the museum was moved to the back room of Maloney House, overlooking the Rose Garden. Since then displays have been mounted for two particularly significant reunions – the Class of 1945, 60th anniversary reunion, and the Class of 1955, 50th anniversary reunion. Other displays of note included the OWCA Library collection – over 60 books written and donated by Old Scholars. The topics range from both adult and children's fiction, to collecting antiques, art, meteorology, war, history, exploration, botany and music. Another display focussed on cricket at Wesley and the 12 Darlot Cup victories the college has enjoyed. The display included bats from the 1920s and records and scorebooks dating back to the 1930s.

Another aspect of the collection building has involved the taping of oral history interviews with several former staff and students. The collection of interviews began about 12 years ago and now numbers more than 40. The interviews will be of value to historians in the future as they provide insight into aspects of college life that may not normally be recorded through more conventional means of documentation.

Building a Thinking School

One of the focuses for our professional development for some time has been on learning and thinking. We know that our student's success in the 21st century depends on thinking skills. Two trends make thinking skills one of the most important outcomes of schooling. The first trend is the information explosion: the amount of information saved in 2003, mostly on hard disks was 5 exabytes (5,000,000,000,000,000,000 bytes) or a stack of books 10 metres high for every person in the world. Most of the information our students will deal with on a daily basis during their lifetimes has not yet been generated. The second is the change rate. Most students entering school today will work in job categories not yet created and all will work with technology not yet invented. Today, as a school community we have the daunting task of preparing students for a world we can only dimly imagine. If the facts and tools our students will work with have not yet been discovered and invented, our greatest gift is to prepare students with the ability to think. As a school community we are constantly reflecting on what is powerful learning - aligning our thinking about thinking with how the brain actually functions and what is powerful to learn?

Art Costa

It was a great privilege to have Art Costa work with staff for a whole day in July. He had travelled to us from Melbourne where he presented a keynote and workshops at the International Thinking Conference. Professor Costa is a noted international educator, often called the 'grandfather of intelligent behaviours'. He has a wealth of knowledge regarding teaching individuals how to think more effectively. His wisdom and enthusiasm for sharing 'habits of mind' has motivated us to look at the learning environments for our students from a broader perspective. The focus of the 2 days was to encourage the promotion of a thinking community. We were challenged to reconsider what students needed

to be good thinkers, how we might use the habits of mind as a language for thinking and how we might build a 'thoughtFULL' learning community. As a result of Art's visit, groups of staff continue to work on ways of integrating habits into our daily lives whether it be on the sporting field, in the classroom, in the band or in daily interactions with one another.

Costa describes a 'habit of mind' as having a disposition toward behaving intelligently when confronted with problems. When we experience dilemmas or come face to face with uncertainties, the most effective actions require drawing for the certain patterns of intelligent behaviour. Research into effective thinking and intelligent behavior indicates that

there are some identifiable characteristics of effective thinkers. These are not necessarily scientists, artists, mathematicians or the wealthy that demonstrate these behaviours but can be identified in successful people in all walks of life. Costa's 'habits of mind' are 16 attributes of what human beings do when they behave intelligently. These habits transcend all 'subject' matter; they are characteristic of peak performers whether they are in homes, schools, athletic fields, organisations, governments, churches or corporations. "We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, then, is not an act but a habit." Aristotle.

Habits of Mind has a number of clear benefits to us – it suits a K – 12 model of schooling; it applies equally to learning in and out of the classroom, is a life-skill and provides us with a common language to use which is of benefit of all in the community.

Michael Pohl

Art Costa's visit complemented the work we had already begun with Michael Pohl. A member of the World Council for Gifted and Talented Children, Michael regularly presents at local, national and international conferences on issues concerning giftedness, creativity and thinking. Michael is the Director of Thinking Education and works directly with schools returning many times to work with teachers as they create a culture of thinking in their classrooms.

At Wesley, Michael worked with all K – 12 staff in January and returned to work with teams of teachers and faculties in April and October, to develop a whole school approach to the teaching of thinking. While a range of tools is already used by teachers in classrooms, we have now developed a range of thinking tools that will be explicitly taught in scope and sequence appropriate to age group and curriculum K – 10.

This is also supported by the work being done by the group of teachers who travelled to Reggio Emilia in Northern Italy; the Kaititjīn program in Year 9; Getting Started and Septic

Solutions in Year 8, the philosophy program in the Junior School and the PAVE program in Year 10.

Michael Carr-Gregg

Michael Carr-Gregg visited us in June and presented very entertaining sessions to staff, students and parents. Michael is one of Australia's highest profile psychologists. He works at the Albert Road Centre for Health in Melbourne. He is a founding member of the National Coalition Against Bullying and an official ambassador for the National Depression Initiative Beyondblue as well as Mindmatters – one of 16 youth suicide prevention programs run by the Federal Government. In 2002 he completed his first book 'Adolescence - A Guide For Parents', co-written with Erin Shale and now in its sixth printing. His second book, 'Surviving Year 12 - a sanity kit for students and their parents' was published in February 2004. Both these books are available from the Senior School library and there are many interesting articles and resources on Michael's website at <http://michaelcarr-gregg.com.au>. Below is a set of hints for students. On his website there is also some hints for parents.

For Students: 20 Keys to success in the final years

1. Get to work early on, within first 2 to 3 weeks, learn to manage your time.
2. Create a study environment.
3. Establish a routine - set aside a particular time each day for study and revision and stick to it.
4. Set clearly defined goals.
5. Set a timetable - with a timetable you can plan to cover all your subjects in an organised way allotting the appropriate time for each without becoming overwhelmed. Try the Time Management Quiz at : <http://www.ucc.vt.edu/stdysk/TMInteractive.html>
6. Have variety in your study program - study different subjects each day. Do different types of work and revision in each study session.

7. Avoid interrupting your concentration. Have all the appropriate materials with you before you start a session of study to minimise distractions. If you procrastinate go to: <http://ub-counseling.buffalo.edu/stressprocrast.shtml>
8. Pace yourself, work consistently throughout the year.
9. Look after yourself - Drink and eat right. Get enough sleep each night - 9.25 hours. Regular physical exercise makes you feel great, boosts your energy and helps you relax, so try to keep up regular sporting activities.
10. Retain the balance between study, recreation & sleep - sleep is the best study tool going around! A useful sleep site at: <http://www.thesleepsite.com/hygiene2.html>
11. Learn to relax and eat well when studying - eat carbohydrates before exams and 'feed' your brain.
12. Don't work too late - no more than 50-60 mins at a time, with 15 min breaks.
13. Use a study timetable – weekly, term and year – put social obligations in first.
14. Reward yourself for studying. Watch your favourite television program, spend time with your friends walk to the park play sport.
15. Use past papers for exam preparation.
16. Test yourself on what you have studied - ask your parents or family members to quiz you on what you have learnt; use draft questions from books, past assessments or major exam papers.

18. Don't panic at exam time.
19. Ask your teachers for guidance.
20. Stay organised and give your parents something to do, so they think they are helping!

Teaching/Learning Projects

At Wesley teachers are actively involved in continual improvement, through collaboration and professional dialogue in teams, faculties and specific project groups. Each year a group of between 15 and 20 teachers involve themselves in more formal action research projects, where they explore the impact of particular innovations on student learning. Each project focuses on crucial questions relating to the improvement of learning. The group meets twice a term, formally collects and analyses information from students, parents and other teachers, integrating new sets of knowledge and ways of thinking with existing practices. In 2005 projects have included: the development of a reading program based on the work of Bloom and Gardner; a reading program based in the role of the reader and collaborative strategies; a specialised listening program being used in the Wyvern Centre; the use of PEEL (Monash Universities, Program for Enhancing Effective Learning) teaching strategies in Maths; developing ICT materials in LOTE; using digital portfolios in music and in 6 different classrooms, exploring the use of interactive Smartboards.

Smartboards at Wesley College

The use of Smartboards in education cannot really be considered "new technology" as they have been used in Europe and the USA for years now. One of the basic principles behind the use of Smartboards is that most students come from a home where they

are saturated by electronic stimuli via home theatre, MP3 players and mobile phones. The students develop a strong affinity to learn in an environment full of rich visual and auditory stimulus. The teachers laptop has previously been disengaged from the teaching and learning process as it was difficult to display or demonstrate to a whole class without a data projector and screen. But now it can become a tool to provide a very engaging and motivating experience for their students. Several staff at Wesley have been trialing the use of Smartboards in classes since the start of Term 3 this year. Six boards were purchased and installed in Mathematics, Science, SOSE, Business, Middle School and Junior School.

The Smartboards have improved the educational experience of students in these classes because;

1. The mandatory data projector has permitted much better use of staff laptops and replaced the TV which was commonly used to display video resources
2. They have drastically improved the standard of presentations by both students and staff
3. The richness (in both visual and audio stimulation) has improved and this is in keeping with current principles of education
4. It can immediately link teachers with the internet and other resources in a flexible teaching environment
5. It can provide a dynamic, interactive platform either for teachers to use for instruction or as a collaborative tool with the students

It was evident that there were some amazing outcomes from the trial and that the technology received approval for further expansion throughout the school. Some responses from staff and students said that the Smartboards "brought the awe and wonder back into lessons" and that "it increased student interest, motivation and engagement in a very tactile, boy friendly environment". The number of Smartboards will increase gradually over the

next few years but the plan is to situate them in rooms that will provide flexibility of resources and not a saturation of boards in all rooms.

As you can see, Wesley is a vibrant, professional learning community and thanks to all who have been involved in the myriad of projects in 2005.

2005 in the English Faculty was a time of great change. At the end of the first semester, Mr David Ashton resigned from Wesley College, to take up a new challenge as Head of English at Felsted College in Essex. We are extremely grateful for the support and leadership he provided during his three and a half years as Head of the English Faculty.

I would like to thank all members of the English Faculty for their consistent professionalism and for the support they have shown to me during my semester as Acting Head of English. They have undertaken the challenges of moving towards full implementation of the Curriculum Framework and Outcomes Based Education with lower school classes, while collaborating on the introduction of the new English Courses of Study for Year 11 students. They have also managed to attend the five full days of Professional Development required in order to prepare for the new Courses of Study. Their efforts have resulted in the generation of two exciting new courses which will replace the existing TEE English and Senior English Courses for Year 11 students in 2006 and I would like to thank Mrs Joanna Rafferty for her efforts in coordinating the writing of these courses.

The English Faculty is always trying to find new ways to engender enthusiasm for English in boys and with this in mind, we engaged the services of a well-known actor and playwright, Reg Cribb, to work with Year 9 students during their time in the Katitjin program. His aim is to show the boys how powerful scriptwriting can be in the exploration of important societal issues. We are hoping to build some cross-curricular links with the Drama Department by exploring the possibility of having some of these scripts performed by Year 10 Drama students.

We have continued our commitment to develop the writer-in-residence programs within the College. Fran Lessac returned to the Junior School during Term 2 and worked with the Year 2, 3, 4 and 5 students as they developed their own picture books. She was joined this year by her husband Mark Greenwood, a well-known author and Wesley Old Boy. The program culminated in a delightful evening where the children launched their story books in the presence of an enthusiastic audience of parents.

Local author, Anthony Eaton returned to the College to work with Year 8 students in the process of short story writing as we expanded the writer-in-residence program initiated in 2004. Anthony chose the best of these stories and they will be published in the second edition of "Sightlines" which will contain a forward written by Anthony. The Year 8 boys also studied his novel *A New Kind of Dreaming* as part of their English course so it was a wonderful opportunity for them to ask an author about the craft of writing. One lucky Year 8 boy, Jacob Brown, also won a lunch with Anthony Eaton at a local restaurant, as a feature of the Anthony Eaton writer-in-residence week. The Year 8 English course also expanded to incorporate a two week unit on thinking skills, called 'Getting Started' at the commencement of the academic year. This is designed to allow each student to identify the ways in which they, as individuals, learn best.

Selected boys also had the opportunity to accompany Mrs Jane Graham to hear the popular author, Matthew Reilly, give a breakfast address. Mrs Graham is assisted by Mr Michael Woodcock in the running of a Book Club which also involves Aquinas and Penrhos students.



Students attended performances of several plays which included: *The Simple Truth*, *The Buzz*, *Flowers for Algernon* and *The Bell Shakespeare Company*. Literature students also attended a performance of *The Playboy of the Western World* at His Majesty's Theatre while Year 11 English students attended a Festival of Perth film, *Control Room*, at Somerville Auditorium. Year 8 boys attended a performance of *The Tempest* by students from the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts and were privileged to have one of the actors visit Wesley College and workshop aspects of the play to an enthralled audience of this year group.

The English Faculty has continued its association with the Fremantle Children's Literature Centre, giving selected Year 9 and 10 students the opportunity to work for a full day with four different published authors. The Year 12 Literature students also attended the Literature Conference at Curtin University in preparation for their final examination, with the added bonus of experiencing life as a university student for a day.

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Mrs Suzanne Lawrence organised a successful Literacy Morning, after the success of the inaugural one in 2004. All usual classes for boys in Years 5 to 7 were collapsed during that morning and they were invited to choose workshops they would like to attend. My thanks go to the many staff who offered an exciting range of activities from storytelling to role plays.

The Year 8 and Year 10 students worked on their public speaking skills when they participated in their Oracy Australia Examinations. I am grateful to Miss Pam Clausen for her commitment in ensuring that Wesley students have the opportunity to participate in a variety of public speaking and debating activities out of school hours. Mr Jim Fortune has continued to coordinate both Socratic societies and has ensured that they have continued to thrive.

A range of people have guaranteed that the boys are as supported as they can be in this Learning Area. Mrs Sarah Travis and Mrs Tracey Coad have provided remedial support to students in all age groups while Mrs Michaela Ellis has provided support to students for whom English is a second language. My thanks go also to Mrs Julie Bourke who has once again offered workshops each Friday afternoon to assist Year 12 English students with their English work and also for her assistance as an external marker.

Mrs Anne Crawcour attended the national English Teachers' Association conference on the Gold Coast in July and Miss Pam Clausen accompanied me to the State English Teachers' Association conference in May. Both conferences offered wonderful opportunities to consider new ways of doing things in the English subject area. 2005 also saw the return

of Mr Kristian Dimitroff, who spent the second half of 2004 working in the UK and the arrival of Mr Andrew Ward who took on Mr David Ashton's classes after his departure in July.

2005 has certainly been a very busy year for the English Faculty but one which has seen the introduction of many new initiatives for staff and students, as well as the continuation of some very successful and worthwhile established ones. We look forward to reflecting on these and working towards making the experiences in this Learning Area even more challenging and enjoyable in the future.

health and physical education

Once again, 2005 was an exciting one for the Health and Physical Education Faculty. We continued to reflect and modify our Teaching and Learning programs to ensure that we educate our students in all aspects of the HPE curriculum. In this regard, we are looking to further integrate the Health concepts into a format that is more realistic for the boys to understand. Previously, by separating Health classes from Physical Education classes, we have not adequately highlighted the natural links between these areas and both curriculum areas missed out on vital reinforcement opportunities. The onus falls on us to nurture in our students the concepts for a healthy lifestyle that will carry them forward into adulthood.

Research suggests that habits learned at a young age are hard to break and positive Health messages, across all curriculum areas, would present a strong message for our young men to take on board.

Continuing with our theme of developing life skills, our aim is always to teach physical skills whilst emphasising the importance of interpersonal skills and self-management skills. The transferability of these skills is obvious to all and it would be fair to say that Wesley College students will continue to use these skills long after they stop kicking a football or bowling a cricket ball. The content of our subject area is fast becoming one of the most significant areas of study in the school as the importance of working without direct supervision but as an effective member of a team becomes increasingly sought after in post school endeavours.

We continue to provide students with opportunities to learn other vital life skills in the form of the Royal Lifesaving Society Bronze Medallion course for Year 9 classes and the internationally recognised Rock and Water course for our Middle School students.

Equally, our Year 11 and 12 students provided great stewardship of younger boys this year when they were able to effectively integrate their Curriculum Council subjects into other school based projects. The Year 11 boys provided fitness programs for the Pedal Prix project that challenged a team of Year 10 students to cycle a Wesley designed and built bike at an international competition in Adelaide. I'm sure that the cyclists benefited greatly from the sharing of knowledge. Also, as part of their course, our Year 12 students coached our Year 5 students in a variety of games throughout Term 3 and again, both sets of students learned from the experience. This exercise serves to remind us that we should never lose sight of the importance of role models.

However, 2005 was also somewhat sad as it saw the departure of two of the most respected teachers to have taught this subject at Wesley College. Mr Max Jones, who served the school so admirably in a number of different roles, including Head of Health and Physical Education, is moving down south to begin a new challenge in the hospitality industry and Mrs Rosemary King, who has instilled in so many of our Junior School students a love of physical activity, is also moving south

to continue her teaching career. We wish them both well in their new endeavours and they leave, knowing that they will be fondly remembered. In their place, we welcome to Wesley College, Mr Len Fernandes who will replace Mr Jones as Head of Sport, Mr Leon Felton, who will be Head of Rugby and Mr Craig Bell who will replace Mrs King as the Junior School HPE specialist. In 2005 the LOTE faculty continued along the path to full implementation of the Curriculum Framework in Years 1 to 10 and began to come to terms with the challenges of the introduction of new Senior Secondary courses in Year 11 in 2008. We considered thinking skills and how to incorporate the latest findings on what facilitates students' learning into our language programs. The use of technology in the LOTE classroom remained a focus as well as the development of rich tasks to provide students with greater opportunities for independent learning.

In Year 7, Madame Broun trialled the Gesture Method, an innovative approach to learning French, which promotes fluency in the language by linking sounds and words to gestures. Only French is used in the classroom and both sides of the students' brains are engaged, enabling them to internalise and manipulate the language more effectively. She is looking forward to extending this trial next year.

Students received extra conversation practice and cultural enrichment from the Language Assistants – Bu Hara (Indonesian), Herr Hess (German) and Monsieur Feron (French). In



Term 4 we also welcomed former student, Pak Guy Gibson back to the College to teach Bu Rogers' Indonesian classes while she was on Long Service leave. His enthusiasm and energy were greatly appreciated by staff and students alike.

Mr Hess again offered his popular after-school German lessons with classes ranging from Children's classes to Advanced Adult classes.

Throughout the year students participated enthusiastically in a wide range of activities aimed at extending their language skills, developing their understanding of other cultures and enriching their LOTE studies.

mathematics

This year marks the retirement of Mrs Barbara Vercoe who has served the school well as a full-time teacher, a part-time teacher and a relief teacher over several years. We thank her for her contribution and wish her well in retirement.

The work on adapting programs to meet the requirements of the curriculum framework has continued in earnest. Current courses have been reviewed, philosophies and objectives determined and course outlines modified to meet the requirements of outcomes-based education. On the technology side, Mr Purdue and Mr Jukes have done a lot of pioneer work with interactive white boards and are to be congratulated on their efforts. Mr Barrett has overseen these and other technological advances, particularly in the area involving the use of graphics calculators.

In the Australian Mathematics Competition, the 213 Wesley students from Years 7 to 12 were among 430 000 entrants in the national competition. Our students achieved very good results, earning 86 certificates of credit, 73 certificates of distinction, 17 certificates of high distinction (i.e. in the top 2% of the state, excluding prize-winners) and four prizes (i.e. in the top 0.3% of the state). Of these, the

Middle School contributed five certificates of high distinction, 45 certificates of distinction and 32 certificates of credit. Congratulations to all students, but especially to Andrew Barrett-Lennard (10D), winner of a prize in the Senior division, and Lindon Roberts (10H), Dylan Williams (10C) and Richard Anthonisz (10M), winners of prizes in the Intermediate division.

In the Math-O-Quest Competition, run by the Mathematics Association of Western Australia, Nathan Amaral (7J) won first prize for his outstanding project "Skin Deep" while Ashton Cornwell (9W) and Adam Spight (9J) were highly commended for their entry "Striking Sequences". Nathan created a formula which could be used to calculate the surface area of skin on a human and was asked to speak on the topic at the awards evening.

Middle School boys spent a week on the "Septic Solutions" activity and found the activity both beneficial and enjoyable. The Scaffolding Educational software was very popular and was used extensively in years K to 10, with the Mathletics program featuring as one of the sites most accessed on the internet.

The Junior School program featured many "hands on" activities, with teachers working very hard to provide resources and interesting learning activities at all levels. Students embraced these activities with enthusiasm, with the in-class "shops" where students could earn tokens for good work and spend their rewards being popular. The Family Maths nights were well-attended and enjoyable and thanks are extended to those who made the evenings so worthwhile. Students in Years 3 and 4 also took part in the New South Wales Schools' Mathematics competition and achieved some excellent results.

The Science Faculty had another successful year. In the Senior School Dustin Stuart is to be congratulated on his outstanding achievement in receiving a Bronze Medal in the International Chemistry Olympiad for 2005.

We are one of eight schools in the state who are running the new Aviation Course of Study in Year 11. The students have responded well to the new style of assessment, and have remained motivated and focused. They are all continuing into Year 12 with most hoping to gain a TER after sitting the final exam in a year's time.

This year the Year 11 and 12 Senior Science students undertook a course of study in Aquaculture and Marine Science. They studied different aspects of this program, including 'Looking after Our Marine Environment', 'Sustaining Our Fish Breeding Stocks' and 'The Effect of Oil on Feathers'. A big part of the course involved the boys making and maintaining an aquarium containing Yabbies. This course has relevant implications for the new Post Compulsory Integrated Science program and, with its hands on, practical, topical and ever increasing relevance, was thoroughly enjoyed by all students.

We've had another successful year running the Electronics Program in Years 8, 9 and 10, with a little bit of a 'faster' in Year 7 in fourth term. The boys learn many skills throughout the year at both a hobbyist level and as a good grounding for further studies at TAFE or for an Engineering degree at university.

The Year 7s focused mainly on improving their soldering skills, and then attempted a basic project (the Low Power Police Siren). Year 8 projects included 'Clifford the Cricket', 'Bicycle Tail Light Flasher' and the 'Sound to Light Converter'. Year 9 projects ranged from the 'Sound Modulated Neon Tube', the 'Simple Intruder Alarm' and the 'Roulette Wheel' (to name but a few!). Year 10 projects included the 'Ten Note Doorbell', the 'PC to Graphics Calculator Interface' and the 'FM Radio'.

The course is comprised of a mostly practical component, and the philosophy of 'learning by doing' is applied. This works very well and keeps the boys interested, busy and happy!

In the Middle School, Year 5 classes have been busy investigating a variety of environments and the animals which inhabit them. This began with a trip to Herdsman Lake where the boys were able to collect macro invertebrates and study the health of Perth's wetland systems. World biomes were explored with a camp in the grounds of the Perth Zoo. Apparently very exciting and just a little scary.

Year 6 began the year with a treat as this was their first opportunity to use the facilities of the senior laboratories. Armed with this enthusiasm they tackled areas including Flight, Ecosystems, Energy, Light and Forensic Science. The latter being clearly the most popular with the boys fingerprinting and collecting hair samples from various staff members as they investigated crimes around the school.

Year 6 and 7 classes were also treated to sessions with the renowned bubble master Mr Froth, who demonstrated the links between bubbles, physics, chemistry and mathematics in a way that none had seen before. The hands on nature of these sessions meant that everyone had a fantastic time and the experience was a perfect lead in to the Science Fair.

The Fair was a great success with all of the boys participating in individual or group projects. A great amount of time was spent by each individual researching their topic, developing sound hypotheses and then determining scientific ways in which to collect data. Scientists from University Of Western Australia came in to dissect the scientific method of each project and to verbally probe some of the boys for their understandings. They adjudicated all of the projects and the final winners were awarded book vouchers to the value of \$25. An enormous thanks needs to go to Ms Pickering who co-ordinated a fantastic event.

Science has been thoroughly enjoyed by the students in the Junior School in 2005. Some fantastic investigations have taken place due to different Teacher Resource books being bought. These new resources provided exciting, hands-on activities for the students, allowing them to work independently, in partners or in a small group. The Junior School staff worked tirelessly to provide a motivating and educational Science program. Kindergarten, for example studied colours whilst Pre Primary to Year 4 covered topics such as the Solar System, Magnets, Sea, Food Webs, Patterns, Pets, Human Body.

In Term 3 the Year 7 Science Fair included a Junior School component. We had students from each year grade demonstrating some wonderful science experiments. Kindy showed us how colours mix with milk, Pre Primary created a true-to-life Solar System, Year 1 explored magnets, Year 2 made Oobleck, Year 3 made lemon juice rockets and Year 4 did a balloon blast. All of the Junior School students attended the fair and saw a wide variety of investigations. Thank you to all of the staff and students who helped prepare for the fair.

As part of Science Week, in Term 3, we were lucky enough to have the 'Bubble Show' visit the Junior School. This was run by SciTech and thoroughly enjoyed by all students. There were opportunities to make and catch bubbles as well as observing some explosive experiments.

Congratulations to the Year 3 and 4 students who undertook the NSW Australian Schools Science Competition with some excellent results being achieved. It was also fantastic to see some impressive Spectra projects that were completed at home.

Science in the Junior School is alive and well. It is a great way to explore the immediate environment and gather information and knowledge to help with research skills. Well done to all of the staff and students for showing such enthusiasm towards this learning area and we can look forward to another rewarding year next year.

Excursions formed a major component of the senior geography classes. In Term 1 the Year 12s journeyed to Alcoa's mine near Pinjarra. Early in Term 2 they travelled to Northam for a detailed settlement study and then visited Mr and Mrs Rod and Anne Carter's farm out of Meckering. The Carters have made their farm available for the last three years, and the students greatly appreciate the opportunity to "get their hands dirty". A tour of Perth, from the CBD to the outskirts, concluded the Years 12's field studies in Term 3. The Year 11 Geography course enabled the students to study coastal processes and development from Fremantle to Hillarys. Coastal processes along with resources and ecosystems were studied in much depth on the annual 4-day Year 11 Geography Camp to Rottnest in November.

Year 12 PALS students enjoyed a number of presentations during the course of their studies including ones from Senators Andrew Murray and Chris Evans. Other groups were also exposed students to topical issues with the Refugee Rights Action Group causing the students to raise many questions associated with this challenging issue. The Year 10 Legal Studies participated in a range of excursions during their studies. A trip to the Supreme Courts and the Francis Burt Law centre and then on to Parliament. Later in the course a further highlight was the exploration of the old Fremantle Jail.

As part of the Year 9 course of study on Australia since 1788, students had the opportunity to explore the Fremantle History and Maritime Museums, whilst at Year 10 some students participated in the United Nations Millennium Project where they discussed issues associated with youth, with the Australian youth representative at the UN.

Middle School

Mrs Wendy Sinden joined the Middle School staff as the Year 8 Team Leader. In this role she has successfully co-ordinated a range of Society and Environment curriculum developments and initiatives.

One of the units studied at Year 8 is the lifestyle and traditions of indigenous Australians before European settlement. In this context all Year 8 students journeyed to the Forest Hills Discovery Centre to investigate and experience traditional indigenous Australian culture. This was followed up at school with a range of activities including the use and interpretation of indigenous style dot painting.

The Year 7 students developed an understanding of the region that they live in by using a model of inquiry. This open-ended project-based approach has enabled students to work at a variety of levels and learn about things in which they are interested. The camp at Point Walter was a big success with the night visit to the Old Fremantle prison proving very popular.

The Year 6 classes had an interesting and dynamic program with many excursions and opportunities for practical involvement. They began the year by tracking the journeys of Matthew Flinders and Nicholas Baudin, highlighting the differences between the French and English attitudes to colonisation. Excursions to the Fremantle Maritime and Shipwreck Museums added enormously to their understanding of the dangers faced by those early travellers. In Term 2 the focus was water resources and related environmental issues. A team of CALM rangers took boys through beach activities during their camp, and this led to visits to the Hills Forest Education Centre, and the Wastewater and Groundwater Treatment Plants. A day spent in Parliament and at the Electoral Education Centre provided the impetus for each class to set up their own elections and run parliamentary sessions was a highlight of the government topic.

The focus of the Year 5 course was families, our local communities and Western Australia. Topics studied included "The Family" in Term 1, "Local Communities" in Term 2, "Conflict" in Term 3 and "Movement of People, Resources and Water" in Term 4. The boys went on several excursions throughout the year, augmenting their classroom studies. Visits

included Heritage House in South Perth, the Claremont Museum of Childhood, attending a groundwater festival at Whiteman Park and spending three days and two nights at the Perth Zoo on an integrated program.

Junior School

Another year of inspiring and motivating learning experiences occurred in the Junior School. All teachers integrated Society and Environment concepts into their curriculum and covered many learning outcomes through the development of incursions and excursions. Both Kindergarten classes investigated aspects of the hospital environment. Princess Margaret Hospital provided an enriching incursion where the children were able to learn through play by using real medical equipment. Museum specimens enabled the exploration of many creatures in the kindergarten and the children were able to get a close look at a sea turtle, red fox, small sea eagle, large blue crab and many other creatures.

Pre Primary ventured to AQWA with great enthusiasm, whilst another highlight was the piratical excursion to the Ship Wreck museum in Fremantle. Other excursions included the Museum and Art Gallery, and the Perth Observatory came to Wesley for a family evening when the night sky was studied.

Year 1 had a marvelous time at the Perth Zoo researching life cycles, while Year 2 went to the zoo and utilised map reading skills to navigate their way around, which lead on to the students creating their islands. They named their island and finished the topic by making posters advertising their features. The Year 4s researched societies around the world and through the inquiry approach looked into various cultures and countries to make their own societies. As part of this topic they worked on informational texts about fictitious societies which proved highly successful and was a great credit to the Year 4 students for doing some outstanding work.

Once again I have been impressed with the level of expertise and professionalism throughout the teaching and learning evident in classrooms. I must also thank the co-ordinators. Their efforts have supported and sustained the delivery of a diverse curriculum from K to 12.

Comprising Design and Technology,
Business and Computing

This has been our second year in the new building and it continues to be an innovative and exciting environment to work in. It has a wonderful open atmosphere allowing excellent visual communication between disciplines. The development of this building continues to be exciting with the development of a Business and Enterprise Centre due to go ahead in the undercroft section of the building. This development will see a new modern office arrangement that will revitalise the Business and Computing classes in the College. It will also help to unite the Learning Area by bringing all of the staff under one roof with a common level of facilities.

The standard of student work continues to grow and this has been evident in the continuous displays in the entry foyer of the building. Examples of fine furniture from Year 11 and 12 Woodwork, a special mention for Stretton Evans and his hall table which was made from Sheoak with a slump glass back and sterling silver inlay, and an interesting range of furniture and other projects like roo bars and go karts in senior Metalwork.

A new project for this year was the Pedal Prix, a 24 hour endurance event for human powered vehicles, held in South Australia. The most significant outcome of this project was the collaborative work done by Design and Technology and Mr Peter Reidy from the Physical Education Faculty. Congratulations to Mr Keenan and his Year 8 Product Design class who designed and built our bike. We met our goals for this year and successfully completed the 24 hours with pleasing final result. Next year we are planning to continue to work with Physical Education and enter 2 teams. We are hoping for greater success after the experience we gained this year.

In 2006 we will be offering one of the new Courses of Study. Mr David Howlett will be teaching Engineering Studies, a course designed to provide students with outcomes in engineering type activities. Students planning to become engineers might use this course to complement their academic studies and gain some practical engineering skills. To help with this course the school will be buying a new state of the art 3D CNC milling machine.

This machine is computer operated and will help students achieve quality outcomes. Engineering Studies is an exciting new course and we look forward to its development with interest.

During the last week of school this year we are involved in a Wyvern project which brings Year 11 girls from St Mary's to Wesley where they work in groups with Year 11 boys interested in Architectural Design. The project is an introduction to Architecture and included an introductory visit to UWA to see examples of student work, 3 days introduction to the design process and ArchiCAD in the Design and Technology Graphics lab and one week development during the end of year holidays.

He has made a significant contribution to the College as a metalwork teacher and faculty leader and also as Head of Cricket for many years. Business and Computing

This year Mrs Krajcar returned to Wesley College as Assistant Head of Technology and Enterprise in the Business and Computing areas. It is exciting to be accommodated in the new Design and Technology Centre with a lot more space and a congenial working environment.

This year we have been involved in the planning of the new Business and Enterprise centre in the undercroft of the Design and Technology building. The open plan design will enable students access to breakout areas from computing laboratories, business seminar rooms, resource lounge and a business communications centre.

The Year 8-10 Business classes continue to concentrate on two main streams: financial literacy and enterprise management. All Year 9 Business Studies classes participated in the Value Adding Quest, whereby students are required to value add to a primary product and to produce a portfolio where the technology process outcomes are satisfied. Year 10 students continued to apply their enterprise skills by entering the CPA, Plan Your Own Enterprise competition. Congratulations to Johannes Chan, 10D, who won State Division 1 and 2. He won a trip to Sydney to compete in the national judging, where he was national runner up. The Year 10 classes also set up stalls for the Enterprise Trade Fair where boys provided variety of goods services such as signs, cricket stress balls, wristbands, slime, badges and sporting challenges. The Year 11/12 Small Business Management class organised the Wesley leavers' jackets earlier on.

This year 80 Year 9 and 10 Business students entered the inaugural Financial Literacy Assessment and it was pleasing to see students' results higher than the State average. Four boys received High Distinctions.

Year 10 Accounting and Small Business class participated in the ABW online hospitality simulation in Term 3. The class was divided into three companies and they named Vanilla Villa, Golden Archers and Caribbean and their Managing Directors respectively were Azrain Azlan, Alex Carpenter and Johannes Chan. The groups made weekly decisions on their hotel's operations, marketing and finance and received immediate feedback from ABW on their share price. The boys increased their knowledge and application of Accounting and worked collaboratively to produce their Company Report. Vanilla Villa final results placed them eighth out of the 35 companies participating nationally.

The Year 12 Accounting students of 2005 were represented by Andrew Taylor 12J and Shen Kwa 12W in the program established by Curtin University described as the Curtin Experience. Students are invited to participate in the undergraduate class Accounting 100 during Semester One. The students engage fully in all classes, tutorials, assessments, including the examination. Both Wesley participants successfully completed all requirements and will be credited with the unit should they enrol in Curtin University. The experience provides insights into University life and with the added bonus of sponsorship by the accounting firm Price Waterhouse Cooper potential for rewarding prizes and traineeships with the firm. Shen and Andrew managed the program in addition to their day to day school experiences. The program was conducted after school hours so the boys were very focused and busy. For 2006 the opportunity continues with a greatly emphasised role of the main sponsor Price Waterhouse Cooper in the course development and delivery.

Next year a new Year 9 course has been designed to integrate business and computing – E-commerce. Students will have the opportunity to investigate the new world of e-business marketing and create their own virtual business on line.

K8 had a Smart Board installed this year and boys were exposed to variety of new interactive lessons which assisted them in learning new concepts. Year 8 ICT students were given the opportunity of presenting their interactive lessons to the Junior School students and it proved to be a great success.

the arts



THE WYVERN CENTRE

One of the noticeable developments this year has been the steady increase in students who have dropped in to the Centre for assistance in a variety of areas. From homework assistance, study skills, working on Future Problem Solving co-curricular, preparing for competitions, special exam provision and listening program involvement, students have sought and received help from the staff in the centre.

The challenge of problem solving continued to be promoted this year with groups of students from all sub-schools participating in a variety of programs. In the senior school the Academic Enrichment Year 9 and 10 groups investigated many areas including biological transformations using DNA at the Labs at UWA and making spheres of ice. Expert guests included Gary Cass and Oron Catts with the victimless leather art projects. Other students worked independently on their own projects in between structured classes.

For the first time, a team of Year 8 students (Daniel Ly, Tristan Seymour, Joseph Abradou, Joshua Kie, Thomas Hendriks, Alastair Housley, Ashby Hilton and Zachary Denz) attended the National Da Vinci Decathlon at Knox Grammar school in Sydney where they worked together to solve a series of timed collaborative challenges including sports adjustments in less gravity, an engineering feat of designing a weight bearing suspended platform, maths problems, general knowledge, english, latin, creative producers, chess, master mind and connect four.

The Wesley College Have Sum Fun teams placed first and third in this competition in March. Students also entered the Maths Olympiads, Maths Talent Quest and Australian Maths Trust Challenge competition and the Epilepsy Association's World of Trivia. Students have also begun working on the Jason Expedition 2005 which explores the Mysteries of Earth and Mars with astrobiologists and other scientists.

Mrs Stewart implemented the Listening Program with a range of students in support programs from Year 3 to senior students. The

program is designed to increase listening, reading and spelling skills, and also helps with organisational and attention skills. The program has shown to be beneficial with significant improvements in literacy as well as auditory processing skills. The program will be continued in junior school classes targeted at children with learning difficulties. The Learning Connections movement program also continued this year with Year 1 and has shown to have benefits in developing neurological pathways as well as children's academic areas. There have been a range of literacy intervention programs including phonemic awareness skills, decoding and phonics and home reading programs for students with delays from Years 1 to 4.

The Wyvern Centre welcomed Mrs Hammersley-Ellis into the English as a second language position. She has been working with students from Indonesia, Taiwan, Thailand, China, Singapore, Jordan, Hong Kong and Malaysia in order to improve their communication in English. She has noted how keen and enthusiastic these students are who are dedicated to improving their skills. She uses highly motivating resources such as documentaries, current affairs, Australian literature and language games to build bridges across cultures and improve an appreciation of the English language. From young children

retelling famous tales to preparing senior students for oral exams, this is a challenging and rewarding aspect of the Wyvern program. Many students also drop in for further individual work.

In the Middle School, Mrs Travis continued to support students with literacy and numeracy difficulties. The Elective English program provided a structured opportunity to focus on grammar, vocabulary and spelling, forms of writing, editing and expressive English techniques. Students also were encouraged to access structured reading programs to improve their reading.

In the Senior School, Mrs Coad has continued to strongly support students to excel to their best. The Elective English group benefited from the further focus on English skills. Support was also needed in research areas, organising information and maths. Supporting students with special needs and their teachers has also required frequent individual education planning sessions. These programs have continued to be successful and rewarding.

CAREERS

Opportunity and choice characterise the workplace awaiting Wesley students as they embark upon their pathway to employment. Pundits from all quarters claim to have predicted the employment marketplace changes they will encounter but few have forewarned us about the impact these would have on educational institutions across the board.

In Western Australia the trade skills shortage is impacting upon the back of industrial growth and an aging population. For our young men the availability of post-school opportunities has never been greater.

Wesley adapts quickly on the tertiary front. The rapid growth in university course options has necessitated the provision of high quality course selection information presentations and individualised programs to support our students in making carefully considered choices.

In 2005, Year 12 students have enjoyed a comprehensive range of career presentations that were integrated into their timetables and delivered by representatives from the major further educational institutions. Year 12s would wish to thank Mrs Liz Beal, Manager of the Prospective Student Centre at Notre Dame University, for co-ordinating this successful program as well as facilitating the delivery of one-on-one counselling to nearly half of

our Year 12s, seeking to resolve individual concerns regarding their choice of post-school courses of study.

'Lunch with the Boss' provided Year 12s with an innovative opportunity to make contact with successful professionals from their career focus area in an informal luncheon setting. This program was made available through the organisation and guidance of Ken Pride and Judy Greaney at the Old Wesley Collegians' Association. Such was the success of this program in meeting the career learning, networking and peer support needs of our students that the lunch will be extended to include Year 11 students in future years.

The vocational training go-ahead. The Instep program has laid the foundation for the flexible delivery of vocational education at Wesley. Student choice has been the essence of Instep's success in providing structured workplace learning to cater for the individual interest and abilities of our students. Mr Trend and Mr Rogers were the pioneers of the Instep story and former students wish them well as they leave the careers arena and both move on to the next stage in their own careers.

Only two years ago nearly half of our non-TEE students were seeking careers in hospitality and recreation. Now interest in these industries has declined, as students seek job opportunities in the more financially rewarding mechanical and electrical trade areas. The career aspirations of non-TEE students have become so narrowed and well-defined that the vocational needs of the vast majority of our students can now be integrated into the school curriculum. Wesley is aiming to instigate best practice in work readiness by providing all non-TEE students with the option to graduate from Wesley with relevant workplace experience and a job specific qualification.

The Certificate 1 course in Automotive Servicing has been delivered to all Year 11 non-TEE students in partnership with the Automotive Technology and Training Centre for the first time in 2005. Tertiary student's interest in automotive training is also to be

acknowledged by the provision of this course as a Friday afternoon activity during the years ahead. Electro-technology also ranks highly on the list of vocational training preferences amongst our students and investigation into the delivery of a Certificate 1 course is underway and aimed at implementation in 2007.

In 2006 a number of Wesley students have chosen to combine their academic learning with a school-based traineeship. These students will be amongst the first in the PSA system to engage in a formal apprenticeship relationship with an employer and work toward a Cert II in their chosen profession whilst completing the academic requirements for graduation.

Prior to leaving school nearly all Instep graduates have received offers of apprenticeships in recognition of the quality and relevance of Wesley's vocational training program and the employability skills our students have developed.

Staying ahead of the crowd. The career development program at Wesley has grown and diversified to embrace the increased variety of opportunities awaiting students on leaving school. Newly developed partnerships with training providers, employers, major institutions and our own collegian association are opening minds and doors for Wesley students to explore their career choices and maximise their chances of success in the workplace.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

The Outdoor Education year started for the Year 8 students with a four day camp at Nanga in fine cool and crispy conditions in June. The students were well equipped with thermals, waterproofs and assorted gear and equipment to brave the pre-winter conditions expected at Dwellingup.

Once they arrived at camp everyone was pleasantly surprised to experience fine cool conditions for most of the camp with little prospect of rain. The boys participated in a series of outdoor pursuits in their House groups with a member of staff and some specialist instructors whenever required.

Everything from bush craft, to white-water rafting, abseiling and climbing, ropes courses, mountain biking, canoeing, navigation, orienteering and the construction of survival shelters was packed into the four day program. Even a number of Staff (Mr Kay, Mr Trend, Mrs Mason, Mr Davies and others) visited the Campsite to participate in some of the activities with different groups of boys during their day visits. It was a great camp with a good balance between meeting personal and group challenges. The camp provided students with practical participation and some theory components, with an emphasis on co-operation, experiential learning and safety included, with a lot of fun thrown in for good measure. All students and staff had an enjoyable time and look forward to the Katitjin camp next year.

The Year 9 camp took place in August, where once again relatively fine conditions prevailed in Dwellingup. This camp was similar to the Year 8 camp but in a more developmental way and involved a progression from previous activities where learnt skills were really put to the test. "By Daring and By Doing", the school motto, took on a greater meaning with students being involved in a series of group and individual challenges during the four day program. Once again everyone had a great time with white water rafting being a huge hit even in the cold water conditions. Students and staff didn't have time to get too cold as they

were busy and involved in each of the sessions and the only time to recharge was at night with a well earned rest.

The Year 10 Expeditions were an extension of the Year 8 and Year 9 outdoor education program. The expeditions provided for both the practical side of outdoor education as well as the experiential learning aspect in an appropriately challenging environment full of adventure, excitement and diversity. With an emphasis on safety and organisation, students were encouraged to develop a growing sense of competence in dealing with the natural environment at an appropriately challenging level. Students were able to choose an expedition commensurate with their abilities and interests to the Pilbara, Kalbarri or Dwellingup regions. This unique opportunity existed for all Year 10 students in the first week of Term 4 and is always considered one of the highlights of the Year 10 program.

The 10 day Pilbara Safari was probably the most demanding trip involving a series of "Gorge Hops" through the Karijini National Park. Exploration was by way of hiking, climbing and travelling through the Gorge Pools on air mattresses with gear and equipment carried in a backpack. Mr Sofoulis led the group with Mr Hyde, Mr Holt and Mr Warburton and as some of the photos show we went to some unique, interesting and challenging locations. The boys had a fantastic time and will talk about their experiences for a long time yet.

The 5 day Kalbarri Round the Bend tour involved hiking, climbing and camping from Z-Bend to Four Ways following the Murchison Gorges. Students also had an opportunity to canoe along the Murchison River, try to catch some fish, and trek across and along the river on horse back. Once again providing an opportunity for boys to develop and put into practice their outdoor skills. Mr Solomon, Mr Johnson, Mr Keenan and Mr Verco all managed to keep their groups in tow with a great time had by all. Once again Mr Solomon managed to catch the smallest fish despite his wealth of fishing experience.





SENIOR RUGBY TOUR: Queensland



Half way through the end of first term holidays, a large squad of 32 senior rugby players departed for what would turn out to be a very intense, challenging, rewarding and memorable pre-season training camp. The base for this was the very impressive Sports Super Centre at Runaway Bay, providing excellent accommodation, training field, synthetic match field, pool, weights room, lecture rooms and a plethora of other support services. It also proved to be a terrific base from which to prepare for matches and to attack the tourist spots of the Gold Coast.

The WRUFS group had been working for a long time to support the tour, and all members were keen to get the most from the trip in terms of individual development and team performance. With the first and last days of the tour taken up with travel, over the eight days "in camp", the boys were involved in 14 training sessions and three matches. A heavy program, but one which all boys approached with enthusiastic determination. I am reminded that being able to inspire students to love music, and the rewards of seeing them take their music beyond their graduation from school, is the reason I am in this profession. And this is where it is obvious that you and your institution have excelled."

"After watching your students perform, I now feel it's about time I showed my students that music is much more than scores at competitions. A chance to meet students abroad, pursuing the same passion for music, is far more rewarding than a medal at a competition. Thank you for helping me put my sails back on course!"

Of course the tour gave the boys ample time to empty their (or their parents') pockets at various venues around Singapore. We were regular visitors at places such as Bugis markets and Sim Lim Square where the boys picked up many

The Prefects' aim of "leaving the school a better place for having had us as leaders" encapsulated 2005 through both the introduction of a number of new educational and student activities and the consolidation and expansion of existing programs, with many of them reaching new heights of achievement and excellence. The Prefects set out to make a difference and their lead has been followed and extended by many others.

The highlights of the year included:

- our swimming domination of both state relay and PSA events
- the senior Future Problem Solvers finishing sixth in the world
- the arts tour and the musical and dramatic performances and successes
- the Katiljin trial
- the re-invigoration of community service
- our first entry in the national Pedal Prix
- 1st XI soccer again sharing the PSA trophy.

Wesley's 2004 TEE results, with two General Exhibitions and high rankings in both TEE and WSA subjects, set the scene for significant academic achievement. We again demonstrated that high standards of endeavour and achievement are valued by and aspired towards by most students. The Endeavour Awards and, particularly, the increased numbers of Gold Endeavour Certificates reflect the strong academic culture across all year groups and the determination of so many to "do their best". This culture is also very evident in the Speech Night academic prizes and in the certificates presented to recognise Academic Excellence, Academic Distinction and Progress and Achievement in individual subjects.

The Speech Night prizes for citizenship and service made to students in each year group represent the strongest recognition of what being at Wesley is really about: in acknowledging outstanding contributions, leadership and service across the full range of college life and activities, these awards provide a measure of influence, benefit and changes fostered in others' behaviours – the true test of leadership.

Our dominance in swimming was emphatic: led by Kris Taylor and Russell Jensen and so ably coached by Mr Nick Watkins, our teams won the state schools relay championship, the quadrangular carnival by 400 points and the PSA inters by 200 points, to make two consecutive wins and our third overall. The 1st XI soccer also won for the third time and, again, shared the trophy with Hale. Sport at all levels remains an important part of the educational program because the learning of self-discipline, teamwork and co-operation all essential to sporting success transfers to other spheres and other activities. The most successful under-age was the Year 9 Rugby XV who finished their season undefeated.

Two Future Problem Solving teams traveled to Lexington in Kentucky in June to represent Australia – both teams and the reserves performed with distinction, with the senior team finishing 6th out of 55 in the international

competition. Three groups competed in the nationals in Sydney in October but none won international selection. Stephen Barrett was honoured as the recipient of the Torrance Award for his outstanding contribution to Future Problem Solving in Australia in 2004/05.

Another Future Problem Solver, Dustin Stuart, won a Bronze Medal at the international Chemistry Olympiad held in Taiwan. Dustin was the sole Western Australian representative and he also achieved a distinction in the Australian Mathematical Olympiad. David Myers won national selection in an AIS Australian Rules football development squad. There were many other outstanding individual and group achievements in a diverse range of outside activities and competitions, ranging from Young Achievement, yachting, hockey, football, mathematics, music in all forms, young writers, plan your own enterprise, photography, the science quiz and the DAS competition.

Many new and continuing community service programs gained widespread support during the year. These included Shave for a Cure, headlined by Mr Frank Wood who shone after his sacrifice, Pancake Day, Stephen Barrett and Tom Sippe addressing the City of South Perth Anzac Day service, breast cancer awareness and the purple bra day, the Relay for Life, Sunnies for Sight, Red Nose day, the boarders' winter sleep out and the LoteFest tsunami fundraiser. The initiatives are significant: the adoption of the Bathigama school in Sri Lanka, with the two visits by students and staff and the fund and equipment gathering activities, Year 11s working in the North Perth soup kitchen, Year 10s helping clean up the South Perth foreshore and Year 9s working with the senior citizens and meals on wheels. Wesley is truly making a difference in the community!

The standards and profile of arts-based activities reached a new high in 2006 – with the Arts Tour to Singapore and the quality of student work fully evident in the exhibition spaces of the new visual arts, design and technology building, student photographs are regularly displayed about the campus and the





The Night of Nights saw sartorial Year 12s sashay into the Hyatt looking sensational.

Following a period of planned evaluation that occurred during the latter part of 2004 we entered the year with considerable momentum and energy. With several new staff appointments, an extra Year 6 class and several other initiatives under way, including those at College level, there has been a great deal happening in the Middle School this year!

Several of the new staffing appointments were made to enable us to carry out key initiatives in the academic program. Following on from a commitment made last year to develop more middle schooling practices in Year 8, Mrs Sinden was appointed as Year 8 Team Leader to implement ideas previously developed by a project team. In particular, two integrated units were developed – "Getting Started", where during the first few weeks of the year staff from many subjects taught a range of learning skills, and "Septic Solutions", involving boys working in teams to develop a solution to a global problem and then presenting to an audience of students, staff and outside experts. Both units were evaluated highly by the boys, and modified versions of these will continue as part of the program. Mr Verco also joined our Year 8 team, adding further expertise in Science and Mathematics.

There were also staffing changes across Years 5 – 7. Ms Pickering brought a strong understanding of Environmental Science to the Year 7 program through the rejuvenated Science Fair. The event involved many staff and external judges who were very excited by the outcomes. Following a decision to create a third class, Mr Kennedy and Ms Thunder joined Mrs Sawyer to form our Year 6 team. This was the first step in forming a more continuous group of students from Year 5 through to Year 7, with the final stage being an extra Year 5 class in 2006. This will provide the opportunity to develop a greater flow in boys' learning over these years.

Changes in the academic program across the Middle School included the development of a "thinking curriculum" continuum, where specific skills were taught at each year level and within particular subjects, and the incorporation of "Smartboard" technology into the classrooms. More time was provided for the Staff teams to undergo professional development, plan programs and incorporate these initiatives. Topics included thinking skills, "Rock and Water", students with special needs, resilience for adolescents, Mathematics, data management and middle schooling.

With increased numbers of staff and students and the many initiatives in place, Mr Manley's role changed from a K – 8 Academic Dean to that of Assistant Head of Middle School, which gave more time to focus on the monitoring and development of the academic program within the Middle School. His academic focus complemented the Assistant Head of Middle School role of Mrs Mason who could now focus on pastoral programs and initiatives, especially those related to the increased intake of younger boys. At the same time, Mrs Brown brought her great experience of Wesley and boys when she joined us in Reception.

Several staff also supported professional development activities by presenting at local, national and international conferences (Mr Manley, Mrs Mason Mr Kay, Mr Verco, Mrs Sinden and Mrs Scarparolo), and during the year staff carried out teaching and learning projects on reading (Mr Dawkins and Ms Hunt), Mathematics (Mr Verco) and "Smartboards" (Mrs Sinden). Mr Kay also conducted a workshop at the International Boys' Schools Coalition Conference in Washington DC, and represented professional groups at forums on two Federal Government initiatives, namely boys' schooling and the teacher quality program. When attending interstate conferences several staff took opportunities to visit other schools demonstrating best practice and we were very pleased to reciprocate with many visits to Wesley by visitors from schools in Perth, interstate and overseas.

The pastoral program has again been very dynamic. The mentoring of new boys by current boys and their families has now become a firmly established practice within the Middle School. With more boys entering Wesley at younger ages this particular practice has become quite complex but we know how vital it is, not just for new boys, but also for the opportunity it provides for service by the current boys. Boys joining Wesley in Year 8 next year have already been given the opportunity to meet with their tutor. Changes to our model of tutoring seem to have been a great success, with Year 7 staff taking on the primary pastoral care of their classes and Year 8 tutors focusing on the needs of boys in that year group. Another focus for the year has been the development of strategies to address bullying, which research indicates is a key issue in the pastoral care of students in the middle years of their schooling. Following the work done in recent years with boys and parents, along

with further professional development for staff, several strategies have been developed over the year in readiness for the introduction of a College Student Bullying Policy.

Developments in our co-curricular program included the introduction of a more skills-based Year 5 Sport program and the development of a more "hands-on" approach to our service program. Initiatives included Chess Club visits to South Perth elderly citizens, Year 7 letter-writing to students at Wesley High School in New Guinea, a Year 8 service program, meal preparation at Ronald McDonald House by staff and our first Year 8 visit to Christmas Island and Cocos Islands. It was very exciting to host Year 10 students from Cocos Islands later in the year! Across a very successful sporting season there was a sense that the younger boys are performing much more strongly at the inter-school carnivals, particularly athletics and cross-country; a testament to the positive impact the running club is continuing to have on our approach, training and performances. To further encourage stronger performances in Athletics, age championships were introduced this year to complement the standards competition. The new Art Club held its first exhibitions, and Year 8 students helped construct the vehicle for the "Pedal Prix".

There have also been further initiatives in the development of stronger relationships between older and younger boys, as well as boys and their families. Our two Middle School Prefects, Kyran Wheatley and Peter Anthonisz were terrific in organising games for the younger boys and small group discussions between Year 6 and Year 12 boys, as well as acting as mentors for individual boys requiring support. There are now parent representatives at each Year level to complement the work of House representatives. We have been delighted

by the increased number of parent activities organized over the course of the year. We concluded the year with a revised format for our Year 8 Valedictory, when boys are received by the Senior School Staff and boys. In the spirit of the evening boys had more opportunities to show their talents and reflect on the year. Consistent with the fine Chapel singing during the year a particular highlight was a surprise item by all boys - the singing of "Guide Me O Thou Great Redeemer", one of Mr Kay's favourites! It was a fitting finale from Ms Button, who conducted the item before leaving after several years of teaching the Performing Arts in the Middle School.



There are so many other features of Middle School life that are ongoing; the terrific leadership again shown by boys through the Houses and the Student Forum is perhaps one of the best examples of this. Changes will continue to occur through our own initiatives, through decisions within the wider College and by government decisions. The development of the new Year 9 program, for example, is consistent with the increased self-responsibility being given to our Year 8 students in their learning. In closing, I know that next year will be equally exciting, innovative and challenging, and that there will again be plenty more to report upon with great joy and enthusiasm next year!

The Year 8 boys enjoyed many new experiences this year in a learning environment that was vibrant and engaging. Innovations in the curriculum like *Getting Started* and *Septic Solutions* provide opportunities for the boys to understand their learning and take responsibility for it.

Within the classroom we had chance to use the Smartboard – an interactive computer screen. We also had "Verco dollars" for good practice in Mathematics, body painting in Art and a visit from Dean Alston in Society and Environment to teach us about political cartoons. Science Week was fantastic and Tony Eaton, our author in residence inspired the boys with his stories as he supported and extended them with their short story writing.

Outside the classroom, a visit to the Forest Hills Discovery Centre gave us understanding and connection to traditional indigenous Australian culture. We learned to find bush tucker, track animals, make glue, create shelter and fire but most of all the boys enjoyed the stories of manhood. A night excursion to ECU to sit under the stars and take in Shakespeare's *The Tempest* was also enlightening and uplifting.



The visit by a small group of boys to Cocos Island and Christmas Island proved to be a very special cultural experience for those lucky enough to be offered the opportunity to go and the Ski Trip was great fun for those who enjoy the thrill of the snowy slopes.

Year 8 Camp at Dwellingup, where we were woken by the sounds of the Rev's bagpipes one morning and Mr Hurley's version of "Tequila" on the trumpet the next, was a special treat indeed. White water rafting, canoeing, mountain bike riding, surviving a "plane crash", abseiling, climbing and a high ropes course proved a great way for the boys to get to know each other and the staff better.

Visits from Tony Christiansen, Boori Pryor and Dr Karl were entertaining and reminded us of the important things in life – work hard to find your gifts and then find out where you can contribute them to the world in which you live. The Home Based Community Service project reminded us to be grateful for what we have and be of assistance to those who support us and the Chapel Committee provided some wonderful Chapel services that enabled the boys to take the time to reflect on life and the values we hold dear.

Opportunities in the co-curricular included dance sport, chess and debating in addition to the wealth of sporting options provided for the boys. Our Year 8 boys performed with credit in the Interhouse and Interschool Swimming and Athletics. The summer teams of basketball, volleyball, tennis and waterpolo in Terms 1 & 4 enveloped the winter sports of rugby, soccer,



hockey, cross country and football in Terms 2 & 3 and by all accounts the teams performed commendably. The boys also enjoyed their first experience of the Klem Cup in term 4 with the Tug of War and Ergo Rowing.

Radio Middle School was a great experience for all involved and the Year 8 boys also helped out in the construction of the bicycle used in the Wesley College entry in the Pedal Prix.

Leadership opportunities were provided for the boys elected by their peers to the student forum and house leadership roles. My thanks are extended to those boys who served so well during the year.

This is the first time Wesley College has appointed a Year 8 Team Leader and it has been my pleasure to serve in this role this year. I look forward to following their journey and contributions to the College in the years ahead.

Learning is a Journey...



2005 has again been a very busy year!

Physical Education classes in Pre Primary to Year 4 started the year with swimming lessons. "Before school" swimming training was held twice a week with swimmers working towards several events.

This event was held on Tuesday 22 February at Aquinas College, during the evening.

Wesley College Champions Swimming Carnival

Held at Challenge Stadium during the evening of 1 March.

JSHAA Combined Swimming Carnival

Held during the evening of 8 March.

JSHAA Co-ed Schools Interschool Swimming Carnival

Held on Thursday 10 March at Wesley College, during the morning.

Wesley College Manning House Interhouse Swimming Carnival

Held on Friday 18 March at Wesley College, during the morning.

Swimming culminated in the Junior School Inter-house Swimming Carnival, where students were able to show off their swimming skills and their fitness.

Physical Education classes continued throughout the year developing Fundamental Movement Skills. These skills are the skills needed for physical activity and include the

skills of locomotion (eg walking, running, skipping, galloping and hopping) body management (eg balancing, tumbling, landing and dodging) and object control (eg throwing, striking and trapping).

During Term 2 Running Training was introduced with students participating in a variety of fitness activities with Cross Country and Athletics in mind.

Term 3 saw the return of the Cross Country season with "before school" training three times a week. The Team participated in the Wesley College Middle School Cross Country Championships running in the Year 5 event. This was to give runners the experience of running in a big field on unfamiliar territory.

The Junior School Cross Country Team (a girls team and a boys team) then competed in the JSHAA Co-ed Schools Cross Country Championships at Perry Lakes on Thursday 25 August. Lara Perkovic came 19th in the Year 4 Girls race with Jayden Lewis 4th, Harry Cassell 7th, Bremer Moore 12th and Cameron Robertson 20th in the Year 4 Boys' race.

The Junior School Team travelled with Middle School to Guildford where they competed in the Year 4 events for girls and boys. Chloe Costa came 7th, Alexandria Boehm came 10th and Marilla Chester came 17th. These were wonderful results after many weeks of training for such a young group of students. It is to be noted that many of our runners came from Year 3 and some even from Year 1. Well done!

Athletics training then started with training sessions three times each week.

The JSHAA Interschool Athletics Carnival was the goal for those who came to "training" and a strong squad was selected to compete at Aquinas College on Thursday 22 September. Students from Years 1, 2, 3 and 4 made up this squad.

From this squad a team was formed to compete at the JSHAA Co-ed Schools Athletics Carnival, which was held at All Saints College on Thursday 27 October.

Teams of eight boys and eight girls competed at this carnival and a great day was had by all.

During Week 9 of Term 3 the Life Education Van visited Wesley College. All students from Kindergarten to Year 7 spent sessions in the van during the week. The Life Van has been visiting the College for a number of years and presents a program which promotes a Healthy Lifestyle.

The Junior School Inter-house Athletics carnival showcased the work that students have done in Physical Education throughout the year. Students competed individually and in teams. Team games highlight teamwork and skills that have been developed in Physical Education lessons. These games have the added difficulty of working under pressure.

Field events were conducted in the weeks leading up to the Carnival and all students in Years 2 and 3 competed in a Kanga ball throw and Long Jump events while Year 4 students all competed in Triple and Long Jump events as well as a Kanga ball throw.

Physical Education in Term 4 concentrated on Aquatics from Pre Primary to Year 4 with the main emphasis being placed on Water Safety.

Swimming training sessions were conducted before school, twice a week leading up to the Southside Dolphins Schools Challenge, which was held during the evening of Thursday 24 November.

performing arts

Creative music-making and dance have taken a predominant role in Performing Arts for 2005.

Inspired by a project from Reggio Emilia, where the National Ballet Company had worked with young children to create a ballet, the Year 2 classes were encouraged to take on a dance project. It was decided to make a ballet about mice.

The classes observed mice and copied their movements. After watching dancers on video

and talking about what makes a dance, we stylised the movements and created the structure of the ballet. Will Price, a Year 12 student, worked with the children to compose computer generated music for the ballet.

After much discussion and drawing, the children came up with ideas for stage props and costumes. The finished product was performed at the Biennial JSHAA Music Festival at the Perth Concert Hall.

The Taiko Drums and Flutes of Japan, a duo who visited the school, demonstrated the art of Japanese drumming as part of their very exciting performance for the Junior School. A lot was discovered about Japanese music and culture from this incursion.

The visit to His Majesty's Theatre to watch a performance of the ballet "Cinderella" was greatly enjoyed by Year 3 and 4 and the girls in Pre Primary, Year 1 and 2. Each class had been involved in music and movement lessons and were able to relate to the idea of a story being told by dance.

JUNIOR SCHOOL: Performing Arts

During the year the Pre Primary classes did a considerable amount of creative music-making. PPY recorded their dinosaur music and made covers for their CDs. PPB made up "robot" dances and worked with Year 9 students to create computer generated music to accompany their creations. The children made costumes and performed their group dances for parents. This music was also recorded and the children made covers for their CDs.

A highlight of the Performing Arts classes for Year 1, was the work done with a musical version of *"Baba Yaga"*. This was a Russian myth that children acted out using pictures they had drawn, instrumental accompaniment to songs, sound effect and a dance.

Year 3 began Term 1 with a class theme about water. Anything to do with water was closely examined. Shells, the ocean and fish were described and then we created musical sounds to represent these things. This work evolved into a production for parents, with the students writing short scripts, composing music to accompany their stories and the creation of an underwater scene using various pieces of material hung from the ceiling. This was a process that provided the students with a wide

range of Performing Arts experiences.

Along with their Recorder lessons, the Year 4 classes did some very interesting creative music-making topic. An activity, that was particularly well done, was a group task to musically represent different textures of material. It has been an absolute pleasure to teach such an amazing group of students this year! We were certainly impressed with the Year 4s' mature sense of community, leadership, responsibility, sportsmanship and academic attitude.

This year was a time when the children familiarised themselves with other members of the class, negotiated classroom rights and responsibilities, and began to develop lasting friendships and work routines. We fostered in the children independence, a responsibility for their own learning and acceptance of individual rights.

In Term 1 the children participated in exploring the exciting world of 'Charlotte's Web'. This literature based program provided the students with opportunities to develop literacy

appreciation, thinking skills and speaking and listening experiences. We used De Bono's, *Six Thinking Hats* to explore issues relating to 'Friendship' and challenged the children to consider the thoughts and feelings of others. This term saw the introduction of the 'Four Roles of the Reader' program which continued throughout the year. The Swimming Carnival was a major success and thoroughly enjoyed by all students and teachers in Year 4.

During Term 2 we were very lucky to have Mrs Hirte join us! Our focus for the term was to communicate ideas and information co-operatively through developing our own 'Societies'. By giving each group the name of a focus topic, such as Green and Slimy, the children had to initiate ideas, text and subjects to create an entirely fictional world and publish their own society book. Another main highlight

was working with two talented authors and illustrators, Mark Greenwood and Frane Lessac (who could forget that fabulous book launch night!).

Throughout Term 3 we began our transitions into independent and thoughtful up-and-coming Year 5s. Most of the children became responsible and co-operative learners. As the children worked individually, in groups and as a whole class, they were able to develop varied understandings and gain new knowledge from each other. A focus this term was on the topic of 'Animals and Pets' into which a variety of Learning Areas and activities were integrated. We looked at 'Thing' by Robin Klein, designed a home for a fictitious pet, Habits of Mind, mathematical rotating experiences and Co-operative Reading (*Four Roles of the Reader* by Freebody & Luke). One of the most enjoyable and rewarding aspects of Year 3 in 2005 has been the opportunities undertaken for the Year 3 classes to work together in a shared learning environment and function as part of a group. Rotating English activities have occurred daily throughout the year and rotating Mathematics activities twice weekly. These opportunities have been supportive and nurturing and have encouraged the children to learn collaboratively and independently, within their group.

Our initial major thematic focus centred on the sea and the creatures that live in this diverse and exciting environment. We studied Food Webs, classified the sea creatures into groups, considered the various ways a living can be made from the sea and enjoyed the Tim Winton's novel "Blueback." 3C took up the challenge of making three-dimensional sea

creatures using balloons and paper mache and 3V created two-dimensional fish that are found living in and around coral reefs. Report writing was introduced and the children became familiar with the structure and process of this writing genre. Each child chose a sea creature to research and then wrote a report, organising their information into the categories of body structure, habitat, reproduction, food and movement.

Towards the end of term, with Easter approaching, we focused on the concept of New Life and considered the many creatures that hatch out of eggs. The children consolidated their understanding that eggs symbolise new life and were able to make the symbolic connection between the eggs given at Easter and the Christian belief of the death and resurrection of Christ.

In Term 2 Miss Flugge became 3V's teacher while Ms Venables undertook the role of Acting Head of Junior School. Learning about the journey from cacao bean to chocolate and enjoying both Roald Dahl's novel of "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory" and the movie, provided the children with a very exciting learning focus for this term. In writing, developing expertise in the narrative genre was undertaken. Frane Lessac and Mark Greenwood were 'authors in residence' in the Junior School and their capacity to motivate and engage the children in writing was wonderful. What a fulfilling experience for them to publish their own story, consolidating an understanding of themselves as authors and illustrators.

Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day were acknowledged and celebrated with hand made gifts and cards, prepared with love and care. Knitting was introduced and many children became passionate knitters. It was a common sight during Term 3, when glancing into either of the Year 3 classrooms, to find a group of children knitting, some also engaged in conversation, others just focusing on the task at hand.

Space, our theme for Term 3, coincided with the American space craft Columbia's most recent mission. One of the astronauts on board the space craft was an Australian and this journey into space to the Space Station, engaged the children totally. The experience was wonderful and provided a meaningful context to extend existing knowledge and understandings about all that is relevant to space. Neil Armstrong's historic moon landing in 1963 also created great interest and gave the children a historical perspective of space exploration. They designed and constructed a space craft, modifying their design where necessary and following the technology process through to completion. Early in the term our visit to Scitech and participation in a very realistic space experience, also accelerated the children's motivation to learn more about space.

During Term 3 the Smartboard, a modern piece of technology that encourages interactive learning, was introduced to Year 3 by Ms Cross and used on a daily basis as one of the activities during rotating English activities.

The children responded very positively to this learning tool and took the opportunity to show their Learning Journey visitors how it works. Term 3 ended with a visit to His Majesty's Theatre to see the West Australian Ballet Company's production of "Cinderella." This much loved and familiar story was beautifully presented, employing a blend of romance, humour and intrigue to sustain the children's interest.

Term 4 was short and very busy. Our theme of The Body created intense interest and fascination and on more than one occasion it was expressed that, because there is so much to learn about the body, it should have been our theme in an earlier, longer term. Material borrowed from the Wesley College Science Department provided opportunity for the children to become familiar with the physiology of the human body. 3C dissected an animal heart, causing some consternation, but creating a most meaningful learning context.

3V studied Jeannie Baker's books, closely observing the design, materials and complexities of her collaged illustrations. Our own collages were designed and created and it was clear from the finished products that Jeannie Baker's stunning work had made an impact on the children of 3V.

One of our final stories, a most important story, which helped to consolidate our understanding of the origin of giving in Christian communities, was *"The Nativity."* We made gifts for our family and our Pre Primary buddy and cards for our friends, demonstrating the practice of giving associated with Christmas. We enjoyed another wonderful Christmas story called *"The Legend of the Poinsettia."* This traditional story from Mexico, illustrates how the act of giving at Christmas is of far greater significance than what is actually given.

YEAR 2

Looking back through the year we covered so many interesting themes!

In Term 1 our theme was "Dragons". We read numerous stories which portrayed dragons in many different ways, some traditional and others just a little different. Myths and legends also formed a part of our studies. We looked at stories from around the world and how dragons are portrayed in different cultures.

The students were also busy 'growing tomato plants'. This posed all sorts of investigations including factors that influenced the plant to grow. Once fertiliser, sunshine and water were added to the equation, the plants flourished and by the end of term they were ready to wrap for Mother's day presents (at the beginning of Term 2). Early in the term, 2M presented an Assembly Item on the virtue of responsibility. This was created solely by the boys and they did a terrific job. For our 'water babies' first term was a popular one, with swimming lessons once a week and the swimming carnival. Mrs McKenna went on Maternity Leave at the end of Term 1 and Mrs Webber returned from

Long Service Leave at the beginning of Term 2. "Trees" was the theme for Term 2. We looked at the concept of photosynthesis and learnt about the importance of this cycle to humans. It was lovely to watch the changing of the leaves on the trees outside and to use them for our science work. We looked at the characteristics of leaves and described them using four of our five senses. We also grouped these leaves in accordance with their observable characteristics, this tied in really well with the study on adjectives we did in our language time.

There were 2 'major events' in Year 2 this term. The first one being visits by Author Mark Greenwood and Illustrator Frane Lessac. The students were so motivated during these visits and they got the opportunity to participate in the writing process from brainstorming – drafting – editing – publishing. This hard work was celebrated at a Book Launch where children shared their stories. The second one was the

"Junior Schools Heads' Association of Australia Music Festival". The Year 2 children, along with Mrs Jackson, worked tirelessly to rehearse and present an item called Mice. This involved a lot of dancing and singing and the entire experience was thoroughly enjoyed.

The theme in Term 3 was "The Animal Kingdom", which complemented the work we did in Term 2. Each week we learned about a different group of animals, starting with the five groups of vertebrates. We had a lot of fun discovering the characteristics of each group. We learnt about haiku poems and rhyming couplets and wrote many poems about animals.

We also practised mapping skills using alphanumeric grids and created our own maps. Our excursion to the zoo was a highlight for the children as they were able to practise their mapping skills as well as consolidating their learning about animals and their coverings.



The 2005 school year has been a most wonderful and inspiring learning journey. In Kindergarten the teachers and students have helped each other to develop collaborative learning skills and friendships. Our goal throughout this year has been to nurture a sense of beauty and wonder within our space as we feel that the "environment" reflects our thoughts as educators and students, our feelings as individuals and ultimately the way we view the world. This in turn cultivates an awareness of connection for the children to our centre and to the school. Relationships and community have been important aspects of our program which focused on building meaningful interactions between children, teachers and families. Virtues such as sharing, responsibility and consideration were threaded through the program so that these were mentioned and practiced on a daily basis and as such the children have grown in their understandings of social relationships.

We have enjoyed bringing the outside in and the inside out and many activities involved observational drawing displays of wild life or nature. The children often found small creatures and objects outside such as snails, worms or leaves and had fun examining and representing these in drawings, paintings or clay.

At the commencement of Term 1 through an investigation of colour and light the momentum for one of our projects was born. The children displayed an interest in the blue and green dye colours that we had put out, so we focused on these and supplied further materials for the children to explore. Over the weeks that followed the children began to talk about creatures such as crabs and other marine organisms and their environments. Plenty of discussion took place in the sand and water areas and the children created rock pools where we added pebbles, rocks and seaweed. A sea turtle was bought in from the museum

to provoke the children's thoughts and investigations about the turtle commenced. The children's sense of wonder and obvious delight at the creature that had found its way into their space proved to be a motivating starting point. What to name him was their first concern, (Franklin, of course)..... is he real was their second dilemma. Discussions ensued about this concept during all forms of play, in the block corner, in the socio-dramatic area, at the graphics table and also in the book corner. The consensus was that he was indeed real just not alive.

The children took great pleasure in representing Franklin through observational drawings, paintings, clay models and story research which flowed from the children. This enthusiasm surged throughout Term 1 and continued into Term 2.

A parallel focus in the form of a large blue crab was then placed in the Kindergarten and the children began to observe the features of this fascinating creature and there commenced a new cycle of observations, representations and discussions. We continued to revisit the blue crab and worked on a collaborative textile over Term 2 and three to represent this particular venture.



Throughout this year we have shared an exciting and fun learning journey which was made easier through Miss Draper's brilliant assistance and the fabulous parent support and friendship.
