Speech Night Address



We are fortunate at Wesley College to have many outstanding, deeply committed teachers of the highest calibre and it is our loss that, for a number of them, this is their last Wesley Speech Night. Leaving us at the end of this year are two long-serving senior staff members, Mr Rod Barrett and Ms Raffaella Fecondi.

Mr Rod Barrett has taught at Wesley College for 26 years and was Head of Mathematics for 17 of those years. Almost unanimously named by our Year 12 leavers each year as a teacher who made a lasting impact, Rod will be remembered for his decency and thorough professionalism, his level of care and commitment to his students and the depth of his mathematical knowledge. He would be one of the first teachers selected in my "all-star" team.

Ms Raffaella Fecondi joined Wesley College seven and a half years ago as Assistant to the Headmaster (RAVE and Retreats) to focus on the delivery of our Philosophy & Ethics program. She was also Assistant to the Head of Senior School for two years and, since 2011, has been the Director of Student Wellbeing. In this latter role she was responsible for the planning and development, the implementation and the refining of our social emotional curriculum. She also worked closely with a number of students who experienced personal difficulties. With her high level of intellect, combined with her enormous capacity to care for and nurture her students, Raf is also one of our finest teachers.

Mr Rod Barrett and Ms Raffaella Fecondi will both be sorely missed next year. Please join with me in thanking them and all of our staff for their wonderful contribution to Wesley.

Tonight, we also celebrate the first anniversary of four key appointments:

- Head of Middle School, Mr Peter Dunning
- Chaplain, Rev. Nalin Perera
- Head of the Arts, Mrs Penny Reiss
- Head of Boarding, Mr David Bourne

Each, in their own way, has made their mark, having stepped into some difficult shoes to fill.

I would also thank the Year 12 student body for their leadership of the College community. They have been a cohesive and spirited group which has embraced much of what Wesley is and always will be. Aply led by the student executive, Harrison Main, Ethan Dodd, Benjamin Manifold and Jarrod Curtin, their style has been characterised by a level of thoughtfulness and deeper interest in College operations not seen for some time.

As most of you are probably aware one of the central tenets of the College's strategic intent is the quality of its staff.

Through life we are given continual opportunities to grow and to transform ourselves. "Man is nothing else but that which he makes of himself," said Jean Paul Sartre. While it is true that each of us is responsible for the person we continue to become, the age-old proverb that it takes a village to raise a child is also true. Wesley is proud to play its part in the growth of all its students into active citizens who engage fully in the world with thoughtfulness, creativity and connection to others.

One of the main ways that Wesley impacts upon each student is through the teachers he or she encounters on their Wesley journey. As well as the powerful effect of positive relationships with teachers, research shows us that it is classroom teaching which has the biggest impact, on student learning.

With this in mind, along with Wesley's vision to be an innovative learning community, we have been working to find the best ways to improve student learning by supporting our teachers.

Last year we conducted research into ways to give teachers the support and tools to make their classrooms places where the most passionate, engaging and effective learning happens. This year a diverse group of 12 teachers spread across all three sub-schools (called the Professional Learning Project team) worked together to trial what we believed to be the most Wesley-appropriate ways to apply the international research in our own context. They trained in a globally recognised framework for effective teaching, in lesson observations and in Cognitive Coaching, with the goal of improving the learning of their students. Through refining their own teaching practice and capacity for self-reflection by working together as a reflective community of professional learners, this group of people has modelled a commitment to striving for continuous improvement. The work that this team of teachers has done this year will be built upon in 2014 in a more focussed pilot trial and then beyond, with the aim to embed this type of practice in our professional culture.

Additionally, over the last two years, more than 30 teachers have taken part in a customised internal 'Leadership Development Program' (aligned with the Australian College of Educational Leaders). This program comprises theoretical and project-based elements. Other staff have also worked with an external instructional coach over a three year period.

At Wesley we talk a lot about our focus on a holistic education that emphasises the development of the well-balanced man/woman who wants to go out into the world and make a difference. To varying degrees all schools make this promise. Wesley makes this a reality through various approaches in our attempts to reach that overarching goal. I have been poignantly reminded of this in the various celebration assemblies and functions held over the last few days. A few of the programs and initiatives through which we endeavour to honour are:

- The co-educational nature of our Junior School
- The nature of our Years 5 - 8 Middle School
- The Katitjin Program for Year 8 students
- The focus on Service, both in the curriculum and outside of the classroom
- The Indigenous program
- A positive, rather than punitive orientation, to behaviour development
- The breadth of course offerings in senior years
- Inclusive opportunities for Special Needs students
- The subtlety that comes with the focus on the pursuit of excellence, as opposed to a focus on winning
- The Social/Emotional curriculum that has been developed Pre-Kindergarten to Year 12.

I have long held the view that parents are the primary educator of their children and that much of the real work is done before a child reaches the age of 10. Thus, character and values formation largely occur in the home. The College environment hopefully shapes and develops this, adds layers of richness and takes it beyond the environment of the family into the 'social and real' worlds of our young men.

The notion of community, of being a 'man for others', of social justice and making a difference, is firmly grounded in the words and actions of John Wesley as he founded the Methodist Church. They are firmly embedded in the principles of Christ's teachings of love.

In the middle years, boys' minds are perhaps more open to broadening their thinking in this domain. Arguably they tend to get a bit lost (rather than closed) amongst competing priorities for time, energy and a lack of thinking outside of one's realm through the early years of the Senior School, before returning with a sharpened focus of what it is to find and know one's place in the world.

The Year 6 piece you just witnessed was a part of their Service Learning curriculum, where they learnt about the children who live in dire poverty on the rubbish dumps in Cambodia. Through the \$1 a day food challenge they walked in the shoes of these children and raised money through a community service project for a school in Cambodia. They learnt that these children receive little or no education and are often trapped in the cycle of poverty for all their lives. They learnt that, even though they have so little in their lives, they remain positive in the face of adversity. Through dance, drama, music and song they give a voice to those in need. The strong focus on local issues of homelessness during the Katitjin program should further develop their exposure to, and understanding of, these key social justice community-based issues. This can't be measured in a NAPLAN or WACE test. The challenge, of course, is for the boys to transfer this learning into real action and the manner in which they go about their lives on a day-to-day basis over the long term.

And now I want to share with you two personal stories that mean a lot to me and say much about Wesley's 'culture' and its focus on what kind of community we want to be and the type of person we want to nurture.

On Tour Days one of the things I often say is that every student I have ever encountered has a special talent (even if it takes some a little longer to uncover it) and that if they so choose, Wesley offers a breadth of opportunities as well as support structures in place to enable them to discover and nurture that talent or interest.

It is commonly accepted that people work harder and tend to do better if they are interested in something, that success breeds success – and that success favourably impacts other areas of one's life.

The young man I want to talk about (let's call him Jack) – with the permission of both him and his family – has, to be brutally honest, not found his schooling experience to be easy, positive or overly successful on any external measure. Some might even say that it is something of a surprise that this year sees him graduating from Wesley with his WACE certificate and something more.

In Year 10 Jack went about as close to being asked to leave the College as one can. He was disengaged, unfocussed and became involved in some significant behavioural and disciplinary situations.

In showing cause as to why he should be allowed to remain at Wesley he made a commitment to make some significant attitudinal changes. It would be fair to say that for much of the subsequent time here he did just enough to stay off the radar (and even this was aided by the fact that we proactively followed up, rather than waited for problems to resurface).

However, sometime early in Year 11 he uncovered (and had the courage to nurture) a talent for singing. Lessons from Mr Mark Underwood ensued and I was fortunate to hear a recording later that year. What makes this an even more interesting and compelling story is that it usually isn't too cool to discover singing as your "special" talent in an all-boys' school at the age of 16 and to then be prepared to do something about it.

When I heard Jack sing *Home* for the first time in a live performance earlier this year, I am happy to admit I was brought to tears.

Jack's experience demonstrates the power of persistence, of compassion, of being open to new experiences and of being courageous and more so that an educational journey is a very individual thing that cannot be simply summed up in a league table.

This is just one story that makes me so proud of the "Jacks" of our community, of being a College named in honour of John Wesley where love, compassion, social justice and integrity are fundamental pillars of what it means to be a Wesley graduate.

My challenge to each leaver in 2013 is to use their Wesley experience as a springboard to go on to bigger and better things, both personally and as a man for others.

In my desire to bring all of this together I want to share with you some excerpts of a letter I received from one of our 2013 graduates earlier this week. I have used this young man's words verbatim and note at the outset that while he was an excellent student, he was not one of our high profile superstars, but a quiet, diligent, committed student who gained much as a result of what he put in to his time at Wesley.

"I therefore wish to thank you for creating a culture where such students like me are able to thrive in a supportive environment... I am certain when I say this, without the Wesley culture which has supported me from day one, I would not be walking on the exciting road that lays before me....Early on I went to the ANZAC Service in Canberra with some other boys. This was perhaps the moment I realised how my Wesley experience was not solely about academics, but a wholesome, spiritual and community-involved education which was what Wesley really had to offer. Up early for the Dawn Service, I made a promise to myself that I would make the most of the opportunities that Wesley had offered....Above all, Wesley has provided me with a good group of close friends. Wesley had the right environment and culture to create and nurture friendships and rivalries, success and failure. Failure was not a concept Wesley shied away from; as the greatest successes can only come after many failures. I look back on the many events and activities, the Year 12 Ball and Valedictory Night, and hope that I don't forget a single face or name, or the fun that I had. Even though these are but memories, Wesley has provided me with a clear path that I now want to follow. My roots will always be that of a proud Wesleyan, wherever my life now takes me. I simply wish to thank you for making me into the man I am today, and giving me many cherished memories".

I have read this letter numerous times this week and remain blown away by the depth of insight and meaning that this young man has taken from his time at Wesley, even if he gives us more credit than we are due. I only wish I could bottle it!

In closing, thank you for your continued support over the course of 2013. I wish you and yours a safe and blessed Christmas period and look forward to sharing further in the journey next year.

It now gives me enormous pleasure to welcome Jack Robertson (the young man I have just talked about) and the Radio Orchestra onto the stage to perform Michael Bubl 's *Home*, apt in this very Wesley setting.

Speech Night Address

It is my privilege and pleasure to address you on behalf of my fellow Council colleagues. The enjoyment I take from this role is in no small measure a result of their active participation, support and friendship. At times like this I am reminded of what a privilege it is to be involved in the life of Wesley.

I am sad to announce that Mr Philip Thick, who has served on Council for six years commencing in 2008, has had to accept he can no longer meet the time demands of involvement on Council and retires from Council at the end of the year. Phil was dux of Wesley in 1976. We have lost a most valued and experienced Council member.

This year was marked by the Synod of the Uniting Church in Western Australia approving a revamped and amended constitution for Wesley College. For the past several years we have been reflecting on the College's origins and principles along with our relationship with the Uniting Church in Australia.

The Headmaster and I were delighted to accept the invitation to attend at Synod and be present as the resolution was passed and to receive the gift of a bible as a symbol of the fundamental significance of our bond with the Church.

Thank you, Mrs Dowling, for your role in that exercise and for sharing the vision we have for Uniting Church schools. We respect the faith diversity of all students.

Last year I summarised the record of built fabric created during the 10 year period of tenure of our Headmaster, Mr David Gee.

We are also very proud of the further achievements this year during which we have seen:

- The usage and excitement generated in the refurbishment of our original 1923 Ward building
- The July opening of the fully renovated and rehabilitated Kefford Wing attended by Dr Rod Kefford and my Headmaster, Mr Clive Hamer.

My Headmaster was, and is, a scrupulously fair and honest man, but a tough critic. When Mr Hamer gave the Kefford Wing the 100% tick of approval our achievements were very much validated.

I hope most of you have had the chance to inspect the series of magnificent learning spaces now available in the Kefford and Ward buildings and which will serve well the needs of our students for many years to come.

I invite those who have not been through the buildings to take up that opportunity.

The work on the Ward/Kefford building renovation and refurbishment, including the fit out, was achieved at a cost of \$8.6m.

I thank all involved and particularly our teaching staff, who had significant input into what was required; the builders and architects and the school finance and administration staff, led ably over that period by Mr Geoff Searle, for achieving the outcome on time and on budget.

And what a fantastic effort by the Parents' & Friends' Association (P&F). The P&F is providing \$450,000 funding to the College to assist with the Ward/Kefford building project.

We receive other financial support in the program of building and refurbishment, but the support of the Endowment Fund has been a cornerstone.

I think we can be justifiably proud of the way we have been able to interact with the Fund to preserve and benefit from its corpus. The Fund has preserved its corpus, but at the same time has provided annual payments to meet loan commitments.

Now it is time for the Hamer building and the science quad!

The life of the College is certainly much more than its buildings. The College has always in mind its mission and vision and continues to emphasise the importance of a balanced, holistic education that develops good men and women who strive to both fulfill their potential and make a difference in the world.

There are four key priorities:

- A rich academic experience;
- A focus on students' social-emotional development;
- A positive and collaborative organisational culture;
- The quality of our staff.

As to the last of those, over several years the Council has been looking at ways we can support the teaching staff.

We also appreciate the complexity of their profession in what is a dynamic and changing world and with ever-changing demands of such things as curriculum development and pastoral care.

Therefore, and with the considerable financial support of the Endowment Fund in meeting the cost of the project, Council was pleased to support the initiative now known as the Professional Learning Project.

It is intended to lead to the development of a model that will ultimately support the continued professional development of our staff.

May I confess that, when Council first spoke of it, we termed it "Teacher Quality" and probably because of the findings and writings of researchers and the often quoted finding that "the single most important school variable influencing student achievement" is teacher quality. However, we are very happy with the change of name Professional Learning Project.

We thank those staff who have participated in the 2013 pilot program.

On behalf of the Council, of the students and of their parents, I thank all of you, our professional teaching staff, for another year of hard work and support.

To those of you who will end their time at Wesley this month I thank you for the important role you have played in shaping the lives of the young men and women you have taught and mentored.

Before leaving the staff, I want to express, as I have in the past, our most sincere thanks to Mr David Gee for his leadership, tireless efforts, late night and early morning emails and continued demonstration of his quest to make Wesley the best it can be.

David, I thank you and Anne for your work and support in 2013.

To the parents, family, guardians and friends of the boys, may I thank you for being here tonight and even more so for the support you give us throughout the year.

We trust your sons realise all of this is possible because of the love and support you give them and which enabled them to benefit from the safe environment and privileges afforded them at Wesley.

For those many of you whose son is ending this year, a choice of schooling was a significant one and I extend a special thanks to you for the trust you placed in Wesley and its staff to educate your son.

As a parent of past Wesley students I have some understanding of how you feel tonight. Perhaps a feeling of relief that the fee invoices have stopped, but (I hope) tinged with some sadness that this part of his life of learning is over and your young man is moving on to another chapter.

But another chapter it will be and we are delighted that so many of them chose to embrace all the diverse offerings Wesley provides its students. We hope it sets them up for the challenges ahead.

To the students in particular, I want to speak for just a few minutes about two subjects on which I have had occasion to ponder this year.

One is choice.

Given the many of you who read her books, perhaps you need go no further than J K Rowling who said:

"There is an expiry date on blaming your parents for steering you in the wrong direction; the moment you are old enough to take the wheel, responsibility lies with you."

In your society you have what appear to be largely unfettered rights to make choices. However, that is clearly not the case. At your school you were not free to even dress as you pleased. You were not to bully others. You will think of many, many examples where your choices were, and are, controlled.

When we make choices, they must surely be made mindful of the consequences, not only for ourselves, but also for others.

I suggest that, to date, you have had the active counsel of others; parents, teachers, extended family and friends. They have assisted and sometimes effectively made the choices for you. I hope you thank your parents for the choice they made for your education. That responsibility has now been passed to you.

Another quotation that is apposite is from Eleanor Roosevelt who said:

'In the long run, we shape our lives, and we shape ourselves. The process never ends until we die. And the choices we make are ultimately our own responsibility.'

Eleanor Roosevelt was the longest-serving First Lady of the United States, holding the post from 1933 to 1945 during her husband President Franklin D. Roosevelt's four terms in office.

I can only hope you draw on what Wesley has sought to instil in you and that you make choices with compassion, with a sense of social justice and with a considered awareness of all that will be expected of you from your decisions.

As to the second subject, I have had the pleasure of hearing Ms Begbie, Head of Junior School, in addresses during which she articulates well the simplicity and significance of the word "kind".

This morning, at the Year 4 Celebration Assembly, I heard, as I did last year, Ms Begbie speak of kindness.

She asked only that we all strive to be kind in all we do and to consider the considerable impact it would have if we all chose to act on that simple tenet.

If choices we make are made having in mind being both respectful of the impact on others and always showing kindness, I suspect we would do little wrong and it might just make a difference to our own lives and those around us.

To the Year 12 leavers, congratulations on all you have achieved.

Most of you will feel you can be justly proud of how you grasped chances, strived for your personal best and found ways to express your vast array of different talents.

You have had opportunities not available to every young man of your age. Having had those opportunities you now have an obligation to use your experience and talents for the betterment of not only yourselves and your family and friends, but for others less fortunate.

In closing, may I congratulate you again on your outstanding year with its many achievements. 2013 was a celebration of the 90 year history of the College. You have now played your part.

Leavers, please remember to come back and visit a place at which you will be always welcome. Our best wishes for your success in the future and that you meet and conquer the challenges that lie ahead.

Ms Begbie's plea to the Year 4s this morning was for them to dream big.

At the end of your Year 12 at Wesley we ask you to aim high and tackle life with passion and optimism.

You will reap in the future that which you invest and all of us will watch your progress in anticipation of great things.

I join with my fellow Council members in wishing all of you a happy, safe and peaceful Christmas and holiday period and, in particular for the Year 12s, a wonderful and exciting journey in the years ahead.

ENDOWMENT FUND

The Wesley College Endowment Fund (WCEF) was established in 1982, initially as the recipient for donations and bequests, then admission fees upon their introduction in 1985. The purpose of the Fund is to contribute to the College's building programs, scholarships and projects which enhance the learning and overall school experience for current and future Wesleyans.

The Fund is managed by a Management Committee comprised of Old Wesleyans with various business specialties and a shared commitment to the wellbeing of the Fund and the ongoing success of the College. It has developed a conservative investment policy with protection of the capital base of paramount importance.

Through good corporate governance and sound investment decision-making, the Fund has achieved considerable growth. In the last 10 years alone, it has been able to make disbursements to the College of \$9.2m, and still grow the fund base. The WCEF has contributed to major building projects such as the Joseph Green Centre refurbishment and the Transition (Middle School) Project, as well as Council/Headmaster special one-off projects. In 2013 the Fund contributed \$1.1m towards the Ward/Kefford refurbishment project.

OH, THE PLACES YOU'LL GO

Oh, the Places You'll Go was chosen by the Year 12 graduates of 2013 for the inscription on the plaque covering the time capsule that they buried in the grounds of the College in this its 90th anniversary year.

The laying down of time capsules is a relatively new tradition at Wesley. The intention is that the capsule will be opened at the 10 year reunion of this class of 2013, which will have special significance as it will coincide with the Centenary of the College in 2023.

Few present at the laying of Wesley's foundation stone on 11 November 1922 (or even at the first Speech Night in December 1923) could have envisioned the College as it is today. Few, if any, would have given thought to how it might celebrate its Centenary 100 years from then. Perhaps the exception may have been J F Ward, the first Headmaster who laid the foundations for many of the traditions that continue to the present day and who appears to have had an exceptional sense of his place in the history of the fledgling College. He has been credited with choosing the College colours, the naming of each of the first three Houses (Walton, Moffin and Hardey) after a founding father or benefactor and the creation of the crest and motto.

An enduring legacy of anniversary celebrations allows the Wesley community the opportunity to remember, renew friendships and strengthen bonds and to share new experiences. In Wesley's 21st year, 1944, celebrations were tempered by the loss, in that one year alone, of a further 15 Old Boys in the Service of their country, but in 1948, with peace restored, the 25th anniversary of the College was the focus for a fair at which the college community raised £1,500 for the Memorial Chapel Fund. Fifty years ago the opening of the Olympic swimming pool was a focus of the 40th anniversary celebrations of 1963. To celebrate the 50th anniversary an even more ambitious project was embarked upon. On 13 February 1973, exactly 50 years after the College opened, the foundation stone for the Joseph Green Memorial Centre was laid by Reverend Green himself. Reverend Green was possibly the only person present at the 1973 event to have also been present at the November 1922 laying of the original foundation stone of the College, adding extra historical significance. Soon after, a dinner enjoyed by Old Boys, Staff, and parents and friends launched a period of fund raising and friend building, which culminated in the opening of the Centre in the following year.

Wesley's celebration of 90 years has been marked by a series of special events, beginning with an outdoor student assembly on Wednesday 13 February, the anniversary of the first classes. This was followed the subsequent weekend by the OWCA Anniversary dinner when more

than 300 former students and staff, including former Headmasters and honoured guests, Mr Clive Hamer (1965 – 1983) and Dr Rod Kefford (1984 – 1996); and on 16 March by the Parents' & Friends' Association's very successful fair in the grounds of the College. Dr Kefford returned to the campus again in July, this time accompanied by Mrs Kefford, to unveil the plaque marking the completion of the major refurbishment of the Ward and Kefford Wings.

If J F Ward was still alive he would have difficulty in recognising the building which bears his name. Walking through the open-plan, airy teaching areas on the ground floor it is difficult to recognise the cramped quarters in which he lived with his wife and four children, as his daughter Jean (Yule, nee Ward) had been able to do when she last visited Wesley in 2006. This year Wesley was pleased to welcome Jean's daughter (and J F Ward's granddaughter), Mrs Margie Toole and her husband Allan, to the campus, thus extending Wesley's links with the Ward family to an impressive 90 years.

This year also marks the 10th anniversary of the commencement of Mr Gee's term as Headmaster. As the year draws to a close the College begins to look forward to the celebration of Wesley's Centenary in 2023.

In the next decade of its history what is Wesley College likely to achieve?

A further 1,500 or so young men will have graduated and will be leaving their mark on the broader community.

It is likely that the total number of students enrolled will be approaching 20,000 and that the College could be enrolling fifth generation students.

In the words of Dr Seuss, the Class of 2013 will have been to 'great places' and many will return to Wesley to renew friendships and open their time capsule.

The current Year 2 students will become the Centenary Class of 2023.

In The Western Wyvern in 1942, Wesley's 20th year, the Editor wrote of the role of the year book in recording the history of the College:

'We hope your memory, prompted by what is recorded here, will enable you in years to come to experience again what it has been yours to experience in your youth'

CAPTAIN OF SCHOOL

Speech Night Address

Good evening Headmaster, Chair of Council, staff, students and special guests. It is with a mixture of sadness, excitement and uncertainty that I speak with you all, for the final time, tonight. Of course, these are feelings which I'm sure many of us, especially my fellow leaving year 12s would be having tonight. It's the end of a long and successful year.

Speech night is a time where we look back on the year that has been. We celebrate our successes. We recognise achievement. It is a time for excellence to be in the spotlight. And it begs the question of what we mean by success. We often talk of success in terms of numerical achievement. Placings, times, marks. We like to quantify success because it makes things easier for us.

However, as with many things in life, taking the easy road won't necessarily lead us to the correct answer. Success is not about numbers or trophies. Success is about personal growth. A student who performs well one year and the next year performs to the same degree is a good student. But they have not achieved anything new.

A teacher who is here tonight once warned me not to rest on my laurels. I could say that whether or not I have achieved this is a question for someone else to answer. But once again, this is the easy way out. Nobody knows yourself better than you do. Personal growth – success – can only be judged by you. It is quite fitting then, that I speak immediately after we have had our prize winners on the stage. I ask all of you, certificate or not, to consider your own goals. Hold yourself accountable. Have you grown as a person. If the answer is yes, then that is success.

When I opened tonight I said that I am feeling many emotions. I'm sure that for many of you the same is true. Amongst these emotions however, I hope that there is one notable absence - regret. Being at Wesley is an opportunity. This is something which I have spoken about many times this year, and something which countless prefects and teachers before me have also said.

Regret is when we look back and ask ourselves if we could have been more. Had we taken that opportunity, had we worked that little bit harder. Regret is not looking back on failure. Because at times, we all fail. In fact, I would wager failure to be a necessary part of the Schools Motto – *by daring and by doing*. We cannot dare and succeed every time.

Why do I stress this? Let me share a story with you. This is from a book called *Sum* and it describes in several short stories different hypothetical afterlives.

In one afterlife, you, the reader are taken to a place where you meet all the different iterations of yourself. You are surrounded by people more successful than you and met with the grim realisation that it could have been you. The you with the woman you always chased. The you with the better job. The you that was off doing charity work in Africa. Here's the finishing line from the story, 'And thus your punishment is cleverly and automatically regulated: The more you fall short of your potential, the more of these annoying selves you are forced to deal with.' It's a grim future. I think the message behind this story requires little explanation – it is telling us to live life to its fullest extent.

Earlier this year a 16 year old girl named Malala Yousafzai made this statement in front of the United Nations. 'One child, one teacher, one book and one pen can change the world.' Here at Wesley there are many children, many teachers, many books and much more. We have an opportunity of a scale that many of us will probably never comprehend. And so, there is no excuse for being regretful. There is no reason why we should not all be successful. The only factor left undetermined is our own conviction.

This all goes back to that old saying which gets repeated a lot in my family and indeed at this school. 'For those who have much, much is expected.' Or perhaps as it is put in the Gospel according to Luke, 'From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked.'

This is a message which serves as testimony to the relevance of a Christian ethos in a modern school. Not everyone here will consider themselves religious. But everyone here can take something from this verse. We have opportunity. With the help of those around us we can forge our own success. We need not be regretful.

It would be remiss of me tonight, to not acknowledge the people around me. I have been fortunate this year to have served the school with 15 other young men who are in my mind some of the most genuine people I have met. They have acted in a way that is consistent with the values of the school, and for their efforts and assistance this year, I thank and acknowledge them.

Of course, Speech Night is as much about the future as the past. So to the 18 incoming prefects I say this: I have every confidence in your ability to lead this school with distinction. Work hard, stay accountable to yourself and enjoy Year 12.

To the wider community. At the start of this year I set out with the prefects to make small changes for the overall betterment of the School. Whether or not you consider us to have achieved this goal, I ask only that moving into the future you will all ask yourselves how you might contribute towards these small changes. How you might act to make this school – Wesley College – a better place.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

The motto the Student Representative Council (SRC) has tried to embody this year has been 'By the boys, for the boys'. These boys have made

an excellent contribution to the life of the College through their innovative ideas, honest criticism and good nature. It has been a pleasure to Chair the Council this year under the additional guidance of the supervising teacher, Ms Raffaella Fecondi.

On the surface, it may seem that the SRC is a body that simply coordinates SRC lunch days, etc. However, I challenge anyone with this mindset to look more deeply at what that says about Wesley College. This role is to coordinate fundraising activities for students who take a break from the 'wake-up, learn, sleep' routine that high school sometimes rolls into, and uses the profits from these activities to further the life of students within Wesley. I look forward to all the work he will do next year and the work that will be done in the years to come.

TEACHING AND LEARNING

The pages of this publication are a celebration of student achievements and the diversity of student learning opportunities – from the sporting field to the stage to the classroom and the world beyond. Such achievements are testimony to the professionalism of our teachers. As teachers, we continue to learn and innovate. This article is an overview of some of our more formal professional learning experiences.

Valuing Teaching and Research

In 2013, Wesley Council initiated the Professional Learning Project. Based on research about teacher quality and professional learning, the project is a teacher quality initiative piloted and developed by a team of teachers. As part of our strategic intent, the College identified quality of classroom teaching and shared professional learning as areas for ongoing development within the College. Wesley's vision of being an innovative learning community is nowhere more relevant than in its classrooms where teacher and student learning is integral. 'Great teaching does make a difference,' noted the *Measures for Effective Teaching study*, commenting on its research which showed that classroom teachers have the biggest school-based impact on students' academic achievement. The team of 12 teachers worked together to trial research-based ways for teachers to reflect upon and refine their classroom practice. The diverse team of teachers, led by Mrs Deborah Netolicky, came from across the College. They are Mrs Wendy Candy, Ms Larissa Elliott, Mr Andrew Gunn, Miss Jackie Hunt, Mr Andrew Gray, Dr Bevan McGuinness, Mr Alistair Park, Mr Matthew Cureton, Ms Gerry Walsh, Mrs Claire Crooks and Mrs Judith Stewart. Using the research-backed Charlotte Danielson *Framework for Teaching* and the internationally recognised process of Cognitive Coaching, they worked to formulate a Wesley model for teacher reflection, collaboration and development. This work is part of an ongoing three year initiative.

Visiting Consultant Professional Learning Projects:

Wesley has other major professional learning projects running including:

- Working with consultant Jay McTighe and led by the Assistant Head of Middle School and Academic Committee leaders, all teachers are using a backward design process for curriculum development.
'The complexity of design work is often underestimated. Many people believe they know a good deal about design. What they do not realise is how much more they need to know to do design well, with distinction, refinement and grace.' John McClean *20 Considerations That Help a Project Run Smoothly*, 2003.

Teachers are designers. An essential act of our profession is the crafting of curriculum and learning experiences to meet specified purposes. Like people in other design professions, such as architecture, engineering or graphic arts, designers in education must be mindful of their audiences. As in all these professions, standards inform and shape our work. The Australian Curriculum has been implemented for English, Mathematics, Science, History and now Geography Across Foundation to Year 10. Curriculum for LOTE, The Arts, Health & Physical Education, Technologies, Economics and Business and Civics and Citizenship are under development by ACARA and will be phased in progressively over the next few years.

The teacher, as designer, is guided by these national standards and our College Vision and Learning Principles. These frameworks help us identify teaching and learning priorities. In addition, we factor in the interests and needs of our many and varied students. We currently have 116 units in an on-line tool allowing for collaboration, review and the scoping and spiralling of learning in a true PK – 12 curriculum. Teachers are involved in teams unpacking the Australian Curriculum statements into transfer goals, understandings and essential questions and aligning those with assessment tasks and instructional plans. This means we have a common language for the development of curriculum and using an on-line planning tool can monitor curriculum across and between year levels with the goal being a rich, coherent and cohesive PK – 12 curriculum.

Examples of exciting and authentic projects included a Kindergarten authentic action from inquiry question *How can I build an idea?* (to promote sustainability) where the children decided to upcycle different recyclable materials to create Christmas decorations for trees on the South Perth foreshore to bring 'joy' to their local community; a Year 10 Sports Science where the students designed a training program for themselves as the athlete in their particular sport and the wonderful Year 6 IPSHA performance *Children in the Dump*, where students wrote the song, made their own instruments and costumes (from recycled materials) and constructed a permanent, collective sculpture from recycled materials for the Middle School. As part of their Stage 1 Integrated Science course, Year 12 students studied and built an aquaponics system. The project included designing and building frames for their grow beds in Design and Technology, set up and plumbing of the system, introducing fish and plants and monitoring the systems. Crops were sold to parents and staff to raise funds for building an aquaponics system in our West Timor project. The second crop of cauliflowers, broccoli and lettuce was donated to Age Concern on Coode Street.

- Rich Allen has been working with nine teachers in classrooms refining instructional strategies. He works with teachers in three one-week blocks throughout the year and covers such topics as team teaching and reflection.
- Every year Wesley offers a travelling scholarship for teaching staff. In 2012 one of our music teachers, Rex Carr-White, completed a course at the renowned Julliard Institute and this year one of our Middle School teachers, Wendy Sinden, has just completed a short course at Harvard and has visited a number of US schools.
- Due to the geographical isolation of Western Australia, teachers do not have the same networking, short course and workshop opportunities as their counterparts in the eastern states. To keep up with current thinking and research we send groups of staff to major conferences and combine trips with site visits and planning days. This year major trips included the National History conference, Hawker Brownlow Annual Thinking and Learning conference, Edutech (a technology innovation conference), CONASTA (conference for Science teachers) and Guided Inquiry/Web 2.0 workshops.
- Jenny Davies, a consultant with the AIS Leadership centre, runs projects with interested staff. This year 14 staff members were involved in a range of projects from developing strategic plans for in-house initiatives to the development of a continuous student assessment mechanism to cross curricula literacy projects in T&E and The Arts to cyber safety, drumbeat and a coaching strategy for hockey.

Sharing professional expertise beyond Wesley

Numerous staff have been part of ACARA's development and review panels and WACE working parties. Invitations to present at conferences included Mr Rob Bygott at ATOM (Australian Teachers of Media); Mrs Marguerita Wilson at the Asia-Pacific IBO (International Baccalaureate Organisation); three workshops at *Expanding Learning Horizons*; and four workshops at the state MAWA (WA Maths teachers conference). A group of six staff were involved in an exchange with teachers from the Australian Science and Maths School in SA; Mrs Maggie Cooke visited China courtesy of the Asia Education Foundation and while on long service leave; and Mr Simon Purdue attended the ANJAS conference in the US. Wesley runs the WA chapter of the da Vinci competition and this year Mr John Mirosevich and Mr Andy Gray were invited to the International Conference on Creativity and Academic Excellence at Knox Grammar.

A British film crew was recently in Darwin to shoot footage for a documentary on the pioneering research of a Charles Darwin University academic that shocked the classical music world in 2006.

BAFTA winning Director, Alex McCall, said the documentary entitled *Written by Mrs Bach* is based on the book of the same name written by Professor Martin Jarvis. Professor Jarvis' breakthrough came while applying forensic science to determine the true origin and authorship of some of the most famous music attributed to Johann Sebastian Bach. 'With startling accuracy, much-

loved pieces like the *Cello Suites* can now be said to have been penned by his second wife Anna Magdalena - previously written out of this musical history.' Mrs Penny Reiss, Head of the Arts, is part of this ground-breaking research. Penny has examined the violin suites as part of her PhD thesis and is featured in the documentary.

Dr Bevan McGuinness, Chemistry teacher and fantasy author, has had 11 books published, including the two fantasy trilogies and this year branched out into the thriller genre with *The Only Evil* published by Satalyte. Our English classes are very fortunate to have access to a published author.

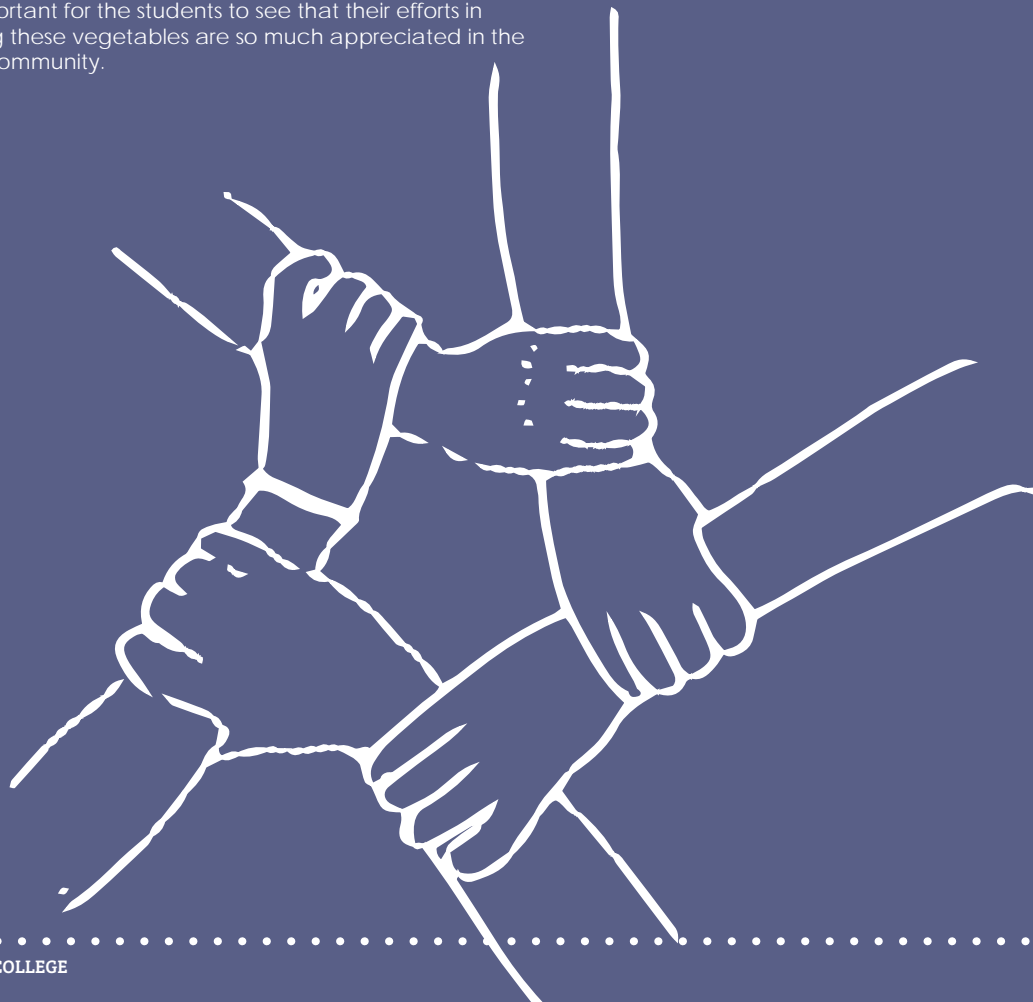

INFORMATION RESOURCES

'When you hear the word library, what's the first word and the image that comes to your mind?'

If you said 'lots of books on rows of shelves', you are not alone, but that definitely is not the whole story. There is no doubt that books in print account for a significant footprint in both the Junior School library and the Trenaman library and they have not lost their appeal to students and staff. However, the books, magazines and other resources in print format are just part of the evolving library scene.

A recent development at Wesley has been online access to a wider range of audiobooks and, for the first time, to ebooks via the Oliver catalogue or on multiple devices via the Borrow Box application for Apple and android devices. Students in the Middle and Senior Schools have downloaded the 'app' and have been taking advantage of the ease and flexibility of being able to read anywhere and any time.

Just as the whole story of libraries is not embodied in rows of printed books on shelves, offering an extensive range of reading and information resources in different formats, genres, styles and age levels is not the whole story. A major objective of the Information Services department is the provision of resources that support the improvement of literacy levels and teach the habit of reading.

In keeping with this core service, we introduced and facilitated a Silent Reading program this year. The program, which over the years has been known variously as Uninterrupted Sustained Silent Reading (USSR), Sustained Silent Reading (SSR) and Drop Everything And Read (DEAR), has been extensively studied by Professor Stephen D Krashen, author of many books including *Free Voluntary Reading*. Professor Krashen's studies indicate that voluntary reading (whereby a child can choose to read whatever she/he wishes without being evaluated) is a source of reading ability and contributes greatly to a child's vocabulary, spelling, writing and grammar skills. Using the Silent Reading Model, voluntary reading involves students having multiple-level, high-interest reading material available to them, the teacher or teacher librarian modelling reading behaviour and a sustained period of time set aside for reading. Most classes and mentor groups that participated in Silent Reading began with a 10-minute reading time, which gradually increased to, in some cases, 30 minutes. Since best results are achieved over an extended time period, we intend to encourage the continuation of Silent Reading by classes already involved and extend the program to other Middle and Senior School groups.

Another literacy initiative this year has been the introduction of author visits via Skype. Wesley has a history of organising visits by authors, but the tyranny of distance and the associated increase in costs has resulted in a review of how to offer these valuable experiences to our students. Through the College's ongoing association with the online magazine *SpineOut*, we were offered the opportunity to be one of two schools in Australia to be 'visited' online by Darren Shan, author of horror and fantasy books. The success of Darren's talk to the Year 7 boys, his reading of a chapter from one of his soon-to-be-published novels and the QA session, was evident in the responses of the boys both during and after the Skype session, with a number of boys writing follow-up creative writing pieces that were published in *SpineOut*. Darren was followed via Skype by Anthony Eaton (*A New Kind of Dreaming*) and John Heffernan (*Where There's Smoke*). Although experiencing the author in person is an excellent way of promoting reading and writing and bringing to life the novels boys are reading in class, a visit via Skype is also productive and the flexibility of the process for both the classroom teacher and the author is very attractive.

The use of digital technology in all areas of the College has been enhanced by the creation of a new role in the Information Resources team, the Digital Media Facilitator. Miss Jodie Bonomini, who is part-time library technician and part-time digital media facilitator, has worked with staff in all sub-schools, supporting staff professional development in the technology area and teaching collaboratively in classrooms. Mrs Jo Kelly has continued to support the resourcing of the Trenaman Library in her role as part-time library technician. We also welcome back to the Information Resources team Mrs Michelle Gibbings, who has returned from leave to her position as part-time Junior School teacher librarian.

Ms Michelle Gibbings and Mrs Deborah Hirte, with the assistance of library technician, Ms Lesley Webb, have continued to implement and resource the Junior School inquiry program. They conducted a major stocktake of the library collection at the end of the year and have purchased new stock that will be appearing on the shelves during 2014.

The Guided Inquiry process is gathering momentum in the Middle and Senior Schools. Mrs Jane Graham and Ms Jan Kaye, teacher librarians, attended curriculum planning meetings in their advisory capacity and modelled the inquiry process by teaching collaboratively with classroom teachers.

We look forward to continuing to facilitate, guide and lead the Wesley learning community in 2014.

THE WYVERN CENTRE

The Junior School Wyvern Centre has been fortunate to gain the experience of Mrs Deborah Hirte on a part-time basis. Mrs Hirte has developed small group programs aimed at enriching the experiences of Early Learning students focusing on Inquiry topics. Mrs Anne Crawcour has developed some individual and small group programs aimed at improving students' understanding of the Jolly Phonics literacy program and English vocabulary.

Ms Tracey Coad, Ms Cate Begbie, Mrs Candice Clynk, Mrs Anne Hirte and Mrs Crawcour have been involved in a new initiative this year which ensures that support for students is data-driven resulting in a more targeted and equitable spread of intervention for all students. Each Intervention Team has worked on targeted programs that have focused on areas across the Australian Curriculum. Areas of priority this year have assisted our students in developing their literacy and numeracy skills.

During lunch times students had the opportunity to participate in the Lego, Chess and Knitting Clubs. All have provided students with the opportunity to interact and learn from older mentors, including students in Middle School.

Literacy support for Middle School students has taken the form of Elective English groups timetabled for students in Years 5-8 with Ms Eileen George. These small groups were designed to support the classroom learning with well-scaffolded experiences linked directly to the curriculum of the classroom. Focus for learning included writing instructional and persuasive texts, essays and newspaper articles. Comprehension skills included discerning fact and opinion, identifying the main idea, reflecting on the author's purpose and interpreting figurative language. Oral presentations were planned whilst auditory processing and working memory skills were also addressed. There was an emphasis on developing the individual's ability to actively reflect on their own learning and to develop skills of self-advocacy.

Additional intervention was offered to Year 7s in 2013 through an assessment-based program to identify and remediate learning gaps in comprehension and text production. Support was also offered through the Homework Club twice a week with the Wyvern and classroom teachers collaborating to assist student learning.

Assessment in literacy, screening for Dyslexia and working memory evaluation were provided by Eileen George, as and when requested by classroom teachers, with parents supported and advised in further specialist assessment, when needed. Support for students with learning needs has been planned using an Educational Strategy Plan (ESP) or an Individual Educational Plan (IEP). These plans have been developed and refined by the Wyvern Centre staff, who offer guidance to teachers in the completion and delivery of these plans.

In line with curriculum initiatives in the Middle School, Elective English programs are mapped and cross-referenced to all Middle School planning using the Atlas Rubicon Curriculum Mapping Program so that integration of planning and learning can occur across all subject areas. This also enables increased consistency of key vocabulary, understandings and skills.

Literacy screening is now an annual event at the end of the year for all current and future students in Middle School. This initiative provides a useful tool for identifying students who need Literacy Support, ensuring assistance is available for the whole year to each identified student.

Both Year 6 and 7 groups participated in the Future Problem-Solving Program (FPSP) during 2013. The Year 6 group, supported by teachers Ms Annette O'Brien and Mr Andrew Gunn, were taught thinking and collaboration skills prior to being taken through the six stages of problem-solving required for the FPSP competition. The Year 7 group, comprising three teams, worked tirelessly to complete their FPS Practice Problem booklets early in 2013, in preparation for the FPSP Qualifying Round in Week 10, Term 2, 2013. The qualifying round is sent to Melbourne to be evaluated independently and successful teams are invited to compete in the National competition in October. Our Wesley teams were not invited to compete this year, but we were proud of their efforts.

The Year 9 Elective English supports students with their work in English by mirroring the tasks covered in the students' regular English course, whilst continuing to develop their grammar, spelling and comprehension skills through extra listening, reading and writing tasks. This course continued as part of the Wyvern Literacy Support Program throughout 2013.

CAREERS

Career Development

The Wesley Senior School careers program has a long-term career management focus. Students are encouraged to develop their work-related knowledge, understanding and skills to inform their transition into work or further study beyond school. Career development conversations and activities have become firmly entrenched within the Senior School Student Wellbeing program. Mentors and students work together on a range of activities designed to allow students opportunities to explore their interests and strengths and relate them to future study and work prospects.

Wesley students are reminded that having security in today's labour market is not so much about the job you have, but the transferable skills one possesses. From May 2013, Australia has a National Career Development Strategy which emphasises the growing importance of this area to ensure that all students have access to information and services to support them in this important aspect of their lives.

Vocational Education and Training (VET)

2013 has seen a growing number of Wesley students extend their career development into gaining qualifications which will enable them to effectively transition into further education and training and employment. Students have completed Certificate IV in Business, School Based Traineeships in Construction, Certificate II in Telecommunications and two students are currently working towards gaining a Diploma in Aeronautics by attending Polytechnic West one day per week. Five of our indigenous boys have completed a Certificate I in Leadership in collaboration with South Metropolitan Youth Link (SMYL).

New Certificates

Another significant addition to our curriculum offering at Wesley this year has been the introduction of a Certificate II Sport Coaching in Year 11 which will articulate into a Certificate III Sport and Recreation for Year 12s. Wesley has partnered with the YMCA to deliver these certificates which will be useful for students who wish to pursue coaching opportunities within the community and at Wesley in the future. Year 11 students have studied a Certificate II in Information Technology within the College this year, which will articulate into a Certificate III Business in 2014 for participating students.

WesTrac Institute

The Wesley WesTrac partnership has been consolidated this year with ten students undertaking a Certificate II Automotive Mechanical (over two years) at the WesTrac Institute in Guildford.

VET Award

Hayden Walker (Year 12) was awarded the Australian Super Westscheme Excellence in VET Award at the Valedictory Assembly in October for outstanding success in his Certificate II Sport Coaching and commitment to Workplace Learning which resulted in his attaining a highly sought-after apprenticeship with a local company.

Year 10 Work Inspiration

Over 180 Year 10 students successfully participated in Wesley's 'Work Inspiration' program in May, attending a broad range of workplaces including city law, accounting and engineering firms, dental, medical and veterinary practices, the Fremantle Port Authority, Noongar Sports, hairdressing salons, aged care facilities and the UWA multimedia department. The students were very fortunate to have been given such a diverse and interesting range of workplaces in order to gain an insight into the real world of work and to enhance their career development. Some students realised that a particular career was not for them, which proved to be a valuable learning opportunity. A number of students were offered casual employment and future job opportunities as a result of their positive work attributes during this time.

Career Events at Wesley

- The Careers Carousel in May was another successful event which featured all of the Western Australian universities, WA Police, TAFE colleges, Education USA as well as the Edith Cowan University Motorsports vehicle. Wesley and Penrhos College students and their parents made their way around various booths and attended information sessions, including the Defence Forces and "Plan B" alternative entry pathways to university.
- Fifty Year 10 parents attended the Parents as Career Partners workshop in April to learn about ways to support their sons in the career selection process.
- This year the program has been supported by a range of guest speakers, including Old Wesleyans who have been willing to present insights from their careers. Valuable links from Old Wesleyans will continue to feature in 'Meet the Boss Lunchtime Seminar Series' in 2014 to provide information sharing and networking opportunities for the boys.
- The Careers Newsletter has provided students (and parents!) with opportunities for furthering their career research. We are very pleased that many students have attended the 'Day in the Life...' series at UWA and accessed a broad range of career-related events and Open Days. Thank you for the positive feedback about this resource.

In 2014 the careers office will be moving into Maloney House to improve access to a range of services and materials to assist with students' post school transition. Parents and students are very welcome to visit the careers office to access resources and discuss a range of career-related issues. Please call or email me to make an appointment. I look forward to meeting all the Senior School students in my office in the near future.

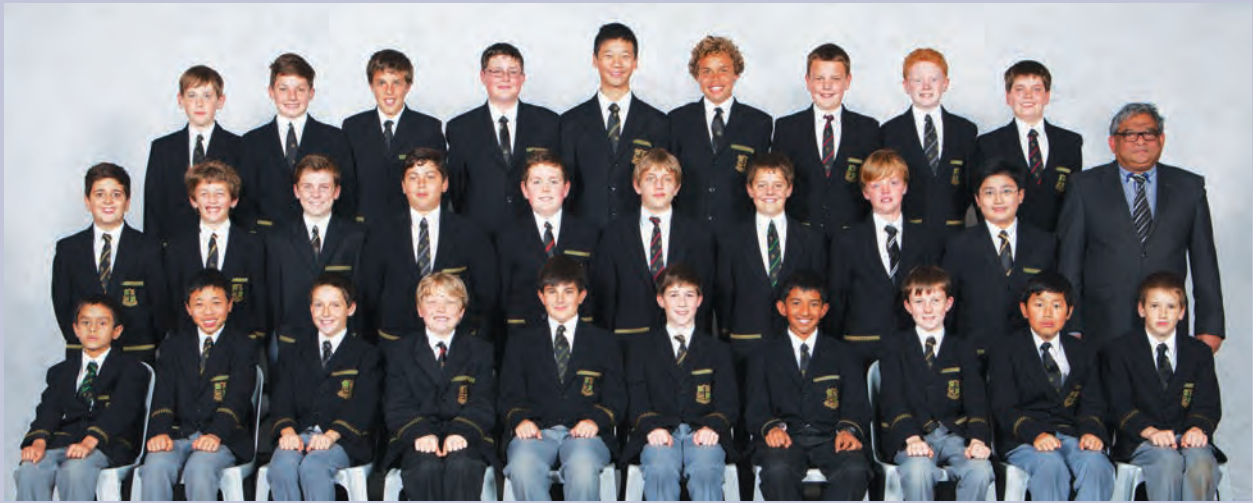

ENGLISH

In 2013, there has been a focus on increasing engagement in English through creativity and authenticity.

For the first time, English took a prominent role during Arts Week. We had a Writer in Residence, Mr Jon Doust, who visited classes in a number of year levels. Jon is a former Christ Church Grammar School student who has written books for both children and adults. Students in Year 12 Stage 2 English were studying his book *Boy on a Wire*, a Miles Franklin nominated story of a boy's experiences at a boarding school. The visit gave students an opportunity to ask questions about the writing process as well as Jon's life experiences that led him to become a successful author. He also judged the inaugural Wesley Writing Competition which was won by Cameron Falls (12W), notwithstanding tough opposition from a wide range of amazing stories.

Brett Fielding (10W), another strong creative writer, gained success in the City of South Perth Young Writers Competition. Brett was awarded second place in the Secondary Year category for a short story about a shark attack. He received a personal cheque of \$100, plus a copy of all of the winning entries for the College. This collection is now on display in the English Department and we are hopeful it will help to inspire other boys to enter the competition next year.

Throughout the College, teachers have encouraged students to interact with their current or favourite authors. Michael Pryor, an author of science fiction, fantasy, literary fiction and slapstick humour for children, teenagers and adults, presented to the Year 8 cohort. Darren Shan, a firm favourite at the College, talked via Skype courtesy of *SpineOut* to two Year 7 classes (Wesley was one of only two Australian schools to host him). John Heffernan, an Australian writer presented via Skype to a Year 9 class studying *Where There's Smoke*, which was partly inspired by the 2009 Victorian bushfires. Anthony Eaton presented via Skype to a Year 8 class studying *A New Kind of Dreaming*, and Robert Hoge, who is the author of *Ugly: My memoir*, presented to a group of Year 12 English students plus a few staff, courtesy of Westbooks and publisher Hachette.

The Year 12 students were studying speeches and Hoge certainly provided strong inspiration. Most enlightening of all, Wesley College's own writer and science teacher, Dr Bevan McGuinness, who has published many books, mainly in the fantasy genre, talked to Year 9 and 10 students about finding inspiration.

These sessions, arranged by the Information Resource Department, allowed students the opportunity to talk to successful writers and to gain new perspectives on books.

Creative experiences were not confined to the classroom. Students at Katitjin used the Swan River and its history as the catalyst for creating short films about events and people from the past. In groups the boys researched, wrote scripts, learnt about filming techniques and, using *Movie Maker*, constructed a short film. These films were projected in a real cinema at the Jaffa Club in Perth. In Year 6, students created movies on Microbe Racing with some wonderful results. At the Sustainability Fair in the Middle School Atrium, boys presented soap box speeches on topics relating to their investigations of the Perth river system, Wesley College as a water user and Perth's water crisis.

In Year 9, groups of students visited the beach and parks in order to produce truly creative poetry. Many Year 10 English students ventured to see a stunning performance of Arthur Miller's *Death of a Salesman* at the Heath Ledger Theatre, while Year 10 Literature students had a visit from Class Acts Theatre presenting *Macbeth*.

It has been a wonderful year where English has come alive at Wesley and students' creativity has been inspired and rewarded. Who knows? In a few years we may be inviting some of our 2013 students back to talk about their new books!

HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

2013 has, once again, been an exciting time for the Health and Physical Education Learning Area and our traditionally high quality teaching and learning programs continue to give students access to physical activities, as well as exposure to theoretical elements concerned with healthy lifestyles.

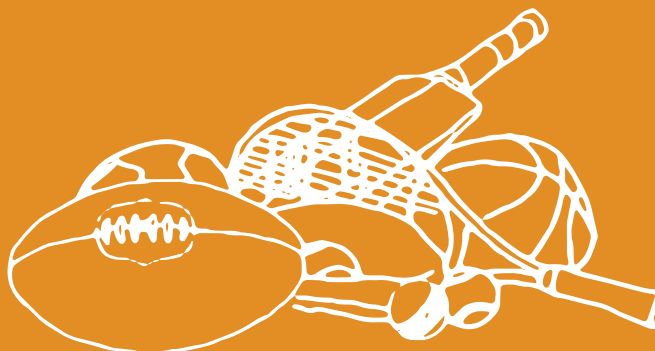
We have been delighted to welcome Mr John Taylor who joined us from East Perth neighbours, Trinity College, who will be looking after Cross Country and Athletics. In his short time with us, John has already made significant contributions to both the curricular and co-curricular life of the College, with the junior Cross Country team looking particularly promising, finishing second in the PSA.

With the introduction of Physical Education as part of the national curriculum, we are confident that the programs we have in place will allow this transition to be seamless. Our Health curriculum, for example, has made significant progress in utilising the *Understanding by Design* planning process to offer our students, from Years 5 to 10, real-life issues around which to base the curriculum. This has been well-received and we look forward to its further expansion in the years ahead.

We are also reviewing our feedback mechanisms so that we can better provide our students with timely, technical and tactical information, in order for them to have a better understanding of where they are at and what they need to do in order to improve. One of the things that has made this easier is our use of differentiation within the classes, whereby students of similar ability are grouped together so that they can work on their progress collectively. This has allowed the teachers to specifically focus on different aspects of the game, as is considered appropriate to a student's skill level. Consequently, our most talented students have been challenged with relevant drills and game situations and our less able students have received significant remediation so that their basic skills allow them to contribute in game scenarios with increased confidence.

One aspect that has been particularly pleasing is the successful introduction of a Certificate II in Sports Coaching to our senior students, under the watchful eye of Mr Ross Meadows. This has effectively replaced the old Stage 1 Physical Education Studies course and allows students to gain worthwhile VET competencies that can lead to fruitful training within the TAFE system. It has been pleasing to note that some 18 students have successfully negotiated the course to achieve the Royal Life Saving Society's Bronze Medallion qualification, as well as First-Aid certification and a nationally accredited coaching certification through the Australian Sports Commission. Such has been the popularity of the course that we are introducing an extension Certificate III course for our Year 12 students in 2014.

LANGUAGES OTHER THAN ENGLISH

(LOTE)

Once again the year began on a positive note with news of the various successes of LOTE students in the 2012 WACE examinations. Of particular note were the outstanding results of Bu Teh's Indonesian – Second language students and the excellent performance of Rhys Tucker (08-12) and Alex Au Yong (00-12) in the French WACE examination. It was also gratifying to learn that a number of Wesley students decided to continue their study of French, German or Indonesian at tertiary level or chose to embark on a year's exchange in another country.

The focus for staff professional development in 2013 was a rethinking of all LOTE programs based on Jay McTighe's Understanding by Design methodology. Teachers also continued to work on aligning the content of LOTE programs with mainstream classes, especially at Middle School level.

The new Australian National Curriculum emphasises the importance of learning foreign languages.

All students should experience well designed and supported language programs, taught by well-trained and supported language teachers, in schools that actively support language teaching linked to universities that are fully committed to widespread and successful language study. It is worth reiterating why this ambition is important. The principal reason is to do with the deepest purposes of education itself, to instil knowledge, to deepen understanding, to stimulate reflection and to foster skills. Languages are intimately linked to the essentially humanistic, cultural and intellectual reasons for making education compulsory. Bilingualism can foster more reflective and imaginative dispositions in citizens and the principles of democratic discourse, participation and opportunity which Australia proclaims also find resonance with language study since the bulk of humanity lives in societies and continues traditions forged outside of English. (Lo Bianco 2009, p. 64)

The importance of Asia to Australia in the 21st century is also underlined.

An understanding of Asia underpins the capacity of Australian students to be active and informed citizens working together to build harmonious local, regional and global communities and build Australia's social, intellectual and creative capital. It also builds understanding of the diversity of cultures and peoples living in Australia, fosters social inclusion and cohesion and is vital to the prosperity of Australia.

This priority will ensure that students learn about and recognise the diversity within and between the countries of the Asia region. They will develop knowledge and understanding of Asian societies, cultures, beliefs and environments and the connections between the peoples of Asia, Australia and the rest of the world. Asia literacy provides students with the skills to communicate and engage with the peoples of Asia so they can effectively live, work and learn in the region.

In recognition of this priority a new Asian language (Chinese) will be added to the LOTE programs in Years 5, 7, 8 and 9 in 2014.

In 2013 LOTE students again took part in an extensive range of activities: restaurant and cinema visits, language competitions, email exchanges with other language students, cooking, computer projects, model-building and language competitions.

In the Junior School students used mime, gesture, songs and games to reinforce their Indonesian language acquisition. They learned about different Indonesian customs and came to the appreciation that children in Indonesia have similar likes and dislikes and that the differences between them are not as great as they had thought. In studying another culture they were also able to gain a better understanding of their own.

In the Middle School, Indonesian students learned to cook Indonesian food for their families, had their own Master Chef and X-Factor competitions, made Wayang kulit shadow puppets and put on their own puppet shows. They particularly enjoyed learning about volcanoes and making gunung Krakatau erupt in their classroom. A highlight of Term 4 for Year 6 was the Balinese buffet at OSH5ONE Indonesian Restaurant.

French students were not to be outdone. They made crêpes, attended the French Film Festival, corresponded with students at the Collège Paul Valéry in Paris and exchanged videos with them. A highlight for Year 8 students was the French breakfast competition, in which students were rewarded for the best decorated table and the most appetising breakfast.

In the Senior School, French students shared a dinner with Penrhos students and attended the French Film Festival. Senior French students participated in the Alliance Française examinations, in which Nicholas Vernon (12H) and Lachlan Black (11W) gained special commendations.

Indonesian students continued the custom of learning about Indonesian culture through food and former students returned to the College to provide oral practice for Year 12 students preparing for their WACE examination. In Term 3 the College also hosted an exchange student from France and two students from the Black Forest in Germany. All said, they thoroughly enjoyed their time here, although they found wearing a uniform quite a strange experience!

Finally, all LOTE students participated in the Language Perfect Olympics in Term 2, with many students gaining impressive scores.

As always, I would like to thank sincerely the dedicated staff of the LOTE Faculty and the parents who support them by assisting with extra activities. Without their energy and enthusiasm we would not be able to provide students with the varied and rich program that Wesley offers.

MATHEMATICS

For the Senior School the undoubted highlight has been moving into the new classrooms of the refurbished Kefford wing. Staff and students are enjoying the light, spacious and well-appointed teaching and learning spaces - a dramatic change from the earlier configuration.

Professional learning continues at a rapid rate. The collaborative culture within the Senior School department continues to flourish. Staff thoroughly enjoy their involvement in the Mathematics education community with Mr Rob Dodds, Miss Gemma Harwood and Mr Simon Purdue presenting at the MAWA State Conference. Others have presented at both the Primary and Secondary conventions.

We were fortunate that Mr Charles Lovitt was once again able to work with Middle School mathematics teachers. Charles' experience and passion for engaging students in mathematics continues to inspire teachers and his positive comments on teaching and culture within the school are indicative of the professionalism and skills of teachers.

The 2012 WACE results for Mathematics were again pleasing with Alex Au Yong (00-12) our top student in both Mathematics and Mathematics: Specialist.

Junior School students sat the Mathematics section of International Competitions and Assessments for Schools.

Opportunities for students to participate and excel in mathematics events and competitions included the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC), Australian Informatics Competition (AIC), Australian Intermediate Maths Olympiad (AIMO), Year 9 and 10 Maths Games Camp, the Years 7 and 8 Wesley – Penrhos Maths games afternoon and the Western Australian Junior Mathematics Olympiad (WAJO).

In the AMC 336 Wesley students from Years 5 to 12 were among the nearly half a million entrants in the competition from Australia and 40 other countries. Our students again achieved good results earning 125 Certificates of Credit, 88 Certificates of Distinction and 17 Certificates of High Distinction. Congratulations to all students, but especially to Nikola Surla (12W) recipient of the Prudence award for the most consecutive correct answers and prize winners, Leyton Hillmer (8M) and Declan Smeed (9T).

Eight of the 25 Wesley students who entered the AIC from Years 8 to 12 received Certificates of Credit. James Purdy (8G), Thomas Mahoney (9H), Brett Fielding (10W) and Benjamin Smithers (10M) were awarded Distinctions and Mahn-Kitt Clifford Lee (9G) was awarded a High Distinction.

Our collaboration with Penrhos for lower secondary students extended this year to include a Maths problem-solving afternoon, in addition to the Games afternoon. Teams involved students from both schools to enhance social interactions between students. It is delightful to see a full room of over 50 students choosing to spend an afternoon doing mathematics in a joyful, lively and vibrant atmosphere.

The AIMO is a very challenging four-hour paper. Mahn-Kitt Clifford Lee (9G) and Alexander Rohl (9J) are to be congratulated on their efforts in taking on this mammoth task.

SCIENCE

We welcomed Dr Sarah Harrison to the Science Department at the start of the year as a permanent part-time staff member. Dr Harrison brings a wealth of experience to the team, particularly in the area of Physics. Mr Nick Marston assisted us for a term whilst Mr Paul White enjoyed his time overseas on long service leave in Term 2.

The last day on campus for Year 12 Science students has traditionally (and literally) gone off with a bang! The annual 'Rumble Big Balloon Explosion' is something the Year 12 students flock to see on Ward Oval. Much anticipation was in the air on Thursday 17 October as Mr Neil Rumble (minus fuse wire) attempted to resonate the airwaves with a thunderous oscillation of air molecules produced from a chemical reaction where atoms with tremendous kinetic energy collided and bonded with other atoms in a dramatic display of chemistry. Alas, whilst many valiant attempts were made to encourage this reaction to occur, the boys and Mr Rumble were left with no other option than to walk away with shoulders slumped and a feeling of disappointment. Unlike most science experiments, this time the variables could not be controlled.

The Senior Chemistry staff left an impact on the Middle School students this year when the exciting demonstration of burning magnesium ribbon apparently produced enough smoke to set off the Transition building fire alarms. The Year 5 and 6 classes, along with the Scitech Mobile Planetarium staff who were running an incursion in the Transition Gym, quietly and efficiently performed a live fire drill and marched up to Rossiter Oval to await the Fire Department's arrival to turn off the fire alarm and check the building was safe for classes to re-enter. Several Middle School staff were seen returning to their lessons smiling at the senior Chemistry staff - no doubt proud at how well their classes had performed the evacuation.

Collaboration between the sub-schools in Science at the College continues to be a focus. A team from each of the sub-schools attended the National Science Teachers' Conference in the July school holidays. In Term 3, Junior School classes visited the Senior School Integrated Science class to view their Aquaponics projects and to see the baby chicks hatching.

Following their visit the Year 2 students returned to the Year 12 class the following week to present their science booklets on the animals they had seen and thank you letters to the very delighted Year 12 boys. Several Senior School Science classes were equally impressed when they visited the Year 7 Science Fair, once again highlighting some fantastic science investigations.

Students in the Junior School explore Science through the Inquiry process. Teaching staff follow Kath Murdoch's Inquiry model where students seek to make sense of the world - they wonder, plan, analyse, create and reflect. All classes and grades use the common language of Tuning In, Finding Out, Sorting Out, Going Further, Reflection and Authentic Action. At its very heart, Inquiry is all about thinking - thinking in order to make meaning. The benefits of an Inquiry-based approach to teaching and learning have been well documented over several decades of educational research. As students move through the process of Inquiry, they can draw on several ways of investigating and expressing their growing understandings, integrating skills and content from multiple disciplines or learning areas. When planning with the Australian Curriculum, Junior School teachers purposefully integrate domains from each of the Science strands. In 2013, students from Pre-kindergarten to Year 4 explored the following Science related big questions:

How does the earth change?

Why is nature important to us?

How can we build an idea to promote sustainability?

Through the exploration of these questions, the Junior School students have been demonstrating a range of Science Inquiry skills such as:

- Participating in different types of guided investigations to explore and answer questions, such as manipulating materials, testing ideas and accessing information sources.
- Using informal and formal measurements in the collection and recording of observations with the assistance of digital technologies, as appropriate.
- Representing and communicating observations and ideas in a variety of ways, such as oral and written language, drawing and role play.

The focus of the faculty was two-fold this year - to consolidate on the growing number of students choosing our subjects by continuing to make them interesting and relevant; and to stretch students by encouraging them to apply their knowledge in real life contexts.

In this regard, we celebrated the success of Benjamin Manifold (12G), who was selected as the Western Australian representative for the 2013 National Schools Constitutional Convention in Canberra in March and Michael Searle (11D) who finished 1st in Western Australia in the ASX Sharemarket Game. Both results indicated that skills acquired inside the classroom have practical applications outside the classroom.

A real highlight of the year was when some of the students from the Year 10 Profiles in Leadership course had the opportunity to interview Sir Bob Geldof, right here at Wesley! They questioned him on social justice and the difference between leading a band and leading Live Aid (amongst other things). He was an engaging and interesting man and the students and staff involved derived great benefit from his visit.

We welcomed two new faculty members in 2013 – Ms Angela Jones (Geography) and Mr Declan Hanley (Economics). Their enthusiasm for their subject has meant that they have been well received by both colleagues and students. We sadly farewell Ms Raffaella Fecondi from the Philosophy & Ethics program (and Wesley). Many students have benefitted from Ms Fecondi's intellect and passion in the field of Philosophy. She will be missed.

A group of Year 6 students was lucky enough to compete in the HBF Rottneest Geo-Challenge held in April. The boys were given GPS units, bikes and a map and were asked to undertake what is best described as a treasure hunt (sometimes for clues, sometime for trinkets). The boys enjoyed themselves immensely and this has led to a Geocaching Workshop being established for Year 5 and 6 students during lunchtimes back on campus. The students involved are the first to trial a new geocaching website, made just for schools, in conjunction with Nature Play WA.

Middle School and Senior School Philosophers joined forces earlier this year in the Australasian Philosophical Finals in Melbourne. Although they were 'pipped at the post' for overall first position by a narrow seven points by Singapore Raffles Girls' School, Wesley defeated all other schools finishing the highest ranking Australian School and second overall in Australasia.

Year 12 Economic students were lucky enough to have Duncan Calder, Senior Vice President (WA) Australia-China Business Council, speak to them as part of the Year 12 course. Mr Calder spoke directly to the syllabus point 'Australia and the Global Economy – the interdependence of Australia with the rest of the world'. This was a valuable source of contemporary examples for students and was used to illustrate their up to date knowledge of the economic relationship between the two countries.

It has been fantastic to see Senior School specialist teachers working with Middle School teachers, adding depth to the knowledge of all parties with regard to both the subject area and classroom pedagogy.

We look forward to another interesting and busy year in 2014!

Students have a plethora of innovative courses from which to choose that are continually being developed, modified and revitalised for our ever-changing world. An excellent example of this is the work that teachers have been undertaking in the preparation for the new Australian Curriculum. Whilst still a couple of years away from full implementation, planning is well underway and a trial of some aspects of the Digital Technologies and Business and Economics Curriculums will occur next year.

This year we welcomed Mr Malcom McTavish and Ms Susan Ryan to our faculty. Mr McTavish spent 20 years at Presbyterian Ladies' College and brings a wealth of knowledge in the Accounting and Finance area. Ms Ryan stepped in and relieved for Mrs Kathy Krajcar whilst on Long Service Leave and is set to have a greater role in 2014.

Australian Stock Exchange Sharemarket Competition, CPA Plan Your Own Enterprise, Careers in Information Technology, Annual LAN Challenge and Chartered Accountants and BEWA Accounting Student Challenge are just some of the exciting opportunities in which students have had a chance to participate this year.

The Year 10 Business class seized the opportunity to create products for the 90th Fair. The boys marketed a variety of products: Fair Trade, Wesley tattoos, scented candles, 'floonies' and other novelty items. It was impressive that the boys fully supported the Parents' and Friends' Association event and enjoyed the enterprising experience from production to selling.

A regular on the calendar for Year 9 Business students is the Australian Stock Exchange Sharemarket Competition. After receiving a \$50,000 start-up capital, students invest in a variety of shares to see who, after a period of time, has been able to increase their share portfolio value the most. This is always hotly contested between the boys, with research being undertaken in a variety of forms. This year saw a very commendable result from Cale Jones (9C).

Wesley College continues to win accolades in the CPA Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition and once again there were some excellent results from hundreds of entries across WA. Most notably, Ryan Misaghi (10M), who achieved second place, First Division and in the group entry, Jamie Howells (10W) and Matthew Maltman (10H) won second place, Second Division. The boys' business plans were researched meticulously and included financial plans. A special thank you to Ms Susan Ryan and Mrs Kathy Krajcar who mentored the boys, providing valuable advice and insight.

There was a change in format for the LAN Challenge this year. Students spent an entire Saturday working through the conundrum of establishing a working network of computers. This tested their trouble-shooting skills, communication skills and ability to work as a team to achieve the overall objective. The students were joined by Old Wesleyans and a very enjoyable day was had by all. Special thanks to Mr Marcus McGavock for providing expert advice and to the Wesley ILT support team for their assistance.

Year 12 Computing students had the opportunity to explore the career opportunities from further study in Information Technology. Students listened to speakers from all over Australia including Google, talked with industry representatives and networked with other students in an engaging day of discovery.

The Institute of Chartered Accountants Australia and the Business Educators of WA invited Wesley College to send their best Accounting and Finance students to the 'Accounting Student Challenge'. This half-day student event is designed to give Stage 3 Year 12 students an edge with exam preparation and to engage in one of five case studies to improve their understanding of the curriculum. This valuable experience was enjoyed by all.

As you can see, it has been a very busy and fruitful year within Business and Computing. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the students for all their hard work as well as the staff in the Business and Computing area for their dedication in delivering a rich and vibrant curriculum.

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

Once again, this has been a very busy and productive year for the Design & Technology staff and students with many activities undertaken, on and off campus. The boys have showcased the breadth of skills they have developed during 2013 at the Wesley Fair, Perth Wood Show, Perth Royal Show, Wesley Car Show, Perth Electric Vehicle Challenge, F1 in Schools Challenge and the Wesley *Masters and Apprentices Exhibition*.

Students from Years 5 - 12 can experience a broad range of subject matter and develop hand, machine and thinking skills while completing set tasks. These tasks increase in complexity as the students move towards Year 12, incorporating both individual and group projects.

Design & Technology encompasses a range of subjects including Woodwork, Metalwork, Engineering Studies and Design/Technical Graphics.

We are very proud of what our students achieve as we sculpt their young minds into creative and innovative thinkers who can problem-solve to produce fine pieces of work that should stay with them for many years to come. Wesley students acquire a taste for these subjects after completing a number of compulsory units, starting with small tasks and making projects which introduce them to safe workshop practices and culminates in Year 5 in the building and racing of 'Billy Carts'.

During the last week of the year Billy Cart Day is held. The purpose of the day is to showcase all the carts and to have lots of fun. This year the event was held in Hampton Quad, a more pleasant and convenient location than on the tennis courts (as in previous years) and close to the workshop, allowing for emergency repairs. All the billy carts made in Year 5 Design & Technology classes are brought to College for a day of fun and racing. The carts have to be scrutineered to check that they conform to the rules for construction and are safe to race. We have a downhill race, a circuit race and an in-line sprint. Some interesting design innovations on billy carts, such as music systems and water cannons, were presented this year and a great day was had by all.

In Metalwork the boys have been making creative pieces such as garden sculptures, mass-produced 'Lego Men' and the 'Downhill Drift Trikes' – a popular project.

As a group we performed exceptionally well at the Perth Royal Show with all entries winning a prize, despite the fact they were competing against not only other schools but also adult entries:

We continue to enjoy having a large cohort of Technical Graphics/Design students and it is pleasing to see exquisite detail in their hand-made Architectural Models and Computer Designed Cafés. They have utilised cutting edge 3D printing technology to create their drink bottle and piston designs.

Engineering Studies remains our flagship subject. Boys study the course from Year 10 and can complete it at Stage 3 WACE level to attain tertiary entry.

In the Perth Electric Vehicle Challenge we entered three vehicles. This endurance event requires cars colour compete in two one-hour race with efficiency and durability being the most important factors. Our 'Lean Steer' car, designed and built by Year 11s (Hugh Sando (11C), Callum Hey (11G), Christopher Rushford (11C) and Oscar Speak (11W)), came 2nd in the Senior Schools division over both races and 3rd in Engineering Design. This was an innovative design unlike any other competitors' vehicles.

The Perth Wood Show was another successful event this year in which we displayed our top woodwork pieces. Bill Dobbin (10C) was awarded 1st place in the Year 10 Creative section for his ukulele and several boys received highly commended certificates.

The year culminated in the *Masters and Apprentices Exhibition* at Wesley which displayed most of our top projects for the year.

Several of our boys achieved other exceptional results this year in music. Most notably Tianchi Ren (11M) was awarded his Licentiate of Music - the highest grade level obtainable in the Australian Music Examination Board. Tianchi will also continue Jonathan Maltman's (12H) fine work as Arts Captain in 2014. Two of our Year 12 boys, Jonathan Maltman (12H) and Benjamin Lim (12G), were also accepted into WAAPA to continue their music studies.

This year our Funk Band was awarded the Groove Award for Division One at the Western Australian Schools Jazz Festival. This is the fourth time in as many years that a Wesley Jazz Ensemble has won an ensemble award. There were also individual awards for outstanding playing which went to Loughlan Kenyon-Quigley (11J), Jack Calneggia (11G) and Liam Walsh (12H).

The standout performance of the year was our Year 12 music boys, dressed as the Wiggles, performing to an excited and enthusiastic Junior School audience on their Arts Day. After watching them in action, I have no doubt there is a career for these boys as a Wiggles cover band.

I am especially proud of the links we created this year with the Kensington Secondary School and Carson Street School. Proceeds from our Arts Day went to assisting the school with the development of their music program and our Stage Band boys also performed for these students in September. Two of our ensembles also performed at the Dowerin Field Day this year.

Drama

It has been a most exciting year for the Drama department at Wesley. Our 2013 season has been full of fun, laughter and memorable moments.

We began in Arts Week with improvisation and breakdancing workshops in the Goatcher Auditorium. This provided our students with the opportunity to work with local dance and drama professionals in a fun and relaxed environment. These two workshops uncovered some hidden talent in the College.

Auditions for the College production of *The Outsiders* took place at the end of Term 1 and the rehearsal process was in full swing over Terms 2 and 3. There is no denying that the show was a great success and a wonderful achievement for all the boys and staff involved.

The Year 12 Drama students performed their original solo productions at the end of Term 3 at *Arts Perspectives*. Students were required to write and perform a 5-7 minute solo for their WACE performance examination. It was a difficult challenge and the boys showed great talent and bravery performing their work for parents, peers and adjudicators on the evening.

Finally, the Year 10 Drama class wrote and performed a series of children's theatre performances for the Junior School Arts Day. The boys performed four shows over the course of the day and found the experience thoroughly exciting and challenging.

In 2014 Drama has an exciting year planned, which will include travelling to New York City and enjoying the theatrical wonders of Broadway, as well as our whole College musical, *The Wizard of Oz*.

Media

The Year 12 Media Production and Analysis students produced some thought provoking, insightful and compelling Documentary and Art films as part of the practical component of their WACE examinations. These were screened at the Wesley Media Perspectives night, attended by family, friends, staff and special guests. Selections of these, along with other accomplished student videos from Years 9-11, were also exhibited as part of the outstanding *Masters and Apprentices Exhibition*. Throughout the year, there were many students who helped to produce professional 'co-curricular' videos to promote the achievements and participation of Wesley students in numerous sporting events, as well as music performances and drama productions. This is important as it provides students with the opportunity to use their media skills in a practical setting. It is fantastic to see so much interest in the media program and especially to view students' works that are of such a high standard. All in all it was a very successful year for Wesley Media.

Visual Arts

A highly productive and successful year in Visual Arts at Wesley in 2013, students have had a variety of rich experiences through the program, from visiting the Picasso to Warhol Exhibition at the State Gallery, to Arts Day with local urban artist Darren Hutchens, the week long artist residency of Western Australian artist Andy Quilty and Mrs Anne Gee's paper cutting residency with Year 7 boys. Students have enthusiastically immersed themselves in art making with direct results seen in the strength and diversity of work exhibited in the *Masters and Apprentices Exhibition* this October. The exhibition was a superb showcase of student art, photography and design work from Kindergarten to Year 12. Particular highlights of this exhibition were the inclusion of the collaborative giant metal sculpture by Year 6 students used in the IPSHA production this year. Year 10 art students created colourful and quirky large scale monster sculptures, which would lend themselves well to a stage production setting.

Year 12 students exhibited their work widely to outside audiences throughout the Year. Exhibitions included the St George's Cathedral Art Awards and The City of South Perth *Emerging Artist Exhibition* in which three Year 12 students Ryan Doray (12J), Nicholas Gumulya (12G) and Joseph Ruggeri (12W) were selected to exhibit. In this exhibition Nicholas Gumulya (12G) won the Secondary School Students Award for his work *Journey Forward*, a lino print and laser cut artist book exploring his cultural heritage, experiences and rites of passage growing from boy to man. Ryan Doray (12J) and Nicholas Gumulya's (12G) were also successful in being selected for the Year 12 *Perspectives Exhibition* at the Art Gallery of WA next year. The field of entries is extensive, with schools all over

Western Australia submitting up to five artworks each. The final exhibition comprises approximately 60 works.

Mr Robin Yakinthou was a selected exhibitor in the 2013 *Sculptures by the Sea* Exhibition for the third time. His work *Gift from the Gods* was purchased by the Premier's Department and gifted to the University of Western Australia to commemorate the institution's Centenary. The work is on permanent display outside the Somerville Auditorium.

Mrs Yvonne Wiese was recognised for Outstanding Service to the Profession through the presentation of this award by the Professional Teachers Council of Western Australia for her contributions to Art Education in the State.

Photography

Photography students consolidated their dominance in the Ilford Schools' Photographic Competition in 2013, earning Second Place in the Best School – Digital Photography Section. This is the second year that Wesley College has held one of the top two positions in this national competition.

In all, students were awarded 13 Certificates of Merit during the year with the work of one student being published on the cover of the Ilford schools' photography magazine *Images*.

Photography work contributed significantly to the annual *Masters and Apprentices Exhibition* in October. Students are to be commended on the quality of their work, their creativity and the diversity of subject matter.

2013 would not have been so fruitful without the ongoing support and hard work of all the teachers in the Arts Faculty and I would like to thank all who assisted me as the new Head of Arts this year. It is through their endeavours (along with our outstanding visiting staff who put so much effort into their private teaching, as well as rehearsals and performances) that an arts department is able to thrive. I also express my thanks to Mrs Annie Boehm and Mrs Pauline Christidis for their valuable administrative assistance and to the maintenance staff who willingly help with moving equipment for performances and to the wonderful Mr Kingsley Matheson for technical support throughout the year.

Finally, in the words of Richard Gill OAM, 'The Arts make us literate; the Arts make us numerate; the Arts inspire us to achieve things we thought unachievable; the Arts help us to think in abstraction; the Arts give every child an opportunity to think, dream, imagine, visualize, improvise, explore, evoke, suggest, imply an enormous range of emotions and ideas.'

MOORDITJ MOB

The Moorditj Mob is Wesley College's Indigenous Program. The program is an important part of the culture at the College and fosters great pride within the Wesley community.

The program currently supports 41 students from a range of language groups from across Western Australia. Moorditj is the Nyoongar word meaning great or excellent and fits well with that which the College strives to achieve. The program offers cultural education and develops pride and understanding in identity that complements a mainstream education. Students participate and engage in the program in different ways. One of the most well-known and public aspects of the program is the Moorditj Mob Dancers. This year these students performed to more than 10,000 students. They also ran cultural workshops and spoke about their identity as members of today's modern Aboriginal communities. Some of their more memorable performances included the Opening Ceremony for the National NAIDOC Week Celebrations, the West Australian Youth Awards Night at Crown Casino and the Wardarnji Festival in Fremantle. The Moorditj Mob is looking forward to many more performances - especially at the World Indigenous Peoples Conference in Education in May 2014 in Hawaii where they have been invited to perform.

There were a number of personal achievements in 2013. We had four students participate in the Indigenous Youth Leadership National Gathering that welcomed 156 students from across Australia to the Joondalup Golf Resort for a week of activities, lectures and tours. Special guests included state and federal politicians, Ms Ruby Rose, Mary G and Jeremy Donovan and this year's NAIDOC Week Youth Ambassadors. Jesse Bradshaw (12T) was

awarded both the Kimberly Klub and MADALAH award for academic excellence. Hugh Sando (11C) has been awarded Captain of Boarding for 2014 and Clem Smith (12T) continued to achieve numerous accolades for his abilities in Australian Football.

The Moorditj Mob program is made stronger by the links we have developed with the community. Future Footprints is our most significant partner and offers a range of activities and support throughout the year. Future Footprints is part of the Association of Public Schools of Western Australia. Many students worked with the Australian Indigenous Mentoring Experience known as AIME for the first time. This program invites students to Curtin University for four days to take part in intensive workshops and 15 hours of tutoring offered by their 'Tutor Squads'. The boys have also participated in activities organised by 'I am Other', the Kimberley Klub and ICEA.

The Moorditj Mob offers students the chance to attend Wesley College to pursue their academic abilities. These students would not otherwise have such an opportunity. It is not an easy challenge and families make enormous sacrifices to support the College and the community in succeeding to close the gap between Indigenous and non-Aboriginal peoples.

What a truly Moorditj program!

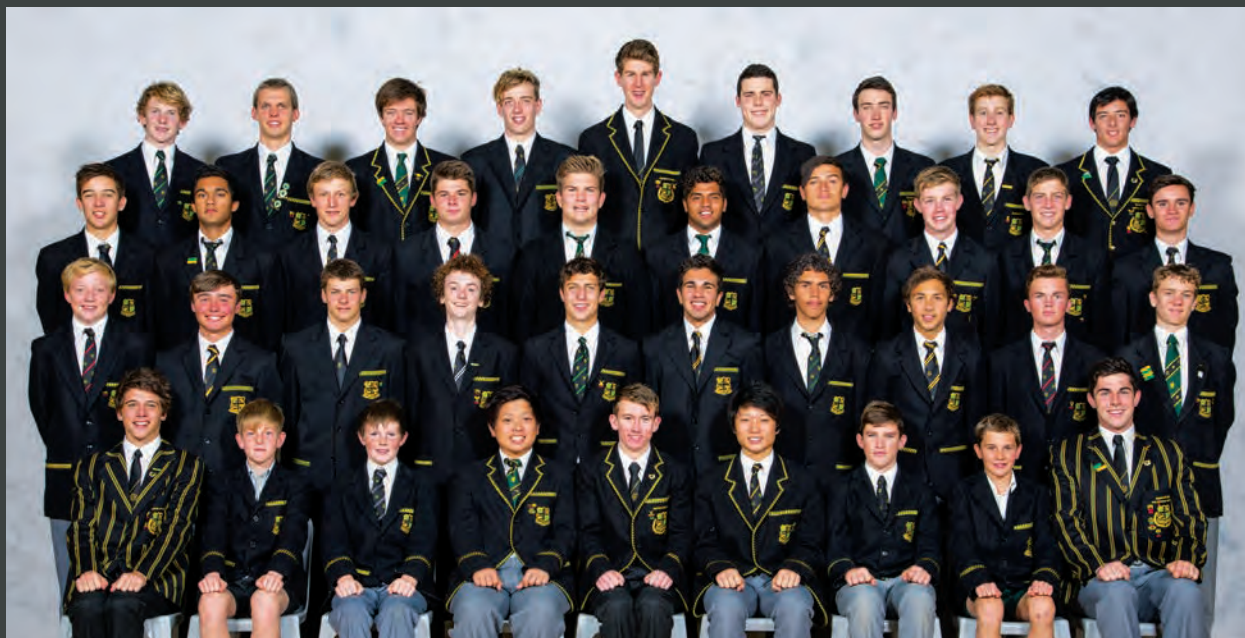

CHESS

Chess Club has been running again this year at lunchtimes for boys interested in some social competition. Students keen on more serious competition have been able to take part in some of our Inter-School teams or, for younger boys, in the after-school Chess tuition.

In Term 2 a band of Middle School students from Year 5 and 6 went to St Stephen's School, Carramar, to take part in the annual IPSHA Chess competition. This involved a full day of play against 17 other schools, including Christ Church Grammar School, Penrhos, Aquinas and Guildford Grammar. For some Year 5 students this was their first time representing Wesley in a school tournament and team members, Daniel Bourke (5G), Miles John (5J), Nic Carter (5G) and Adam Stanley (5M), did a sterling job, placed second on the day! Our more experienced team was short of players, due to the Year 7 camp, but three students, Aidan McGinty, Sebastian Vearncombe and Richard Chen, played admirably and came fifth overall, despite being down a player for the day.

Older boys had a chance to play in a friendly competition against Guildford, which has run for the last three years. This competition involved 10 Wesley boys up to Year 10: George Carolin-Unkovich (10H), Matthew Ashworth (8H), Manh-Kitt Clifford Lee (9G), Alexander Rohl (9J), and Nimit Agrawal (8W) in an A-team and Zachary Wiese (9M), Luke Shipman (7M), Kok Hong (Jacky) Thong (8J), Paul Tan (9G) and Spencer Cranston (10H) in a B-team. Wesley College played well winning the A-team competition, although Guildford just managed to beat us in the competition between B-teams.

In Term 3, two Wesley Chess teams participated in the Primary Inter-School Competition held at Trinity School. The A Team comprising Aidan McGinty (6D), Sebastian Vearncombe (6M), Richard Chen (6H), Luke Shipman (7M) and Kyle Monteiro (7G) competed fiercely all day and came a fantastic third position, missing out on second spot by just half a point. The B team, comprising Daniel Bourke (5G), Miles John (5J), Adam Stanley (5M) and Nic (5G) and Tom Carter (7J), competed well against some stiff competition. They were placed in joint sixth place out of 10 competing teams.

The Senior School PSA competition in Term 3 was the closest run yet, with both Wesley and Christ Church winning four matches and drawing two. The winner was decided on individual games and Christ Church had 20 to Wesley's 19.5, beating us to first place by a very narrow margin. Well done to George Carolin-Unkovich (10H) who was undefeated on Board 1 and to Han Huang (12D), James Brown (12W) and Calvin Warries (12M) who all played with maturity and dedication.

Mr Jack South, who runs his 'Chess for Life' club after school each week, has again been tutoring students who have an interest in improving their Chess skills. He offers this opportunity to students from the Junior School, as well as Middle School, and this has proved to be extremely popular again this year.

At the end of Term 2, an Inter-House competition was organised by Timothy Yen Cie (12J), Middle School Prefect, and involved three lunchtimes of competition amongst the Houses. This culminated in a final, played out between Matthew Ashworth (8H) and Aidan McGinty (6D) on the giant chess board and watched and cheered on by a wonderful crowd of supporters. The winning House was Dickson which was presented with the shield.

The Senior School Klem Cup Chess ran to a new format with larger teams made up from Years 9-12. It was a successful competition and led to a win by Walton.

DA VINCI DECATHLON

2013 has been a huge year for the Decathlon Competition, with a number of firsts, as well as the continued growth of the competition and program in WA.

This year has seen the first Senior Competition, our Year 10 Team, participating in the inaugural International Competition and nine Year 10 boys from that Senior Team being honoured with Emblems and Colours.

The da Vinci Decathlon is an annual program designed to challenge young minds in a variety of ways and culminates in a State Competition, National and (now the new) International Competition. Activities vary from Creative Producers (creating a 20 second impromptu dramatic performance), Mathematics and Chess, Science, Philosophy, Code Breaking, General Knowledge, Art and Poetry, English and Spelling and Engineering, to the new Cartography Challenge. The aim of the event is to stimulate young minds (and this year was no exception), with challenging questions and topics - not unlike the way Leonardo da Vinci pursued his curiosity and took on great challenges.

Year 7 and 8 Competition was held on Thursday 18 April. The boys were able to achieve second places for Science, Mathematics/Chess and General Knowledge. Overall, the boys came sixth out of a field of 28 top schools from all around WA. The Year 5 and 6 Competition was held on Friday 23 August with nine teams participating. The boys worked through the first session which included Science and Engineering in which the boys were placed third in both. The second session included challenges such as Mathematics/Chess, which the boys topped with first place, then English and Cartography with second place for both. In the final session, we finished strongly with first place in Code Breaking and third place in General Knowledge. The boys went home with second place medallions - a fantastic result!

The inaugural Senior Decathlon Year 9 and 10 was held on Friday 31 May, with 14 schools taking part. The bar was clearly higher for the older students and our boys rose to the occasion. All in all, it was a very successful day - first places in both Mathematics/Chess and Philosophy and a second place in Creative Producers. The team finished in fourth place overall.

National Competition success followed from the State competition. The boys competed very well over at Knox Grammar at the National Decathlon with many accolades coming their way, including a first place in the Philosophy Task, second place in Science, Creative Producers, Cartography, Art and Poetry, and a third for Code Breaking. The International event was held in Milan, Italy, but we were able to participate via the internet from Wesley with some great results. Overall, we came fifth, from 14 schools, including Cushing Academy, North Stokes and St Margaret's Episcopal School from the USA. Also taking part were Mira Model in India, Dalbeattie High School in Scotland and St Andrew's College from South Africa. The boys were able to secure an equal first place in the Engineering, second place for the Code Breaking and third place for the Philosophy.

I would like to express a huge thank you to Ms Susan Ryan for her help and support on the tour and for coaching the older boys. It was a fantastic year for the program, getting more boys involved and, offering great opportunities for the many facets of human gifts to be challenged and expressed - as the ideals of Leonardo da Vinci grow through the Wesley Community.

Once again Mrs Claire Rossi continue to coach and support the boys in their trial preparation and always goes beyond the call of volunteering. We look forward to renewed interest from Year 10 and 11 boys in 2014 to maintain the fine reputation that Wesley College upholds in the legal fraternity.

CHOIR

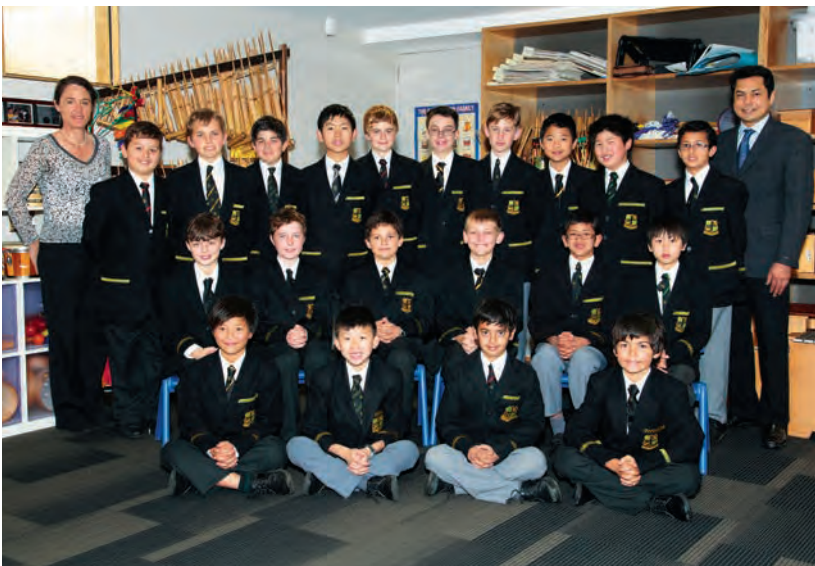

fantastic to see the enjoyment on the faces of the boys, particularly during the choreographed numbers.

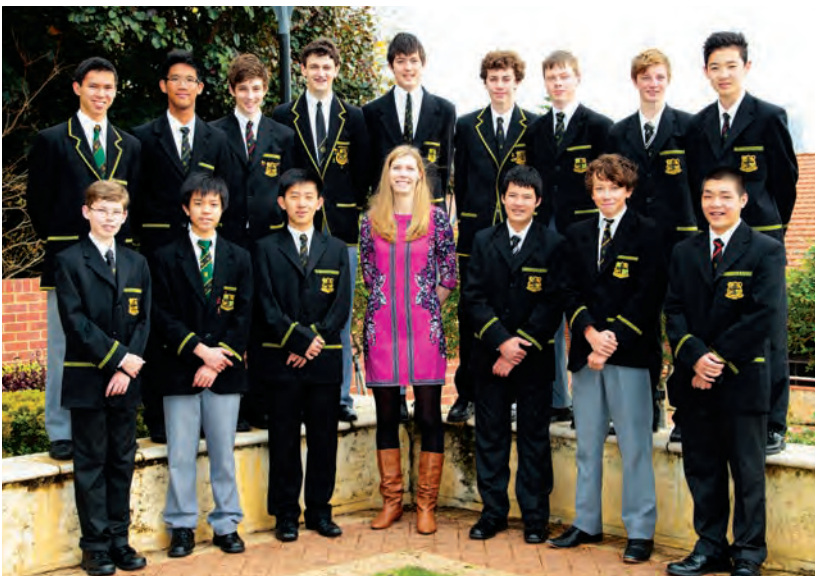

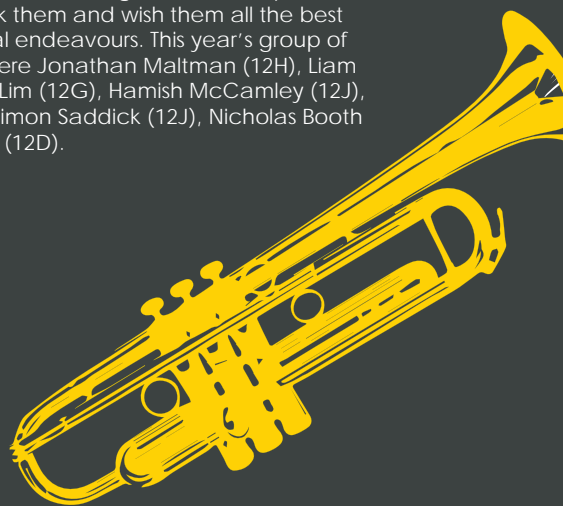
JAZZ AND PERCUSSION

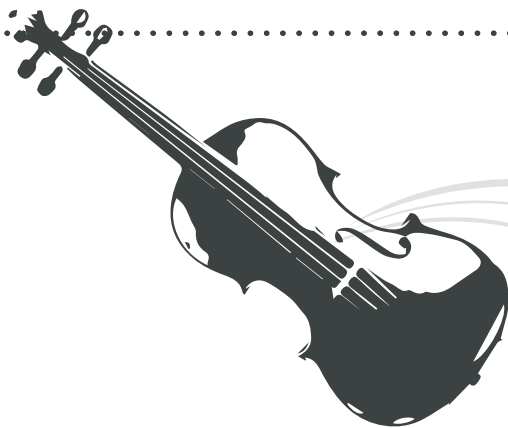

CHORAL SPEAKING

SPEECH & DRAMA

Speech and Drama has now been in operation for four years. By all accounts, it has been a most successful initiative with many boys benefiting from the program.

To begin 2014, 80 boys from Years 5 to 12 will start or continue the program. The four Year 12 boys will conclude their study halfway through Year 12 and sit their AMEB Grade 8 exam at this time to allow them to concentrate solely on WACE. It is hoped that they will return to the program at a later date. The only other Year 12, Benjamin Edwards (who began the program in its first year) has continued to study, this year passing his Associate Diploma Theory and will complete his Diploma with his Practical exam in 2014.

In the early stages of the course the requirements were that all boys sat their AMEB examination at the end of the year and were encouraged to enter the Perth Speech and Drama Festival. Since that time it has grown – there are at least 50 boys every year who take part in the Festival and have had some wonderful successes competing in Poetry, Prose, Storytelling, Monologues and Duologues. Although many boys are deserving, it should be mentioned that Sebastian Amos (11W) and Nicholas Pritchard (11H) have won the Duologue section for their age group every year since first entering in 2010.

Wesley also takes part in the North of Perth Festival, where again we have achieved wonderful success. Tianchi Ren (11M), who won the Year 11 Poetry section at the Perth Speech and Drama Festival, went on to win the Under 17 Prose/Poetry Section at the North of Perth. Joshua Berryman (Year 7) also completed the double, winning at both Festivals.

The AMEB exam results continue to be impressive and of the 67 boys who sat last year, 10 received an A+ and 22 an A. The recipients of the A+ were presented with a special Award at the Octagon Theatre in March 2014.

Since 2012 the program has broadened to include Public Speaking and this acquired skill is now an important part of the Wesley calendar. Last year Leyton Hilmer (8M) won both the 'Speak with Confidence' Award and the 'Speak Up' Award. This year, Rupert Kang (7H) won the 'Speak with Confidence' and Joshua Berryman (7M) reached the final 15 from 200 in the 'Speak Up'. This was an amazing achievement from all three speakers. It is hoped that the interest in public speaking from the Middle School will continue into the Senior School.

It is very pleasing for me that this year, for the first time, a section on 'Public Speaking' was included for our new student leaders in 2014, forming part of their 'leadership development' day. Although this was only a snapshot, it was a beginning and hopefully more work in this area can be done to help the boys. I look forward to exciting times ahead!

ATHLETICS

2013 got underway with the annual Inter-House Athletics Carnival, where a resurgent Tranby House finished on top. The day provided an opportunity for a broad spectrum of talent to be displayed and for all students to participate and challenge their mates.

A lengthy break followed during the winter sport season. Then, the compact athletics program was up and running. Pressure was piled on the squad and coaching staff instantly, with the annual meet against Aquinas held after some four training sessions. The squad proved to be competitive, with solid performances on a very windy afternoon. As there were only two schools competing, Wesley was able to enter a large contingent of athletes demonstrating a greater depth of talent than in previous years.

Another solid week of training allowed boys to consolidate performances, enhance techniques, and build towards the Quads meet. Held at Scotch College, the Quads meet gave athletes an opportunity to accurately gauge themselves, and gain experience and confidence before Inters. Performance-wise, the squad was not at its best, however there were many promising signs and impressive individual performances throughout the day. Wesley held on to second position behind Inters favourites and reigning title holders Scotch.

Inters proved to be a tough day, with Wesley failing to capitalise on the hard work put in at training. After finishing in fifth place, it was evident for some athletes that they had not put in sufficient hours on the track in the weeks leading up to the event, but this should not detract from the numerous outstanding individual performances, as well as the collective effort of the U17 age group, who dominated throughout the day. The squad was consistent and we were able to perform in all events, with our strongest being 110m Hurdles, Triple Jump, High Jump and Shot-put.

The U17 Wesley boys were the overall Champion Year Group, led by Vincent Adams (11C) who was runner-up for the U17 Age Champion. Vincent finished the day with three division one wins and demonstrated talent and class in each of his five events. Scott Maclean (8D) was the U14 Age Champion, dominating the throws with wins in shot-put and discuss.

Other individual event winners on the day were Kirill Butler (7J) (U13 High Jump Div 2), Harry Hughes (8D) (U14 Hurdles Div 2), Thomas Marshall (10H) (U16 Long Jump Div 1), Douglas Benny (11W) (U17 Shot Div 1) and Michael Thomas (11W) (U17 1500m Div 1). A special mention goes to Kai Jones (7W) who broke the old PSA record of 1.54m finishing 2nd in the U13 High Jump with a jump of 1.56m – unlucky not to take out the victory, but an almighty effort nonetheless.

On behalf of the squad I would like to thank the coaching staff for their commitment and support throughout the season. Braving all sorts of weather, and generously giving of their time and expertise, Wesley's coaching staff worked hard to assist us with our endeavours. I would also like to thank the open boys and Vice-Captains Jesse Bradshaw (12T) and Daniel Ashwin (12T) for their leadership this year and endeavours over the last 5 years.

I appreciate the commitment displayed by all boys throughout the season, although if speaking honestly, collectively we underperformed. I would really like to emphasise the capability and possibility of the athletes at Wesley, and encourage all athletes to train meticulously and frequently in 2014. I have full confidence in the squad going forward, and I do believe that our school has the physical talent to be successful. The onus lies on the Senior School students to attend training, and to involve themselves in the athletics program.

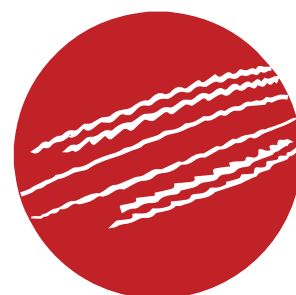

It was one of the many times Wesley had scored even after conceding first.

Although our final position of fourth can be seen as 'okay' by some, it was still a somewhat disappointing result - given the quality and talent of this year's squad. However, in many ways this season can be seen as a positive experience. With the highest goals tally in the PSA league competition, a spread of goals amongst the players, a mixture of year levels in the first squad, an array of talented footballers, a winning 2nds team and many memorable moments, this season would have gone down as one of the best in the history of Wesley College football.

With the young talent (including the young Year 8s and 9s) evident at the College, by God's grace the future is going to be bright and there can be many more memorable seasons of Wesley College Football (Soccer).

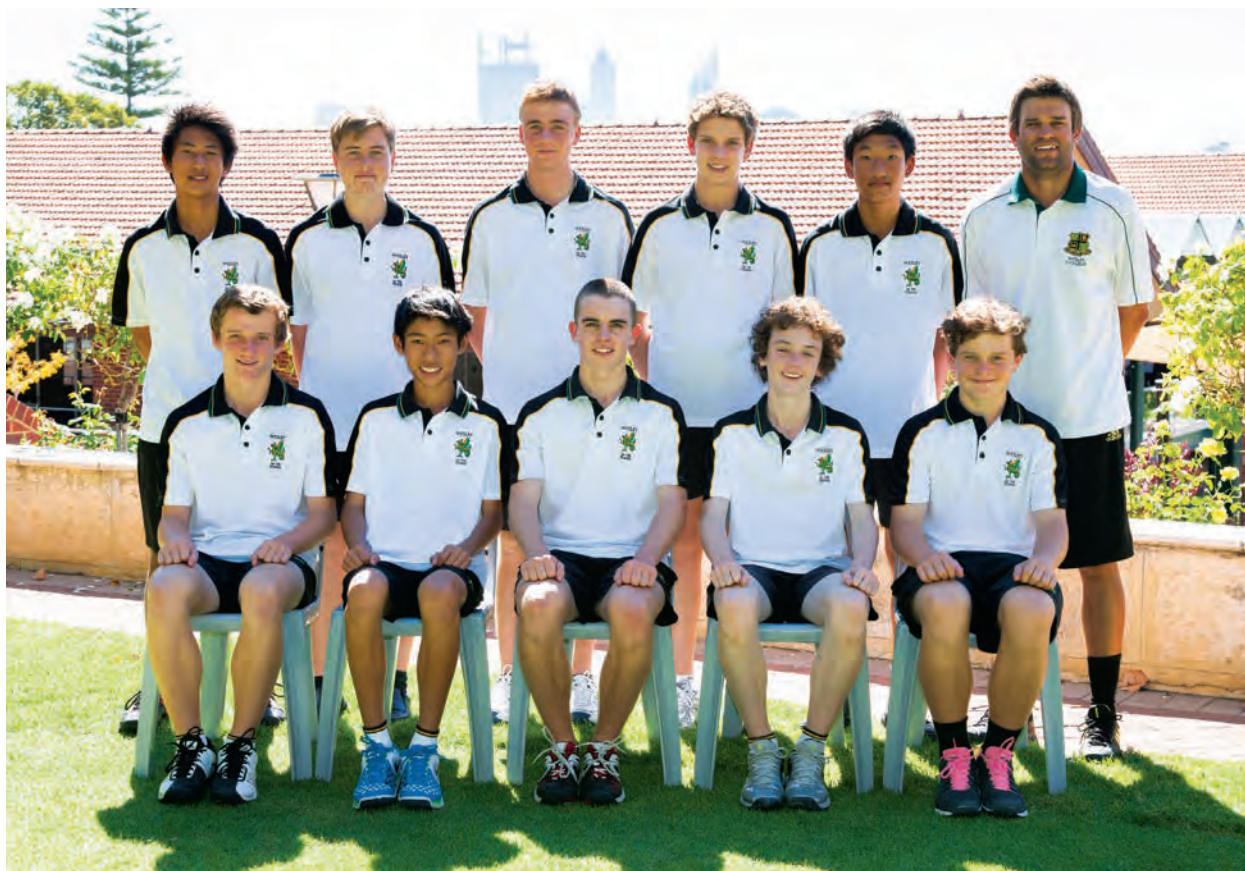

A tightly-fought 3-2 loss to Aquinas at the beginning of the season prevented them from finishing with a perfect record.

The 10A side finished unbeaten and their success was closely followed by the 10Bs. This age group is proving to be very strong, as there are numerous boys who bring many years of experience to the side. Led by Jack Coope (10T) and Oakie Diggins (10W), the boys worked hard under coach John Montenegro and are beginning to reap the rewards.

In the senior age groups, the 3rds VI proved to be a true testament to the sport, finishing off the season with a hard-fought 2-2 draw with Scotch. The boys consistently gave their all and had a very enjoyable season with some big wins against Christ Church, Hale and Guildford.

Under the strong leadership of Jack Davoren (12M) and Marcus Voola (11M), the 2nd VI was able to form a tight cohort and as the season progressed many friendships were forged within the team. The boys finished in second place, only dropping a handful of sets throughout the season. The squad boasted a couple of players who had travelled to Melbourne and were able to set themselves up strongly in every game.

Since its inception as a PSA sport in 2000, Wesley had only won the competition once before, back in 2010. However, the 1st VI was successful in their campaign in 2013. Coached by former 1st VI captain Matthew Pallot (04-11), the team began the season with an emphatic 3-2 victory over rival Aquinas in a game that left former coach Mr Mike Dempsey torn between the two sides. The game lasted for almost 2-½ hours and the side was supported by a large number of students, staff and younger volleyballers who worked together to create an electric atmosphere. Following this result, the side posted strong performances against Christ Church and easily bypassed the potential threat from Hale. However, the boys suffered a shattering defeat to Trinity, leaving them speechless and with their first defeat of the season. However, the performance (or lack thereof) proved to be a one-off, as the side bounced back to win the remainder of the games. A string of strong performances by Darcy Martin (12C), Stuart Norman (12T), Jayden Lewis (12M) and Guruprasad (Guru) Ravikumara (12J), coupled with the backcourt leadership of Libero Cameron Forrest (12J), allowed the team to work hard during training and ultimately succeed in what has been the culmination of many years of work and planning for the squad.

Following on from last year where six boys were selected to represent Western Australia in the U/17 age group (five of these boys competed for this year's First VI), three more boys were selected to represent the state. Jayden Lewis (12M) was selected for the U/19 team, Jack Coope (10T) selected in the U/17 age group, with Oakie Diggins (10W) chosen in the U/16 squad.

The season was concluded with a wind up which served to provide a physical embodiment of the community spirit formed over the season. It was delightful to see the interaction between the boys and their coaches in the staff vs student games and to see the pride from the parents as they looked on. I would like to thank all parents for the support they provided to their sons throughout the season and for the time they gave in organising the season wind up. I would also like to acknowledge the coach of the 1st VI Mr Matthew Pallot (04-11), since it was largely due to him that the 1st VI was able to achieve success and set such a high benchmark for all teams in the program. I would also like to mention Mr Steve Page for his ongoing work with the 2nd VI and the Wesley volleyball program. Also, a big thank you to all other coaches who went above and beyond to help the sport to be enjoyed by so many.

COCOS ISLAND TOUR

With an early 6.00am start at Perth Airport on Tuesday 20 August, 24 students with Mr Mike Sofoulis and Mr Oliver Gee headed off to Cocos (Keeling) Islands. After fuel stops on the way via Port Hedland and Christmas Island we finally ended up at the tropical paradise for a late lunch.

The Cocos (Keeling) Islands group is a cluster of 27 coral islands forming two atolls located in the Indian Ocean about 2,750km northwest of Perth. The horseshoe-shaped chain of islands comprises five major islands including the inhabited Home and West Islands.

This Island paradise has it all and is one of the last undeveloped tropical islands in the world (in particular, Direction Island). The islands are ideal for fishing, snorkelling, swimming, canoeing and exploring the pristine coral and tropical marine environments. The Cocos Malay community are warm, friendly people tracing their ancestral roots to east Africa, China, Java, Borneo and Malacca. The Muslim faith is strictly observed and a local dialect of Malay is spoken with students also learning English. There are two schools on the islands – a Primary School on Home Island and a District High School on West Island.

After a scenic tour of the West Island and a quick swim to cool off, followed by a scrumptious meal, we headed off to bed for an early start in the morning. Wednesday morning was spent investigating and snorkelling around a small island (Pulo Maria) located just off the Southern tip of West Island. Then after lunch we went on a canoeing expedition in outrigger canoes (with small outboard motors) where we all had a fantastic time snorkelling and island-hopping, travelling over fantastic coral beds and taking in unbelievable scenery around the uninhabited Southern Island chain. This was followed by a drift snorkel, jungle walk and crab races before heading back in the early evening to enjoy a beach barbeque.

Thursday involved a ferry ride to Direction Island. Snorkelling in these pristine tropical coral marine environments was unbelievable, as was the glass bottom boat snorkel in the waters off Direction Island and feeding some fish to the small reef sharks.

Friday was spent at the District High School doing a full day program with the West Island staff and students. The day included a variety of class activities from interview sessions with students, language lessons, cultural exchanges and lessons about Ramadan, to a 'full on' sports competition with Cocos Island Students vs Wesley in a series of athletics challenges. We competed well, but were no match for the barefoot athletes on home turf. They also excelled in touch rugby, although we put up a valiant effort against a lightning fast opposition. We presented the students with a much-needed bag of sports equipment that included some AFL footballs, volleyballs, basketballs and rugby balls that were a real hit with them all.

On Saturday we embarked upon some community service, clearing about 6km of local roadway/tracks full of coconuts and branches that had been washed up after some earlier storms and were a general hazard to road users. The local community was very impressed with this work and really appreciated our efforts – job well done! Saturday evening and Sunday provided more snorkelling and fishing adventures full of fish stories - mainly about the many that got away. Let's just say that we did our best to feed the fish around Cocos Island and any time we managed to catch one, the sharks certainly prevented us from landing it.

We spent Monday with the Malay Primary students from Home Island where they took us through a number of cultural classes. We had language lessons, sampled foods, helped with artworks and ate sweets that the students cooked for us. We also learnt how to weave and heard many stories about their cultural history. They even had a school assembly for us and sang a series of songs to farewell us and thank us for our visit.

On Tuesday there was just enough time to pack and purchase some small gifts to take home to family members, before flying back over the thousands of kilometres of water to arrive back in Perth.

The tour was a fantastic experience and all the students had many stories to tell parents about the unique Island environments and the friendly students they had met. Many thanks to the staff and students of Cocos Island for another sensational trip and we look forward to another tour in 2014.

After this energy-packed program it was indeed a very quiet trip home on the plane. The boys were excellent ambassadors for the College and we received numerous compliments about their good manners and behaviour from guides and the public in general. They had many stories to tell on their return and they were very grateful not only to the staff who went on tour with them, but also to their parents for giving them the opportunity to participate.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of students being able to visit their National Capital as part of their civics and citizenship education. This moment was followed by a special Wesley College service where the students honoured and read out the names of the 56 Old Wesleyans who were killed in battle during the conflicts. We also honoured other family members involved in past wars.

The next week was spent on a wide variety of excursions that included the National Capital Planning Exhibition and the New Parliament House whilst Parliament was sitting. We toured the chambers and took part in some role-playing sessions and met some politicians with Wesley connections (MP for Swan Mr Steve Irons, MP for Cowan Mr Luke Simpkins and Minister for Defence and Senator for Western Australia the Hon David Johnston). Other excursions and visits were to Old Parliament House, an educational session at the Australian Electoral Commission, a day at the Australian War Memorial, a visit to the Deep Space Communications Centre, a visit and Sports day at the Australian Institute of Sport, National Screen and Sound Archives, CSIRO, a night session at Questacon and a day of Arts at the National Museum of Australia and the National Portrait Gallery followed by a paddle and bike ride around Lake Burley Griffin to take in the sites.

We had a fantastic barbecue lunch at Black Mountain Reserve with Mr Mike Sofoulis and Mr King working hard preparing a great meal while Mrs Mia Sullivan, Mrs Sawyer and Ms Thorson kept an eye on the sports field with heaps of games and activities to burn off some excess energy in the sunshine.

The boys were excellent ambassadors for the College and received numerous compliments about their good manners and excellent behaviour from tour guides, the public in general and even the airlines. The boys had many stories to relate on their return and they were very grateful, not only to the staff who went on the tour, but also to their parents for giving them the opportunity to participate.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of students being able to visit their National Capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship Education and contributes funding of \$260.00 per student participating in the tour under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER) program toward incurred travel expenses. We would like to acknowledge and thank the Australian Government for their ongoing support of this program and initiative that certainly helped in making this trip a truly memorable experience for all.

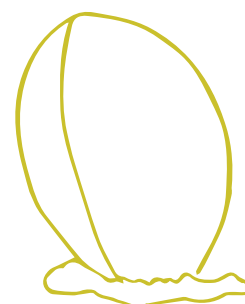
WESLEY COLLEGE V EMMANUEL COLLEGE

Year 7 Outdoor Education Camp

The Year 7 Outdoor Education camp started in fairly warm and mild conditions with the hint of a few showers that slowly began to clear. The students were well-equipped with thermals, waterproofs and assorted gear and equipment to brave the pre-winter cool conditions expected at Dwellingup. Once we arrived and settled in at Nanga Bushcamp, the boys participated in a series of outdoor pursuits in their class groups with a member of staff and some specialist instructors, when required. There was something for everyone from bush craft, to white-water rafting, abseiling and climbing, ropes courses, mountain biking, canoeing, bush cooking, orienteering and the construction of survival shelters – all packed into the four-day program. The boys were kept busy with a full program of events and activities during the day and work books and diaries to complete at night, as well as games and activities.

Year 9 Camp

The Year 9 Camp at Forest Edge in Waroona was a great opportunity for students to be involved in a variety of activities (abseiling, climbing, team games, mountain biking, canoeing, orienteering, raft building, ropes course, etc.) and included an overnight swag stay component. Boys in their tutor groups were involved in both group and individual activities, completing tasks and challenges along the way. The dormitory standing campsite was used for two nights and one swag campsite with a huge tarp cover for an overnight stay. That meant each group completed activities based around the campsites and moved between the two. This was a real test of personal preparation and organisational skills and boys managed the transitions and activities without a hitch. The staff and tutors had some great moments accompanying the students throughout the camp and some wonderful stories were told around the campfires at night.

Year 10 Expeditions

The Year 10 Expeditions provided an extension of the Year 9 outdoor education program. These expeditions offer both the practical side of outdoor education as well as the experiential learning aspect in an appropriately challenging environment full of adventure, excitement and diversity. With an emphasis on safety and organisation, students were encouraged to develop a growing sense of competence in dealing with the natural environment at an appropriately challenging level. Students were able to choose an expedition in the Pilbara, Kalbarri, Dwellingup or Waroona Regions, commensurate with their abilities and interests. This unique opportunity existed for all Year 10 students in the first week of Term 4 and continues to be one of the highlights of the Year 10 program.

10 day Pilbara Safari

The 10 day Pilbara Safari was probably the most demanding trip involving a series of 'Gorge Hops' through the Karijini National Park. Exploration was by way of hiking, climbing and travelling through the Gorge Pools on air mattresses with gear and equipment carried in a backpack. With over 70 students choosing this adventurous option, two trips ran concurrently with Mr Mike Sofoulis and Mr Holt leading both groups through the Gorge sections (with Mr Lyndon Brieffies and Mr Tony McNickle) and Mr Stephen Hyde leading both groups through other parts of the National Park (with Mr Lyndon Brieffies and Mr Tony McNickle). The photos show we visited some unique, interesting and challenging locations. The boys had a

great time with many tales to tell as we ventured through some unbelievable scenery and locations along the way. Their stories about these experiences and adventures will be told for many years to come to anyone who will listen.

Kalbarri Tour

The Kalbarri Tour was split into three groups this year to cater for the large number of students wanting to participate in this popular trip. Boys on these camps had an opportunity to undertake a variety of challenging activities which sometimes pushed them outside their comfort zones and tested their ability to organise themselves and work within a small group and independently. Their activities included hiking, canoeing along the Murchison River, climbing, air-bedding, camping from Z-Bend to Four Ways and from Four Ways to the Loop (following the Murchison Gorges), and finally tackling the spectacular sand dunes of Lucky Bay (including the massive OMG hill) on sand boards.

Boys learnt how to cook their own meals on the camp fire and slept in some unique locations under the stars on their air beds. For many students this was their first real camping experience and they thoroughly enjoyed the trip.

Thanks to the staff at Cross Country Safaris and to Mr Glenn Solomon, Mr Paul Sexton, Mr Nicholas Ward, Mr Andrew Pateman, Mr Matthew Cureton and Mr John Taylor, who all did a great job in guiding the boys through the gorges. The groups not only had a great time in some spectacular and rarely frequented areas, but also learnt more about coping in the outdoors and gained an appreciation of how to minimise their environmental impact.

Munda Biddi Mountain Bike Expedition

The Munda Biddi Mountain Bike Expedition around Dwellingup was a great trip again where a group of 24 boys under the direction from Dwellingup Adventures instructors, along with Mr Kieran Cranley and Mr Ross Websdale, tackled some of the trails in the Dwellingup region. There were lots of thrills with the occasional spill as the boys learnt the skills that enabled them to master their mountain bikes with some sense of control. They all had a great time and camped in some amazing locations along the way.

Forest Edge Adventure

The Forest Edge Adventure in Waroona was once again an excellent trip where a group of 24 boys participated in a series of outdoor pursuits under the watchful eye of our camp host Mr Graham Watson and instructors, along with Mr Greg Wilkinson and Mr Samuel King. Some of the activities included abseiling, climbing, rafting, canoeing, ski biscuit rides on the lake and camping under the stars in swags. With a full program of activities during the days the boys really enjoyed the rest and downtime at night around the campfire listening to many of Mr Greg Wilkinson's stories.

HEAD OF SENIOR SCHOOL

With new students and staff arriving, Year 12 departing and Year 8 making the transition to the Senior School (as well as the continual innovations and strategies that are implemented to enhance learning), every Senior School year is different, rewarding and challenging. This year was no different.

Our Community

I am continually amazed at just how far the Wesley spirit spreads outside the College fence line and into the wider community. Through parent involvement, community partnerships and House activities, a strong sense of belonging is enhanced and relationships are strengthened.

Many parents and friends have worked in various roles to support Senior School activities including the Parents' & Friends' Association, House representatives, sport and music parent support groups, student careers support and on committees supporting events and functions, such as Valedictory activities. To those parents, I am most grateful for the time you have shared, your passion to contribute and the enthusiasm you show in supporting Wesley.

The Klem Cup, our House competition to promote student belonging, team spirit and vertical interaction, went from strength to strength. Congratulations to Grove House for winning this competition and finally defeating the Boarding Houses that enjoyed a run of wins in the years prior.

One of the year's highlights and a wonderful community-building event was Pioneers' Day where, at a chapel service, assembly and long lunch, the College hosted the members of the graduating Class of 1963. The interactions with our students and time spent together were highly valued by the boys and a powerful expression of Wesley culture was evident.

The Student Body

Whilst the number of PSA sporting victories was limited to Volleyball and Badminton wins, outstanding student achievement occurred across a diversity of areas showcasing the talent of so many boys in the College. Assemblies were regularly kept busy acknowledging these feats. Across the academic spectrum, in sport, music and Speech and Drama, there were consistent individual and team achievements. Our Senior Debating team finished 3rd in the state competition; our Mock Trials team was well placed; the College finished 2nd at the National Philosophical championships in Sydney; our Senior da Vinci Decathlon team was invited to the international championships in Milan, Italy and finished 5th; and students picked up seven of the first eight places, including 1st place in the woodworking section of the Perth Royal Show.

Culturally, The Arts continued to shine with large numbers of boys learning a diversity of musical instruments. The year began with an outstanding performance from the Stage Band and Radio Orchestra with student singers performing *The Crooners Concert*. In September, the Radio Orchestra performed *The Blues Brothers* album as part of their classic album series, mirroring the quality of Dire Straits *Brother's in Arms* and Billy Joel's *The Stranger* concerts of previous years. The Drama production of *The Outsiders* was another wonderful student-owned performance, not just in the sphere of acting, but also in media, sound and lighting.

We had a cross section of individual achievements that are worthy of recognition. They included College Captain of School Harrison Main (12D) being awarded the Tuckwell

Scholarship to the Australian National University, Benjamin Manifold (12G) gaining representation as a delegate to the United Nations Youth Conference, Clem Smith (12T) being awarded All Australian selection at the National Under 18 National Football championships and Jonathan Maltman (12H) and Benjamin Lim (12G) gaining places at WAAPA (Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts) in 2014 for their individual music talents.

As with previous years the student leaders led the student body with their own style and personality and always with strong ideas and themes that were honoured through activities and role modelling. Led by Captain of School, Harrison Main (12D), and Vice-Captain, Ethan Dodd (12G), the Prefect group raised awareness of blood donation and commitment to study routine and supported many initiatives through fundraising, both student-led and staff-driven. The Student Representative Council frequently raised awareness of student issues and supporting College-driven and community initiatives.

The greatest achievement for the Prefect body in 2013 was the development of a broader approach to leadership through increasing our student leadership numbers to include committees of boys who assist the 16 current Prefects. These committees were across all aspects of the College (House, student events, Art, Sport, Middle School and Junior School) and were charged with initiating change, leading activities and serving the College community in a broad capacity. The individual committees are supported directly by College staff (Headmaster, Heads of School, House Co-ordinators, Head of Sport, Head of Arts, Dean of Student Management, Director of Student Wellbeing and Year 12 Mentors) who worked with the students to develop their leadership skills through action and service to others. This being a foundation year, it has left a significant legacy that will enable future years to build upon.

Throughout the year, most Wesley students were actively involved in a wide range of services to their community. In fact, 5480 hours of service were completed by Senior School students across more than 40 activities. Community Service and Service Learning continues to grow because it has placements to suit students of all ages, coupled with a range of activities that are available at many different times of the College week, weekend or holiday period. Relay for Life and Shave for a Cure continue to be popular and community links are being strengthened each year with our Houses supporting the following organisations and themes:

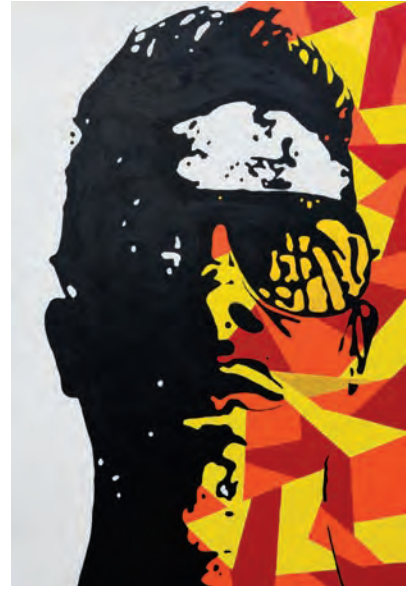

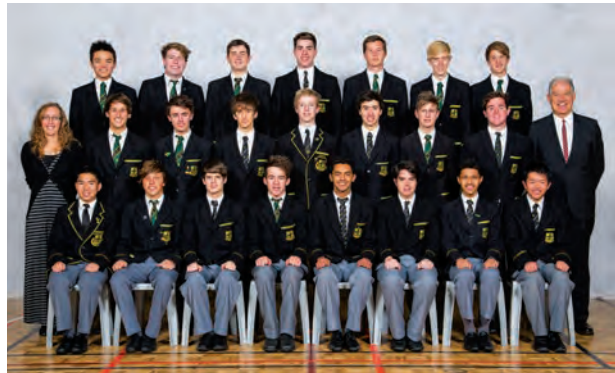

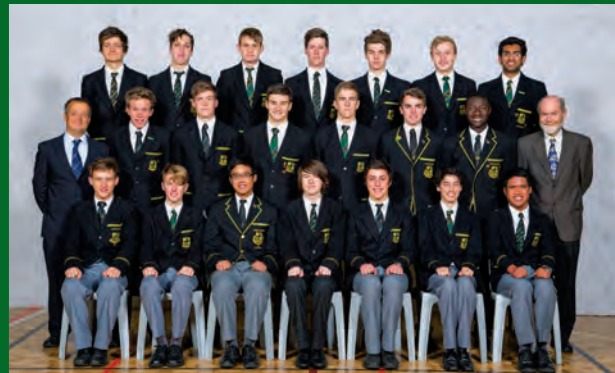

Service Learning and Outdoor Education Programs came together during our annual tour to Cocos Island. Mr Mike Sofoulis organised a series of service tasks for our tour members who helped the students of the local District High School. Middle School boys also took part in two Canberra tours run by Mr Mike Sofoulis, timed to coincide firstly with ANZAC Day and secondly with Remembrance Day. Again, the boys represented Wesley College with pride and we later received emails and letters of appreciation from members of the public who wished to pass on their praise of the quality of our students wearing the Wesley College uniform.

Our philosophy in Middle School is to provide every opportunity for the boys to develop leadership skills by sharing leadership throughout the tutor classes. Our Student Representative Council (SRC) members were active in 2013 and two delegates each month met with Ms Liz Rogers and myself to enable 'the student voice' to be heard. From these discussions the SRC raised enough money to purchase four table tennis tables and equipment to entertain Middle School boys during recess and lunch. Other notable suggestions were hangers in the change rooms, lost property collections, House competitions for 2014 in the manner of the Senior School Klem Cup and a fund raising event to raise money for the Bush Fire Appeal.

Academically, the College embraced practical, project-based 'real life learning'. The Year 8 students had to design and build catapults to send a payload across a certain distance into a 'castle', using their understanding of 'simple machines' such as levers, screws and planes. The Year 6 boys enjoyed success with the second annual *Flugtag Competition* (day of flight). Amazing designs of flying machines zoomed across the quad and were chased by excited boys and their even more excited

parents. Working with their parents, the boys had to use their theoretical understanding of the physics of flight to then design, build, fly and evaluate their flying machine. The Year 7 team researched 'sustainability' projects in field work at venues throughout Perth, Swan and Canning Rivers and then demonstrated their findings in a Sustainability Fair. In Term 4 the Year 5 boys took centre stage with Mr Stephen Hyde and his Design & Technology amazing *Billy Kart Competition*. This year the event was moved to Hanton Quad with a wide range of challenges designed to test the design and build of each 'billy kart'. It was the culmination of a term's work with all the boys working in teams to design, build and evaluate aspects of strength, durability, speed and effectiveness of their racers. The last event saw parents, staff and boys racing one another in this year's 'bragging rights' and was a definite highlight for participants and the audience.

On the Music and Performing Arts stage, our Year 6 boys, with Miss Ashleigh Slater and Miss Gemma Harwood, literally 'brought the house down' with a standing ovation at the annual IPSHA Performing Arts Festival at the Perth Convention Centre. Their singing and interpretive dance piece, *Children of the Dump* was designed to bring attention to the children who live, for their entire lives, in city rubbish tips in Cambodia. The students helped choreograph the dance and movements, arranged the lyrics and helped write the narration and music for the dramatic piece. They also created their own costumes, musical instruments and helped Mr Robin Yakinthou design and create the seven-foot iron and steel statue used as a backdrop. As the boys so eloquently explained during the performance, 'We wanted to give a voice to those children who have none and yet still find something to smile about as they go about their daily lives'. An outstanding performance demonstrating all four College values of compassion, respect, integrity and courage in

The Swan River Movie Project proved one of the key experiences for the boys to develop an understanding of Perth's controversial history as well as gain a great insight into the complexities of working in teams. The quality of their movies this year set new standards. Community partnerships are a key component of deeper learning

at Katitjin and we were very fortunate again to continue relationships with Royal Perth Yacht Club, Mr Greg Stubbs and the families at Morapoi, Uniting Care West and Activ. We were also very privileged to work with Dismantle for the first time this year, a not-for-profit organisation based in Fremantle, which uses the medium of bike building to engage students with learning and their community. As part of the Social Justice unit, the Term 4, 807 class built a number of recycled bikes which they donated to the more needy people in the Perth community. The boys of 807 also broke new ground late in 2013 with our first camp to the Great Southern Region and more specifically Parry's Beach. The teaching staff at Katitjin continue to play a significant role in the success of the program and we were fortunate to have the knowledge, expertise and the personality of Mr Glen Innis as well as the highly committed Year 8 teaching team.

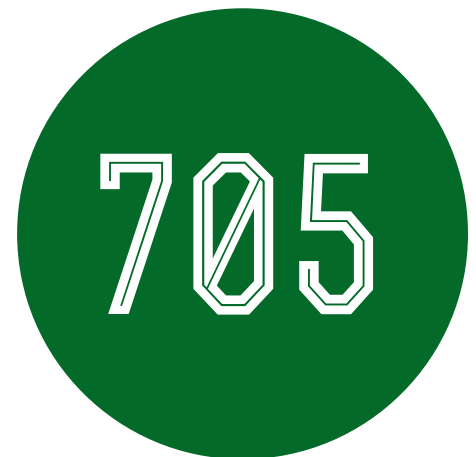

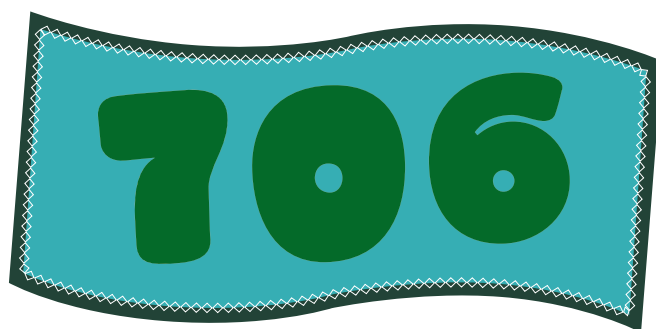

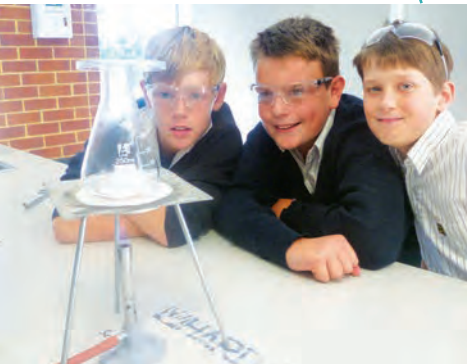

The IPSHA Drama Performance, highlighting poverty in Cambodia,

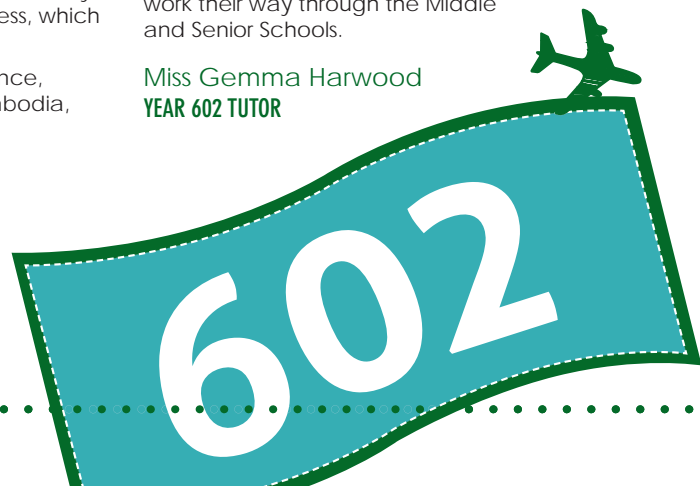

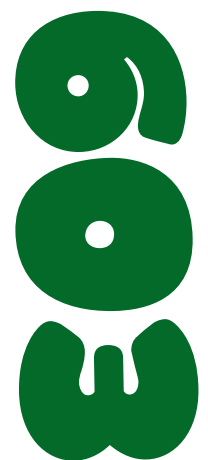

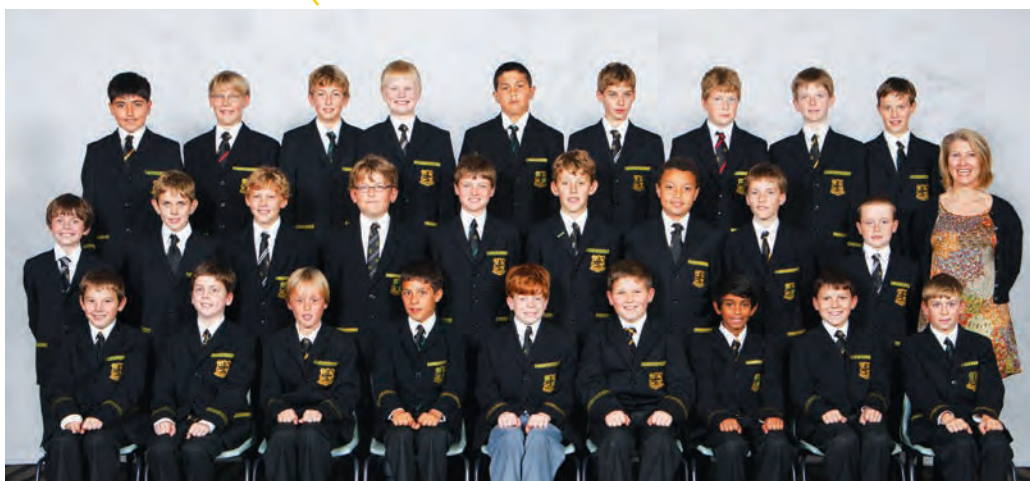

HEAD OF JUNIOR SCHOOL

Throughout 2013 we have continued to focus on providing our students in the Junior School with a well-balanced education that provides them with every opportunity to develop a strong foundation of literacy and numeracy skills, alongside an Inquiry program that promotes critical and creative thinking, questioning and problem-solving.

In addition to explicit opportunities to develop literacy and numeracy skills, our Units of Inquiry during 2013 allowed students to explore concepts within the Australian Curriculum areas of Science and History, whilst also incorporating elements of numeracy and literacy, where relevant and appropriate. Students also worked with experienced specialist teachers in various areas of the Arts, Indonesian, Physical Education, Library and Sustainability. In our Early Learning classrooms, teachers have continued to embed the principles outlined in the national Early Years Learning Framework into programs, whilst also ensuring clear links are made to prepare the children for the content included in the Australian Curriculum when they reach Pre-primary.

At a time when Australia is experiencing great change in education, I feel privileged to work with extremely dedicated staff in the Junior School and I thank them for their ongoing efforts to manage the transition to the Australian Curriculum and commitment to providing an effective balance between knowledge, understandings and skills in each of our learning areas. An additional thank you to the Assistant Head of Junior School and Literacy Co-ordinator, Mrs Candice Clynk, for her tireless efforts and dedication to her role and our College. We will certainly miss her in 2014 as she spends the year on parental leave and wish her all the best at this exciting time in her life. Mrs Jo Edinger has continued to support our implementation of the Early Years Learning Framework in her role as Early Learning Co-ordinator and I am grateful for her time and efforts in this area.

During 2013 all Junior School staff continued to collaborate in Curriculum Teams. I acknowledge Mr Jim Howard for his work in the area of Student Wellbeing, Ms Caroline Moseley for her leadership of the Mathematics team and Mrs Deborah Hirte and Mrs Wendy Candy for their facilitation of the work completed in Inquiry. Whilst leadership is important in any system, little progress would be made without the dedication of a passionate and hard-working team and I equally recognise the efforts of every member of staff in the Junior School for their individual contributions to the learning and wellbeing of our students. Class teachers, specialist teachers, Wyvern support staff, education assistants and administration staff all play an important role in the running of our College and there is not a person on staff who does not regularly go above and beyond what is asked of them in order to support our students.

As with most years, reflecting on the year that has been brings about thoughts of many special moments and events. From the House spirit shown at the Swimming and Athletics Carnivals; to Performance Assemblies and the presentation of Honour Awards; College Value Awards and the recognition of individual students' pursuits for personal excellence; further development of the Junior School Garden; the students' involvement in our first Junior School Arts Day and the Junior School Eisteddfod; the sense of community on Grandparents' and Special Friends' Day; JS Parents' and Friends' Association Family Picnic Disco; the efforts of our Junior School leaders and the excitement surrounding our end of year events

including the Early Learning Christmas Celebration and Year 4 Valedictory Assembly. It certainly has been a very busy year with much achieved and many wonderful moments to remember and celebrate.

The Arts

Carnivals

Yet again the Swimming and Athletics carnivals were a highlight of the year for students in the Junior School and provided an opportunity for every child to be involved and to 'have a go'. The House spirit and energy at each event was a pleasure to witness and I congratulate Mofflin House for claiming victory in the Swimming Carnival and Hardey House for their success at the Athletics carnival. Outside of our College carnivals many students also represented Wesley at Inter-school events and the common threads reflected in the feedback received related to our students' outstanding sportsmanship, support for each other and willingness to have a go in all events in which they were entered. A huge thank you to Mr Craig Bell for the many hours of work that go into organising our carnivals and events and for the manner in which he encourages our students to continually give of their best and to compete in such a positive and fair manner.

Sustainability and Nature Play

One of the general capabilities of the Australian Curriculum 2013 has seen a continued focus on sustainability with further development of the Junior School garden and an opportunity for the children to spend time engaging with their natural environment. Whilst we are encouraging the students to care for their natural environment, we are also providing opportunities

for them to spend more time in nature. During Term 4 our Kindergarten children commenced 'Foreshore School', spending each Friday morning learning about the South Perth foreshore and developing an appreciation for the natural world around them. In the Junior School garden, 'Stickland' continues to be a busy area during lunch times with a variety of structures and pipelines being created and much digging and mud-making enjoyed. Alongside these opportunities for the children to engage with their natural environment, we are also encouraging more sustainable recycling and upcycling practices. Our Term 4 Inquiry exploring the Big Question, 'How do you Build an Idea?' required the children to take the knowledge they had gained during our Term 3 inquiry (exploring natural sciences) and use the design process to create something that would help promote a sustainable environment. The ideas that the children formed and the commitment and persistence shown in the development, creation and evaluation of the designs, was a reflection of their commitment to being a sustainable community.

Student Leadership

2013 saw some changes to leadership opportunities for Year 4 students in the Junior School. Following great discussion with the Year 4 students it was decided to reduce the number of Student Leaders in the Junior School. In previous years, whilst we have had elections for the leadership positions, all students have had the opportunity to be a Student Leader. This year our students shared with us that they felt this took away from the importance of the roles and some students also expressed that they did not feel ready to take on a leadership position. Therefore, in keeping with the students' wishes and following discussions with teaching staff, we reduced the number of House Leaders to include only two leaders per House for each semester. Feedback from the Year 4 students at the end of the year was very positive and indicated that they felt the change had resulted in those students who were elected taking greater pride in the positions they held and providing extremely positive role models for younger students.

Students also had the opportunity to nominate to be Library and Chapel Monitors and all students had the opportunity to choose to be a Garden Monitor. Some quite exceptional students were also voted 'Aussie of the Month'. This year I have again been impressed with the outstanding leadership shown by all students as they have approached their roles with a great sense of responsibility and maturity. Our Student Leaders for 2013 leave the Junior School knowing that they have been wonderful role models for younger students and having made a valuable contribution to the life of the Junior School.

PERFORMING ARTS

Junior School Performing Arts had an exciting year with two innovations - the formation of a Junior School Choir and the Junior School Arts Day.

The choir is non-auditioned and made up of students from Years 3 and 4. This enthusiastic group of children meet every Friday before College for rehearsals. They work very hard to develop singing skills and produce an excellent sound. Performances included the Wesley Winter Concert on July 3, singing in Chapel, the Community Carols and the Year 4 Celebration Assembly.

The 2013 Junior School Arts Day was a highlight of the year. Held on Friday 20 September, the entire day offered a wide variety of arts activities. Students were grouped in Houses with siblings in the same groups, giving them a chance to share the day with others of their family.

The day started with a piano accordion performance and was followed by the 'Wesley Wiggles', a group of Senior School music students who dressed up and sang Wiggles songs, much to the delight of the children who couldn't quite believe their eyes. During the day groups rotated between a wide range of activities comprising Photography, Photographic Journalism, Cookie Decorating, Jelly Band app, Mosaic Art, Story Telling, Zumba dance, Artist in Residence, Children's Theatre, Magic, Woven Mural Art and Harmony Garden Art. The day closed with a concert by a visiting group called Osmosis who presented a variety of world music. Everyone joined in a dance to end the performance.

The Talent Show planned for lunchtime on Arts Day had to be cancelled due to rain. However, it was held the following week and we were amazed at the many talented acts presented by Junior School students.

Year 10 Drama students devised and performed the acts in the Children's Theatre activity and Photography students led the Photography activity. The Junior School children thoroughly enjoyed working with the older boys.

The instrumental ensemble groups within the Junior School, the Poco Pizzicatos', the Manning Maestros and the Wonderful Wesley Woodwinds gave a number of performances throughout the year in the Winter Concert, Chapel services, the Year 4 Celebration Assembly. They ended the year with a performance at their Christmas Concert.

This year the Junior School was again treated to a Cushion Concert by the Wesley Radio Orchestra. This is a significant event where the children hear and learn about the instruments of the orchestra.

Throughout the year in music lessons the link between music and literacy has been actively pursued. Children use their knowledge of sound and syllables in words to write rhythms to words. In Semester Two kindergarten students wrote and played rhythms to one of their first reading books, entitled *In*. Pre-primary wrote and played the rhythms of the words of the songs they performed. Each Year 1 class created its own poem and wrote a class song to accompany it. Year 2 explored breaking words into syllables, deciding if they were long or short and wrote more complicated rhythms to longer words. Year 3 learned about Compound time and used the knowledge gained to write the rhythm for a limerick, having studied limericks in literacy. Such links makes the learning richer and gives greater meaning for the children.

The Year 4 students extended their knowledge of the elements of music through recorder and tuned percussion playing with a focus on interpretation in music. Their stunning performance of the classic number, Ac-cent-tchu-ate the Positive demonstrated their ability to bring their music skills and knowledge to a performance situation.

It has been a busy, fun-filled year for Preforming Arts in the Junior School. The children are to be congratulated on their fine achievements.

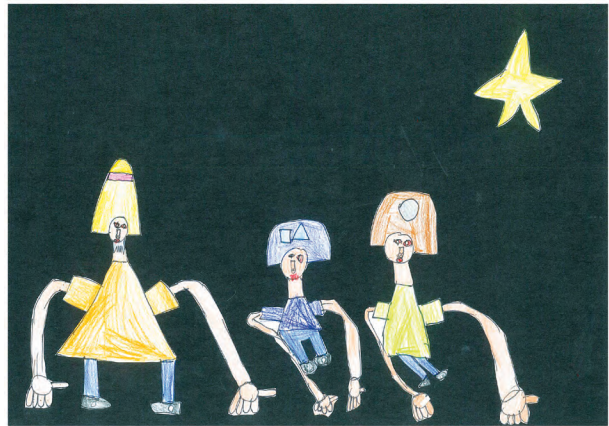

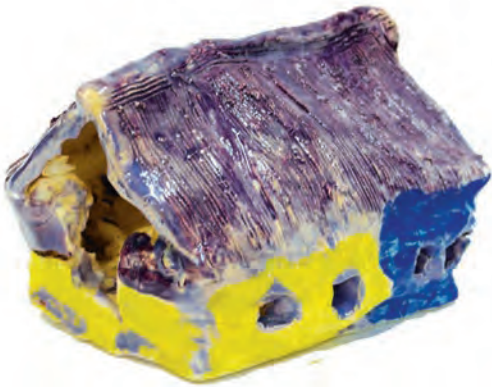

YEAR 4

What a fun-filled year we have had! It is difficult to imagine that we are already at the end of the year. Students in Year 4 have developed academically and socially as they look towards the transition to Year 5. They have grown in confidence and leadership qualities to become great ambassadors for Wesley College Junior School. Let us now take time to reflect on what we have learnt this year.

In Term 1 we started the year with sharing our cultural heritage. The children explored the historical beginning of Australia and how our history has impacted on who we are. They visited the Moorditj Mob and learnt about our Indigenous culture. They participated in dance, storytelling and playing traditional musical instruments. Studying the lives of Australian settlers, bushrangers and war heroes gave us a unique insight into the qualities we value, as Australians. The children's parents were invited to class performances involving interviewing Australian bushrangers and they also shared their knowledge with other classes.

Term 2 started with a storm! Our Inquiry focussed on discovering the effects natural disasters have on our environment. The extreme weather around the world proved to be an excellent source of discussion and interest. We read an exciting book entitled *Kensuke's Kingdom* which ignited the children's imagination discussing such questions as 'How would you cope being stuck on a deserted island?' Students looked at elements of how they can become better at story writing, focussing on story starters and using dialogue to bring stories alive. They visited Scitech to learn about the forces of nature in our universe and they also had great fun researching different science experiments to conduct back at the College. We all became scientists for a day, learning valuable lessons on how humans make an impact upon Earth.

Following on from learning how humans make an impact on our Earth, in Term 3 we visited Perth Zoo and learnt how a variety of animals are close to extinction due to the destruction of natural habitats. We discussed various controversial issues such as 'Are zoos a prison or a sanctuary?' Students researched animal classifications, the seven life processes of living things and how animals and plants naturally adapt to their environment. Our Inquiry concluded with an outstanding performance at assembly where the students presented their knowledge of why nature is important to living things.

In Term 4 students investigated the process of design with the aim of promoting sustainability. They experimented with the making of boats and musical instruments following the five stages of design - Investigating, Devising, Producing, Evaluating and Assessing. They reflected on their achievements throughout the year and shared their cherished memories of Wesley Junior School.

Throughout the year, all children were involved in Inter-house swimming, athletics and cross country carnivals. Selected students represented Wesley College with pride at Inter-school events. Students in Year 4 showed great sportsmanship against Guildford Grammar when they participated in soccer, hockey and basketball.

It has been a pleasure to teach such a friendly, hard-working and thoughtful group of students. They will be fondly missed as they move onto greater adventures in 2014.

YEAR 3

This year has passed by very quickly and looking back at what we achieved, there is no doubt that 2013 was packed with a diverse range of educational experiences for the children, where they were challenged to extend themselves.

Term 1 commenced with students looking at the big question "How does history make us who we are?" This formed the basis of our Inquiry, which had the children consider their own personal story in the context of a wider history. With help from their parents, they constructed family trees as home projects and then presented them to the class. There was a diverse range of creative responses, including 3D models, PowerPoint presentations and posters. In English we spent a substantial amount of the term learning about constructing 'persuasive texts' and how to substantiate and elaborate on arguments. Towards the end of term the students commenced familiarising themselves with NAPLAN reading tests. An important aspect in our reading program was the explicit teaching of reading strategies through the CARS and STARS reading program.

After completing the NAPLAN tests early in Term 2, we focussed on 'information report' writing which tied in very well with our Inquiry Big Question of "How does the Earth Change?" We had a visit to Scitech as part of 'tuning in' to our investigations and saw an excellent presentation on "The Wildest Weather in the Solar System". The students next constructed an alphabetic guide of space. Models and pictures were constructed depicting different aspects of the solar system and space to represent the letters a to z. In Mathematics we looked at the concepts of probability, symmetry and time-telling, to name a few.

Term 3 saw our foray into poetry as the major text type in English. Students completed couplets, limericks and cinquains on a variety of themes. Our Inquiry question was "Why is nature important to living things?" This provided ample subject material for the poems written by the students. In Mathematics we concentrated on a number of concepts including counting money, 3D shapes and calculating volume and capacity. During Inquiry students created their own dioramas using various

materials. These were enhanced by the use of the 'Aurasma' program (a form of 'augmented reality') and allowed the user to attach an image or video to an item by the use of a trigger image. When an appropriate smart device is pointed at the trigger image, it opens up the associated image or video. In this way the students were able to demonstrate their learning by attaching trigger images, which opened videos of the students giving an oral presentation to their dioramas.

Our Inquiry for the final term involved utilising the design process of Investigating, Devising, Producing and Evaluating to 'upcycle' an item brought from home. We commenced our Inquiry by watching the movie 'The Borrowers' where little characters called Borrowers re-use items taken from humans. In writing, we focussed on response texts and students wrote a number of reviews on various media they experienced.

Term 4 also saw the Year 3 assembly performance, 'The Wizard of Shnoz', where Dora Thee (the explorer) met a variety of interesting characters along her journey and learnt about the values of Respect, Integrity, Courage and Compassion.

Finally, we would like to thank parents for the ongoing support we received over the year. Our parents have not only assisted in their own child's development but have also extended their generosity to the teachers and the wider College community. These included volunteering for excursions, Parents' & Friends' fundraisers and other social events. We congratulate the Year 3 Class of 2013 and wish them every success moving into Year 4.

It has been an exciting year in Year 2 filled with lots of fun and learning. Term 1 focussed on our big question, 'How am I Australian?' We shared information about our families and interesting Australian artefacts from home. Our visit with the Moorditj Mob in the Middle School was a highlight of the term and the students enjoyed dot painting, dancing and listening to Aboriginal stories. We finished the term on a high note performing our class assembly which celebrated being Australian.

Term 2 began with an excursion to Perth Zoo to look at the different environments and habitats in which animals live. Using this information, the students then created dioramas displaying an Australian environment of their choice. They researched the different resources that can be found in Australia as part of our Unit of Inquiry, 'How does the Earth Change?' The last half of second term was busily spent writing and illustrating our picture books. A visit from West Australian author, Meg McKinlay, inspired us to go further with our creative stories and the finished product was amazing!

Term 3 was a hive of activity. The students enjoyed an excursion to South East Regional Centre for Urban Landcare (SECRUL) as part of our inquiry into, 'Why is Nature Important to us?' They learnt about the mistletoe and dragonfly life cycles and had fun identifying different macroinvertebrates in their river water samples. The

children then investigated other plant and animal life cycles and performed a very entertaining 'Butterfly Rap' that shared their knowledge of the butterfly life cycle with their Kindergarten buddies and parents. They planted bean seeds and were responsible for caring for them, watching them grow and recording their observations in their Bean Plant Diary. They participated enthusiastically in their events at the Athletics Carnival, displaying wonderful sportsmanship and they had fun celebrating Book Week by dressing up as a character from their favourite book for the Book Week Parade and listening to storyteller, Glenn Swift. The first Junior School Arts Day Festival held at the end of term was a highlight, with all the children participating in a variety of art experiences.

Term 4 invited the children to explore, 'How can we Build an Idea to Promote Sustainability?' The students participated in a fun incursion run by REMida. Each Year 2 class built a scarecrow for our Junior School sustainable garden. Students worked collaboratively in small groups to design and create the different body parts of the scarecrow by upcycling building and office materials. Inspired by the incursion, the children designed and created their own garden sculptures which looked fantastic!

It has been a pleasure to share in the learning journey of our students this year. They are a beautiful group of children, each special in their own unique way. We wish them all the best for Year 3.
